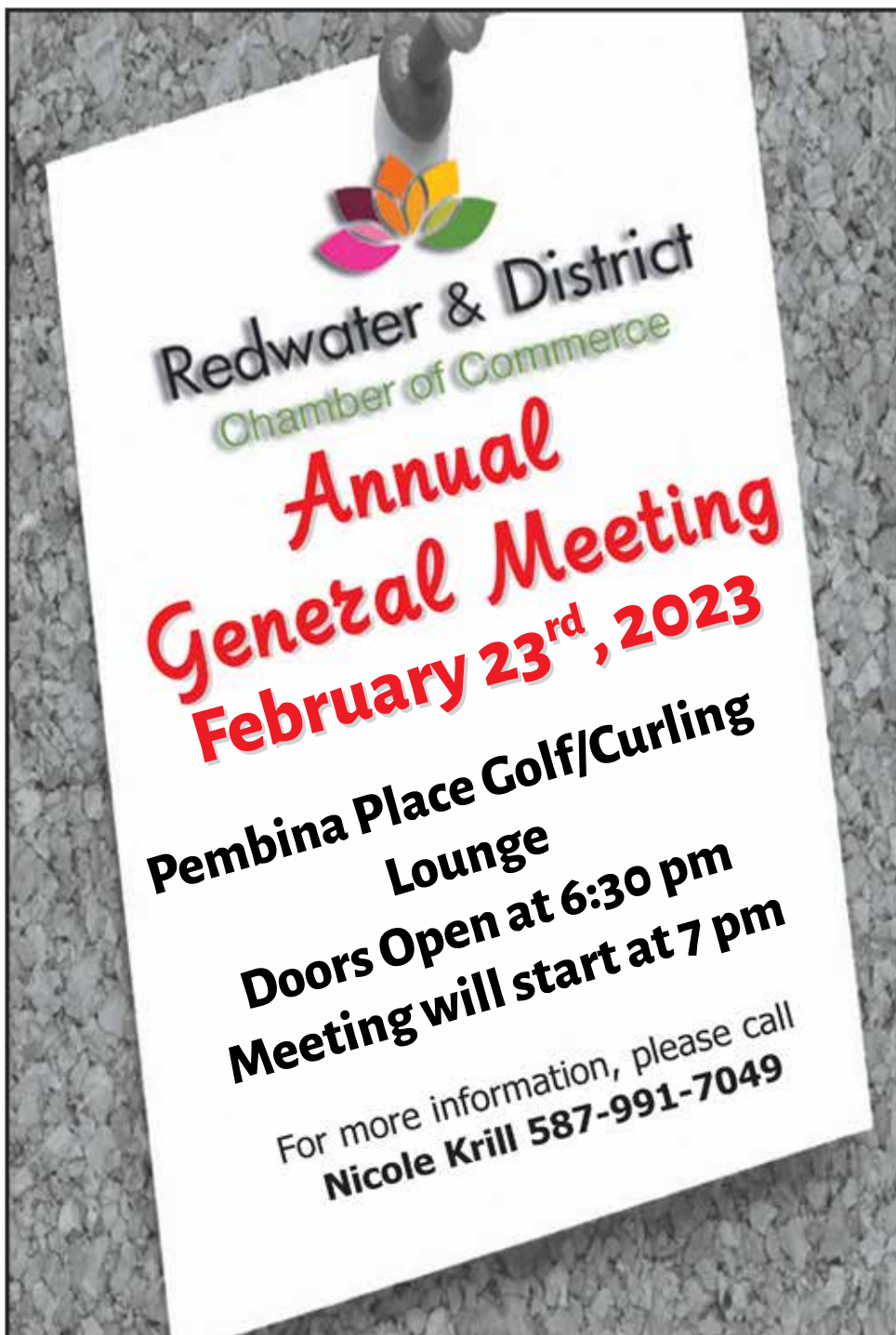

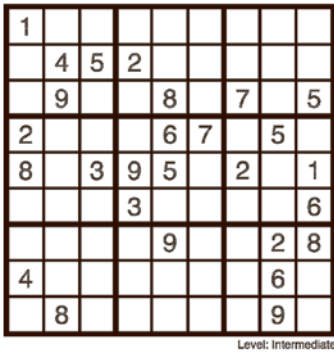

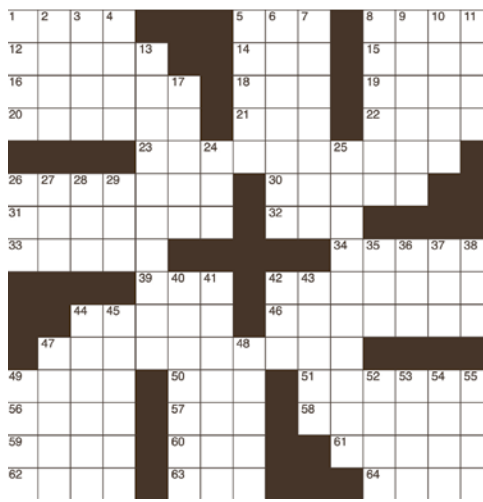

Royal Canadian Mounted Police – Redwater Detachment

The new year started off with the Redwater RCMP responding to a total of 347 calls for the month of January which included:

