A new holistic clinic opened in Redwater last August at 5303 48 Avenue. University TCM Clinic provides clients with acupuncture, massage, osteopathy and herbs. Their head office is in Edmonton near the University of Alberta campus.

"We wanted to see more and more people get beneficial results from these acupuncture treatments," said Dr. Linda Lin when asked why she opened a clinic in Redwater. "We have a team with so many different therapists."

Dr. Lin noted that although the human body has a self-healing function, sometimes

people can't walk alone. In those cases, she suggests acupuncture to stimulate the healing function.

Redwater resident Sandra Walsh had never been to an acupuncturist before last April. "But I had an infection in my leg, and it looked really bad," said Walsh. "I went in feeling very itchy, and I said, is there anything you can do for this? So now it's amazing. My leg went from very dark in colour, just like a huge bruise, and it's almost all gone. I can feel circulation going through there now."

The University TCM Clinic website claims to be "Your local pain specialist team." The clinic has direct billing

arrangements for session payments with companies like TELUS Health, Blue Cross and WCB.

"There are so many different insurance companies, and they cover acupuncture treatments if they [patients] have their health insurance," said Dr. Lin. "They just have to check their insurance plan and see if they have coverage."

She added that Alberta Health Services does not provide coverage for acupuncture treatments. "Not yet, but we're working on it," said Dr. Lin. For more information on University TCM Clinic, visit http://www.universitytcmclinic.com/.



for her heifer looks like she just came from the beauty parlour. Lane Fulks from Waskatenau is in his third year of 4H. His heifer Jelly Bean became the Grand Champion in the females. "I would like to go to cattle shows like the Farm Fair and compete there," Lane says. Reserve champion in this category was Alyson Makowaychuk, for whom it was the first year she was competing in the beef club. During the intermission, the kids could be seen

grooming their animals as the grand steers show was to start in the afternoon. The kids' ages ranged from approximately 10 to 17 years old, and it was amazing to see how a 10-yearold could handle a 1200-pound steer., sometimes with a bit of help and support from the more senior club members. They all presented very well, and the judge had difficulty deciding who would win. Still, eventually, she came to a decision: Ellena Senetza, with her steer Butter, was awarded the Grand

Champion Market Steer title. "I chose him because he was always curious and playful on pasture, and if you crouched down long enough, he would come and sniff your hand," Ellena says. Lane Fulks with Logan became Reserve Champion Market Steer. "Logan is a Black Angus/ Simmenthal. I enjoy spending time with my animals and even fake sick from time to time, so I can stay home and work with my dad on the farm", Lane says. The judge was very thorough in her examination

of the animals and explained why she chose the animals for Champion and Reserve Champion. Still, she also had plenty of good to say about the steers that did not make it to that rating. Sometimes, it was a close call. Next year, some of the 4H kids won't return because they are graduating and starting college. For all participants, it was a great day of learning and achieving. For the public, it was a joy to see how well these young people did with their animals.

Redwater and Boyle RCMP arrest suspect after shots fired at gas station

On June 7, 2022, Boyle RCMP received a complaint of a male carrying a firearm. Subsequent investigation revealed that the male suspect fired a shot at a closed gas station and left the area. A description of the suspect and his vehicle was sent to nearby detachments. Shortly after, Redwater RCMP observed a vehicle matching the description and attempted a traffic stop. The vehicle fled and officers pursued. Fortunately, the vehicle ran out of gas within minutes and the suspect was safely arrested without further incident.

Further investigation revealed that the pickup that the

suspect was driving had been stolen during the evening from Thorhild County. A search of the vehicle revealed 3 loaded firearms and 5 unloaded firearms all stolen from a residential Break and Enter on June 6, 2022, near Smoky Lake.

RCMP have charged Sonny Ray Giant (40), of Lac La Biche, with 50 offences including firearms offences, possession of stolen property, flight from police, failing to comply with release conditions and failing to comply with weapon prohibition orders.

"This is a great example of two detachments working together to bring a quick and safe end to a dangerous situation", says Sergeant Jeff Sehn Detachment Commander Redwater RCMP.





the trip and what they liked so that we can keep their preferences in mind with future activities," Rachelle added. The survey results showed that the trip was well-appreciated by everyone. 
