Challenging times for Alberta beekeepers

Alberta is the province with the largest beekeeping industry in Canada. As Alberta beekeepers open their hives this spring, they are finding very high mortality rates. In Canada, the overwintering mortality of bees is usually around 10%-20%, but this year rates are ranging from 30% to as much as 50%, and Alberta beekeepers are being hit very hard.

Alberta bees are usually in confinement from around October-April each year, and there is always some expected mortality due to the extreme cold temperatures. However, this year, many more bee colonies did not make it through the winter. The Canadian Honey Council has stated that Alberta usually has about 300 000 bee colonies intact. About 100 000-120 000 did not make it through confinement this year, a substantial increase over previous years.

In addition to the cold winter, there has been another cause for the increase in the number of dead bees. This is the varroa mite, a parasitic mite that feeds on honeybees. It has existed in Canada since 1989. These mites can also carry diseases that can spread within the bee colonies. The varroa mite explosion was likely caused by last year's hot and dry prairie summer, which allowed the varroa mites to flourish. The Alberta Beekeepers Commission is funding research projects working on varroa treatments, but chemical treatments are not working as expected. One promising experiment indicates that heating the hive to a specific temperature could kill the mites without harming the bees, so there is some hope.

Beekeepers would usually import bees from places like Australia and New Zealand

Fire Restriction

Effective: April 26, 2022 9:00 AM

Smoky Lake County has implemented a Fire Restriction effective 9:00 a.m. April 26, 2022. Smoky Lake County will not be issuing any new burn permits. With the dry conditions, cured dry grass becoming more prominent and lack of moisture the fire hazard is high at this time.

It is recommended that all burn permits that were issued be checked, to ensure that they are out and not cause a spring grass fire. Recovery of Firefighting Costs: In accordance with Bylaw: Fire Protection Services, as amended from time to time or any costs incurred by the County Fire departments will be charged to the landowner/ permit holder, if the Fire Department or County is called upon to respond to extinguish a fire.

Fire pits, warming fires, barbeque's and burn barrels will be allowed but must be supervised to ensure that they do not cause a secondary fire.

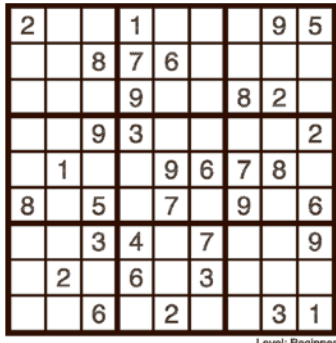

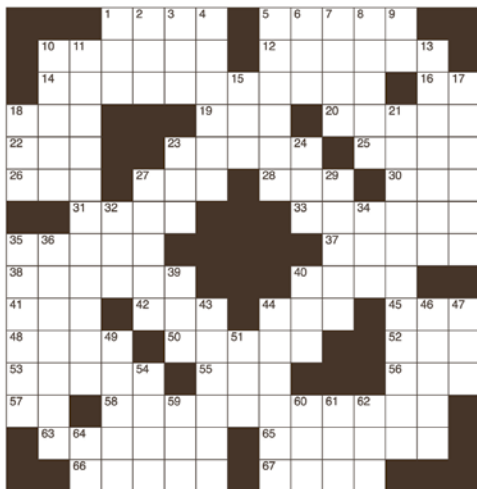
Fun By The Numbers

RCMP ROYAL CANADIAN MOUNTED POLICE

Royal Canadian Mounted Police - Redwater Detachment

During the month of April, the Redwater Detachment saw a slight increase in calls for service to 197 calls. These calls consisted of (3) 911 Act - Other Activities, (5) Abandoned Vehicles, (6) Assaults, (1) Assault with a Weapon/Causing Bodily Harm, (9) Break and Enter to Residence/Business/Other, (2) Failure to Comply

with Release Conditions, and (7) Mischiefs.

The month of April started off with another catalytic converter theft. April 4, 022 at 4:00 p.m. the Redwater Detachment received a complaint that someone had crawled underneath a truck and cut out the catalytic converter. The metals inside these catalytic converters can be recycled at metal recyclers where

the thieves receive money in return. Over the years, this theft has become a common place which lead the Alberta Government to introduce the "Scrap Metal Dealers and Recyclers Identification Act" which gave metal recycling companies a number of requirements when purchasing scrap metal which includes obtaining proof of identification, retaining information about the transaction, and, in certain

circumstances, sharing information with police. If you notice anyone crawling under vehicles or hear metal cutting at an abnormal time (like 3:00 a.m.) make sure and report this to us as it is unlikely that any home based mechanic or reputable mechanic is working at this hour. Other ways to prevent this theft is to park in well-lit areas. If you don't have a street light where you park, consider turning on the outside lights of your residence to deter thieves.