- Assault with a Weapon/Causing Bodily Harm
- Break and Enter Residence (x7)
- Fraud (x4)
- Mischief (x5)
- Impaired Operation of a Conveyance (x2)
- Theft (x3)
- Theft of Motor Vehicle (x4)
- Motor Vehicle Collisions (x28)

On January 4, 2023, an officer was conducting proactive patrols in the area of Highway 63 and Highway 18 when they observed a northbound Hyundai Kona traveling at a high rate of speed. The officer was able to determine, by use of radar, that the vehicle was driving 152 km/h in a 100 km/h zone. The officer conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and the female driver advised that she needed to use the washroom and that her GPS had advised her that the next washroom was 1 hour away. The officer was able to determine that the driver would have passed a few options to use the washroom, such as the Town of Redwater and more recently, the weigh scales a few kilometers back. Further investigation by the officer revealed that the speedy Hyundai Kona was in fact a rental vehicle. The officer called the rental company to advise them, as they were the owners, the manner in which their vehicle was being driven and the rental company advised

that they were immediately terminating the rental contract due to the speed in which the vehicle was being driven and requested the vehicle be towed as there was no longer an authorized driver. The officer towed the vehicle and issued the 30-year-old female from Calgary, Alberta, a summons to appear in court for speeding.

On January 7, 2023, during proactive patrols, officers observed a vehicle in a high crime rural area that was traveling on a range road at a high rate of speed. Officers conducted a traffic stop on the vehicle and quickly determined that the lone male driver was suspended from operating a motor vehicle, was prohibited from possessing firearms, and also had a warrant for their arrest for failing to appear in court. Further investigation revealed that the licence plate did not match the vehicle, but the driver was able to provide a bill of sale indicating that they had purchased the vehicle some time ago, but was unable to provide insurance. The driver was arrested and a subsequent search of the vehicle revealed that the driver was in possession of what is believed to be a homemade firearm. The driver was also found to currently be on probation and as a result was transported to the Redwater Detachment for a Judicial Interim Release hearing (a bail hearing), where he was remanded in custody.

As a result of his actions Kyle Moore (36), a resident of Bon Accord, Alberta has been charged with the

following:

- Fail to Comply with a Probation Order.
- Unsafe Storage of a Firearm.
- Possession of a Firearm in a Motor Vehicle.
- Possession of Property Obtained by Crime Under \$5000.

Kyle Moore is due next in Fort Saskatchewan Provincial Court on February 2, 2023 at 9:30 a.m.

On January 19, 2023, at approximately 9:15 p.m. Redwater RCMP received a complaint of a stolen vehicle from a rural property in Thorhild County. The victim reported that a male and female had approached their residence asking for assistance as the vehicle they were driving went off the road and was stuck in the ditch and they were cold. The victim allowed the male and female into the residence to allow them to warm up. A short time later, the male and female departed the residence to return to their car, at which time the victim noticed that their garage door was wide open and their truck was missing. The investigation revealed that while they were the house warming up, the male and female were able to steal a set of keys for the truck that was located in the garage. When they left, they broke into the garage, stole the truck, and then used it to ram through a closed gate on the property and fled from the area. After completing their investigation, the officer was able to identify the female suspect and a warrant for her arrest has been requested.

Jobs added in January

Employment in Alberta in January 2023* increased by 0.9% or about 20,700 positions compared to December 2022—the fourth monthly increase in a row.

However, because growth in the number of people searching for work in the province grew at a faster rate than total employment,

Alberta’s unemployment rate in January rose to 6.0% from 5.6%** in December.

The national economy added about 150,000 jobs for a monthly increase of 0.8%. This was the fifth consecutive uptick.

The national unemployment rate was unchanged from the month before at 5.0%.

