New Operation Christmas Child Drop-Off in Redwater

This year the Redwater Alliance Church will be the new area drop-off location for Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. Operation Christmas Child is a program that is run globally by Samaritan's Purse, delivering Christmas gifts packed in shoeboxes to children throughout the world. The shoebox program is now in its 29th year and has delivered 188 million shoebox gifts to children in more than 170 countries and territories.

Shoeboxes are packed with small gifts, hygiene items, school supplies and toys by community members, and then shipped to children in need. Samaritan's Purse volunteers distribute the gifts within communities, providing a gift of hope and love.

Megan Suitor, the area team leader, is looking

to put together a team of volunteers for the week of November 14 to 20th to collect and organize the shoeboxes at the drop-off location.

"We are hoping to make this a true community project. To have volunteers working together from Redwater and the surrounding communities," said Suitor.

Empty shoeboxes are already available for pick-up from the Redwater Alliance Church, but gifts packed in regular shoeboxes are accepted as well. A donation of \$10 per box is appreciated to cover the cost of shipping and processing, with tax receipts available for donations of \$20 or more.

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

field the following year. Checking belts, pulleys, chains, and bearings, then replacing those parts that are worn out—planning strategizing is a large part of farming crops, how to rotate crops, learning how different crops performed and even looking into weather conditions. Throughout the winter, finances are reviewed, taxes are prepared, and

fertilizer and seed rates are investigated. Farmers also plan out next year's production and sales goals and devise a food safety plan for farm operations. This also includes maintaining water and food sources for livestock throughout the cold winter months. Some farmers also roll up and test drip tape, roll up row covers, pick up hoops and find places to store everything.

Local to the Redwater

area, Nicole and Shaun Fried are farmers who follow along grain-grown yearly. During the winter months, they carry on distributing their products. Nicole Fried said, "We are a strict grain farm, and after our harvest season, we move onto grain handling during the winter months. We would fill our contracts and haul them into elevators whether it was put into bags or bins."

Community members can bring any old and unwanted electronics to 4915 48 Street on October 15 from 11:00 am to 2:30 pm. Declutter your home or office and join the Redwater Libraries fundraiser and recycling day.

The Redwater Library will be accepting items like all-in-one computers, TVs, and monitors. Along with printers, copiers, scanners, and fax machines. Even

if you have any old laptops, notebooks, and tablets, they will take them. To help keep the environment safer and healthier, the community may recycle small appliances, audio visual, telecom devices, power, and air tools. Are your kids all grown up and moved out? The Redwater Library will also be excepting toys, gaming systems and controllers. Maybe your garden shed is getting too full of older lawn tools; they will also accept those.

There are many advantages to recycling electronics saving

natural resources, increasing employment, and increasing affordability. The metals used in electronics, such as iron, aluminum, and gold, erode and can release horrible and harmful toxins into the soil. Toxins secreted into the soil kill plants and microorganisms living in landfills, destroying ecosystems and worsening the environment's health. Toxins can spread through the soil and eventually reach water sources; recycling electronics and keeping them clear of landfills



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



On October 1st, Smoky Lake confirmed that it is the Pumpkin Capital of Alberta: At the pumpkin weigh-off, Don Crews from Lloydminster was the winner with a 2537 pounds pumpkin, the biggest in Canadian history! After one year of total cancellation (2020) and another year with an outside farmers' market only (2021), the Smoky Lake Pumpkin Growers Association and local help went full out in a celebration that has yet to meet its counterpart. It paid off with a massive turnout of an estimated 4500 visitors (or many more?) attending the Pumpkin Fair. No count was held, so one can only guess. Though the weather was not very cooperative, with a thick fog in the morning and grey skies, visitors started streaming into town from near and far at the earliest hours to secure a parking spot. Parking was arranged around the AG Complex, but all streets between downtown and

the complex filled up quickly. Shuttle buses ran from the complex to downtown and back all day long. The day started with a pancake breakfast by the Smoky Lake Kinettes. Downtown, the Smoky Lake Iron Cruisers hosted a fabulous car show with various makes and models from way back when to more modern times, all shined up for the occasion by their proud owners. Street vendors lined the sidewalks, the Seniors' centre held its annual garage sale, and Blue Horse Gallery hosted an Art Show. The farmers' market inside and outside the Ag Complex attracted so many visitors that it was hard to get through, and it looked like vendors did good business there. Across the street were children's activities, a petting zoo, a carousel, and other entertainment. The souvenir stand sold toques, hats, sweaters, hoodies and T-shirts. Many people had counted on a warm sunny day but decided they needed an

extra layer to stay warm, for, within no time, the souvenir stand sold out toques and warm clothing in the most common sizes. Those who came later had to settle for a much larger or smaller sweater, but anything to stay warm. Since Smoky Lake is a small town, it was easy to get around on foot and visit every attraction, but the buses stopped at every attraction, such as the smaller farmers' market at H.A. Kostash school. The public was treated to beer gardens, a perogy supper at the Curling Rink, Wine Tasting at Gopher's Liquor, and a pig roast. After all, on a busy day like this, a person needs fuel to keep going, which was looked after by several vendors and businesses throughout the town. The pumpkin weigh-off and auction were the top attractions, followed by the Pumpkin Drop. The sun finally came out at that time, leaving a warm, sunny impression of a well-organized and successful Smoky Lake Pumpkin Fair 2022.



Starting her main focus was drawing and acrylic painting until she took a sculpting course in 2014. That is when her love for sculpting blossomed. Laninga makes realistic sculptures done in bronze or cold-cast bronze resin and range in size from one-quarter to onethird life scale. Laninga said, "I realized I am a sculptor; I think in three dimensions.

After attending a sculpture anatomy course in Las Vegas, Nevada, I became a full-time artist. I have had sculptures shown in exhibits around Alberta and Vancouver and received many awards."

At "Featured Artists," Laninga's artwork may be seen at the Spruce Grove Gallery, inside the library at 35 5 Avenue, Spruce Grove. Many sculptures will be shown of the local artists from October 24 to November 10, along with a reception hosted on October 29 from 1:00 pm to 3:00 pm where any guests who attend can meet and conversate with Laninga.

Laninga said, "It is an honour to be a "Featured Artist" and have several of my sculptures shown at once. I am also nervous as I haven't had a reception or opening. It is exciting, and my biggest hope is that all viewers enjoy the exhibit. My pieces are often about hope and connection. I cannot wait to see everyone there."