With Spring comes people enjoying the use of their dirt bikes and off-highway vehicles. As off-highway vehicle use increases, so do the calls that the detachment receives regarding the use of them. The vast majority of off-highway vehicle users that the detachment interacts with are using the vehicles in the permitted manner, but every once in a while we do encounter the odd violator. In order to ensure everyone is on the same page I would like to remind everyone of some of the laws/bylaws surrounding the use of off-highway vehicles in the areas the Redwater Detachment polices. In Alberta the Traffic Safety Act defines an off-highway vehicle as any motorized mode of transportation built for cross-country travel on land, water, snow,

ice, or marsh or swamp land or on other natural terrain. This includes ATVs, UTVs, side-by-sides, and snowmobiles. The Alberta Traffic Safety Act states that "an off-highway vehicle may not be operated on any highway, road, or ditch unless permission has been expressly granted. In the case of a provincial highway, the Minister may by 'order' or 'permit' authorize such vehicles along any portion of a highway. In the case of a municipality, the council of a municipality may, through bylaw, authorize such vehicles along any portion of a highway, which includes the ditches alongside the roadway" providing the off-highway vehicle is currently registered and insured. We then have to take a look at each town and county to determine if they have "authorized such vehicles along any portion of a highway, which includes the ditches alongside the roadway". Each is as follows:

corporate limits between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. with a maximum speed of 20 kmph.

- **Sturgeon County:** Off-highway vehicles allowed between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and midnight and provided the operator is wearing a helmet, has a valid licence, travels only on the extreme right-handed portion of the road in single file (unless there are signs that prohibit travel), have one working headlight and taillight, and are currently registered and insured with a max speed of 30 kmph.
- **Thorhild County:**
- **Hamlet of Thorhild:** Off-highway vehicles allowed between the hours of 7:30 a.m. and 11:00 p.m. on a county highway within the Hamlet, travel in the same direction of traffic on that side of the highway, for the purposes of exiting or entering the hamlet and from the operator's residence, and for traveling to and from the beach and for the purpose of snow vehicles accessing the lake, using the block roadway and walkway, using the most direct route, and are currently registered and insured.
- **Thorhild County:**

Off-highway vehicles are allowed to travel along the ditch, but not the grade top, using the right hand side that is the same side as traffic flow on the grade top during all hours of the day and night. On April 18 the Redwater Detachment was dispatched to assist the Sturgeon County Fire Department who had been dispatched a fire on a rural property. Upon arriving the members were advised that one of the property owners was having a fire in their yard when the grass caught on fire and spread to a neighbouring property. The members assisted with evacuating nearby residents while the fire department was able to quickly gain control of the fire which resulted in only minor damage to each property. April 19 at approximately 5:00 p.m. a member was dispatched to a call of a driver sleeping behind the steering wheel of his Dodge Ram truck. This alone would not sound too suspicious, but the truck was located in the ditch facing oncoming traffic. The member observed the lone male occupant passed out with numerous open/empty alcohol containers on the floor and passenger seat. The driver was woken up and became uncooperative and combative with police. The male was

subsequently arrested for impaired operation of a conveyance, and after refusing to provide a breath sample was lodged in cells until sober. Upon release the male received provincial roadside sanctions which consisted of a vehicle seizure and a licence suspension. On April 23 detachment members were dispatched to a 911 call of a possible impaired driver on Highway 28 in Thorhild County. The witness reported that the suspect vehicle kept swerving into the oncoming traffic lane nearly hitting vehicles. Police located the vehicle, conducted a traffic stop, and identified the lone occupant of the vehicle was a 23-year-old female. Mandatory Alcohol Screening was completed with a roadside instrument which revealed that the driver had not consumed any alcohol. The investigation eventually ended up revealing that the driver was tired and was weaving as a result of falling asleep. The driver was directed to take a rest on the side of the road prior to continuing her trip. In Alberta Police can issue 24 hr suspensions to driver who are tired or "fatigued" which would result in your driving privileges being suspended to 24 hours and your vehicle being towed. If you are tired, pull over and take a break for everyone's safety.