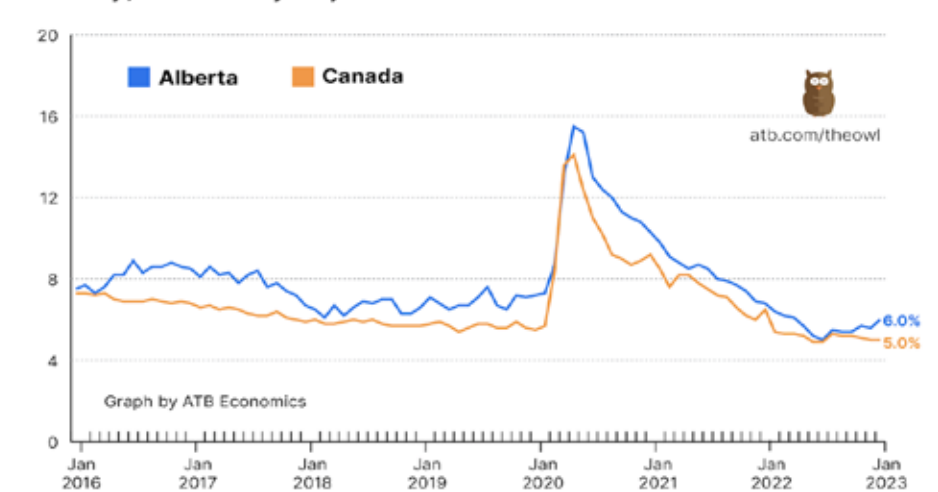
Compared to January 2022, employment in

Alberta was 0.9% higher (+99,400 positions) and by 0.8% (+746,300) nationally.

*The Labour Force Survey estimates for January are for the week of January 15 to 21, 2023.

**Alberta’s unemployment rate in December 2022 was originally estimated to be 5.8% but was revised down to 5.6% by Statistics Canada.

Redwater RCMP officer injured during call for service in Thorhild

On February 7, at 4:01 p.m., Redwater RCMP responded to a call for service at a residence in Thorhild. During the call, an officer was attacked with a knife and received serious, non-life threatening injuries. The officer has been airlifted to hospital and remains in stable condition.

Cindy Chelsberg, a 48-year-old female resident of the home, has been taken into custody.

Officers from RCMP's Eastern Alberta District and Northern General Investigative Sections have taken over the investigation.

Chelsberg has been charged with:

- Attempted murder
- Aggravated Assault of a Peace Officer

- Aggravated Assault
- Obstruction
- Possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose.

Chelsberg has been taken before a Justice of the Peace and remanded in custody with her next court appearance set for February 9, at Fort Saskatchewan Provincial Court.

As this matter is now before the court no updates will be provided.

RESCINDED LAND USE BYLAW FOLLOW UP

At a Special Council meeting held on February 2, 2023, Thorhild County Council defeated the Second Reading of draft Land Use Bylaw 14-2022, resulting in the draft bylaw being rescinded and stopping the bylaw from coming into effect.

This means that draft Land Use Bylaw 14-2022 and the regulations outlined in the draft land use bylaw will not move forward. There is no intent to bring a subsequent draft land use bylaw to Council during this term.

Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015 is still in effect.

High School Success Coaches

Kelly Feledichuk (Thorhild Central School) and Ashley Romaniuk (H.A. Kostash School) provided the

Board of Trustees with an overview of the High School Success Coach program.

Each of the five high schools within Aspen View Public Schools has 0.2 FTE assigned to the High School Success Coach position. The role of the coaches include:

- coordinating off-campus opportunities such as CAREERS internships, dual credit courses and Green Certificate, as well as field trips, post-secondary school visits and open houses;

- assisting students with course selection and post-secondary, scholarship and student financial aid applications;
- monitoring student progress in virtual courses;
- helping students access and use PowerSchool, myPass, myBlueprint and other resources;
- helping students with resumes and cover letters;
- communicating with parents/guardians about students' high

school progress and future planning.

Other members of the High School Success Coach team include Crystal Holdis (Edwin Parr Composite School), Nancy Amero (Boyle School) and Jen Machetchuk (Vilna School).

Indigenous Education update

Katherine Mann, Associate Superintendent of Curriculum & Technology, provided the Board of Trustees with an update on Indigenous Education within

the division.

Aspen View Public Schools serve 626 students who self-identify as Indigenous, which comprises just over 22 percent of the total student population. Student achievement for this cohort remains an area of focus, as they are 22.2 percent below provincial results at the acceptable standard, and 8.5 percent below provincial results at the standard of excellence.

Associate Superintendent Mann noted that high school

completion rates for First Nations, Métis and Inuit students within Aspen View remain slightly below provincial averages at the three-year level, but exceed provincial results for four-year and five-year completion.

Education for Reconciliation continues to expand at schools throughout the division. In addition to collaboration for special events such as the National Day for Truth & Reconciliation, Métis Week and Indigenous Peoples Day, schools embrace daily cultural teachings into schools such as smudging, talking circles and land-based learning.

Aspen View will be exploring ways to further enhance Education for Reconciliation, including locally developed credit courses and Indigenous languages.

New H.A. Kostash School

Prior to the meeting, the Board of Trustees had the opportunity to tour the new H.A. Kostash School. Construction is scheduled for completion in spring 2023, and will open for the start of the 2023-24 school year.

Other highlights

Board of Trustees Chair Candy Nikipello recognized Trustee Dennis MacNeil on being awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal for his work with the Public School Boards' Association of Alberta.


