Redwater's Rosaterra Development nearing completion

has partnered with a Developer to complete the Rosaterra Development and provide neighbouring amenities to the community.

This summer, Redwater Town Council has held two Special Meetings to conduct business regarding the completion of the Rosaterra Development. On July 26, 2022 Redwater Town Council gave CAO, Ken Van Buul approval to finalize negotiations of the Development Agreement and on August 23, 2022 they approved releasing \$544,085 from initial securities and reserves to complete the Town's portion of municipal improvements.

"Council and I are dedicated to developing Redwater in a meaningful way," explained Mayor McRae. "Residential development encourages business and industry to consider our community for their developmental projects. This project will see the municipality developing infrastructure, complementing the upgrades being initiated by the owner and promoting future development in the area. We look forward to future developments and partnerships."

The Town of Redwater occupancy, landscaping, fencing and parking lot development. The Town is responsible for offsite municipal improvements and intends to have our Operations and Engineering Division complete the improvements in-house.

> As a result of this partnership the Town has acquired ownership of two of the adjacent lots. While the concept has not been finalized the intention will be to develop them as greenspace to provide additional amenities to the community.

> The Rosaterra Subdivision project was first started in June 2008 and initially contemplated as a condo. At this time the underground infrastructure was completed, and some roadwork was in progress under this initial development. For a myriad of reasons, the development remained unfinished. The project is now a

> 12-unit apartment building with an elevator, comprising of 2 bed/2 bath oversized units (1189 sq ft) with fireplaces. The units and adjacent developments will offer Redwater residents a broader range of housing options, additional amenities, and, once completed, provide additional tax revenue for the Town.


PUBLIC HEARING - 1598/22 Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17




Here's How It Works:



Wages are up, but not really [

Wages in Alberta continue to grow, but not nearly enough to match inflation.

Seasonally-adjusted average weekly earnings (including overtime) picked up in the province for the second consecutive month, going from \$1,253 in May to \$1,257 in June (+0.4%).


Average earnings in June were also up relative to the same month last year, rising by 2.2% on an unadjusted basis. Already higher-paying goods sector earnings grew by 4.5% and were responsible for most of the aggregate increase while average wages across services industries were up by only 1.1%.

The picture changes when you factor in inflation.

Real wages (i.e. earnings adjusted for higher consumer prices) have been on a downward trend for several months, fell to their lowest level in nearly thirteen years in June, and were down by 4.0% over the first six months of 2022 compared to the same period in 2021.

It's a similar situation nationally, albeit slightly less dire. At their lowest point since September 2019, real wages in Canada were down by 3.4% on a year-to-date basis.

We expect the story to be largely unchanged when we get the numbers for July.