to replenish their hives. Unfortunately, Covid-related disruptions in airline deliveries have made it much more expensive to order more supplies. Replacement hives, which usually cost \$200 each, are now being sold for as high as \$700, making it

very expensive to maintain colony numbers. Alberta beekeepers are resilient, but the low honeybee populations will also result in other far-reaching consequences. Honeybees are crucial pollinators for many crops, such as Canola, which we often see in the fields of Sturgeon County. Bees

pollinate the foods we eat and also the foods eaten by birds and other animals, such as wild berries, nuts, and food consumed by domestic livestock. The effects will be felt up the food chain. Many plants have adapted bees into their life cycle. If bee populations decrease quickly, plants may not have

time to adjust and could die off. The picture will become much more apparent this summer and over the next few years. Meanwhile, a few simple things can be done to help our local beekeepers and the decreasing honeybee populations. First of all, let's buy local. When possible, buy

your honey from local beekeepers. There are several in Sturgeon County, and their local products can often be found at the spring/summer Farmers' Markets. In addition, try to plant wildflowers in your gardens. Not only are these flowers colourful and fragrant, but they are rich in nectar

and pollen and offer the most food for honeybees. Over time, these efforts can help make a difference. Most importantly, Alberta beekeepers will continue to play crucial roles in this battle as they remain hopeful and do their best to keep their surviving colonies alive and healthy.

Brighten up your yard with flowers from Linda's Market Gardens

The snow is gone, and the garden looks brown and lifeless. Time for so much-needed colour! Along highway 28, right across from the Esso in Smoky Lake, is Linda's Market Gardens, a beautiful corner that can brighten up anyone's day. The greenhouse's primary attraction is an abundance of scents and colours that welcomes the customers; flowers form a beautiful kaleidoscope that may soon brighten up a customer's yard. Linda Christensen started with gardens in 1983 and has owned the greenhouse for approximately 30 years. "We grow the flowers at home in our greenhouse and bring them here to sell. It is quite hard to

find good seasonal staff, so one place to sell flowers is sufficient; we don't sell from home. The way flowers are started changed over the years; they used to be started from seeds, but now they are started from plugs; it's a different technique. There has also been a change from gardens to planters and baskets over the years. There are new things, new varieties every year". The variety of colours in, especially the petunias, is indeed astounding. Linda shows how different colours combined make for beautiful arrangements, as showcased by the hanging baskets and pots with combined colours of flowers, almost begging customers to bring them home. Although petunias seem to comprise the majority, the pansies don't lag far behind. They, too, present in a colourful palette, a pleasure for the eye. These petunias and pansies are annuals; they flower the entire summer but one summer only, whereas perennials only flower for a restricted period and then come back the following year. That makes the annuals so popular. Flowers make up most of the greenhouse, but Linda sells vegetables as well: seed potatoes, tomato plants and several spices such as basil and dill. The mint chocolate plant spreads a delicious scent; one can hardly wait to make a specialty tea. Linda will also make flower arrangements, for weddings, for example. In her shop, she sells ice cream, homemade preserves and jams. She used to sell more ornaments, but it seems people are more minimalistic and do not want all the decorations in their yards anymore. Due to her location, Linda gets customers from everywhere. "It's good to have different greenhouses in the area so people can compare; every greenhouse offers something different. Greenhouses are all weather-related. If the weather is nice, people will go out and visit greenhouses." Linda's Market Gardens is open from 10:00 am - 7:00 pm.

"Our 25 local KidSport

chapters are collaborating with local minor hockey associations to grow the game in their community. Our partners at Sport Central and Rosenau Transport are going to ensure that we are able to get hockey equipment to those kids who need it as well. The Indigenous Sport Council of Alberta is going to help us get more Indigenous kids playing and Hockey Alberta has played a huge role in connecting everyone in the hockey community. This project is truly a team effort to get more kids playing hockey in Oil Country."

"My kids love being a part of something special," said a current KidSport parent. "My son loves scoring goals. My oldest daughter has struggled with depression and anxiety and when she's on the ice she feels like a different person with no stress. When they play, it helps them learn to contribute at home. They know that being a good member of society and in the home is the key to being a great team player."


