"I have been honoured throughout my tenure to work with supportive and dedicated trustees, administrators and educators



Good turnout for Smoky Lake County Rural Crime Watch AGM

On March 6, Smoky Lake County Rural Crime Watch Association (SLCRCWA) held its annual general meeting, and as usual with AGMs, it was a night for awards, appreciation and education. Appreciation for all the schoolchildren from Smoky Lake H.A. Kostash School, Holy Family Catholic School and Smoky Lake Hutterite Colony who had submitted posters in the poster contest. The winners' posters were collected for a calendar available through SLCRCWA (check their Facebook page). Usually, the province would put on this contest for a provincial calendar, but this year that was not the case, and as not to disappoint the kids and appreciate their talent, SLCRCWA decided

to put on the contest themselves and create a Smoky Lake County Rural Crime Watch calendar. Apart from an award, each winner received a gift certificate donated by local businesses. The highlight of the evening was a presentation by Shaughnessy from Volunteer Alberta. Volunteer Alberta is a provincial organization that works with volunteer centres and helps develop best practices for recruiting and retaining volunteers. "Who all volunteers?" she asks the audience. Many, if not all, hands went up. "We distinguish between formal and informal volunteering. Formal volunteering is a process with many checks and balances; informal volunteering is, for example, donating to charity or doing anything voluntarily

to better the community. Reasons for volunteering can be many; we found most people volunteer because of the social benefits, sometimes career and personal benefits (it looks good on your resume if you have volunteered), and mental and physical health benefits," she explains. What was interesting to hear was that the demographics of volunteering are changing. It used to be that older people were volunteering, but they seemed to burn out, and now younger people are volunteering. There are changes in motivations and expectations: where people would volunteer for "anything," the trend is now toward volunteering that aligns with an individual's values. Vicky emphasizes several critical components

the recruitment and retention of volunteers. "First of all, supervision and support are key. Keep your volunteers growing and developing. Anticipate volunteers' needs and debrief them on why they leave and their experiences. Another key element is engagement and recognition. Offer new training opportunities and new roles, and solicit feedback". One of the many questions is whether volunteers should be paid an honorarium. Some groups do that for volunteer positions that take up a substantial amount of time, such as club secretary. This group may discuss this at another time. Vicky's presentation shows that volunteering needs a group's attention and care;

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

The first celebration of the library's 65 years

Tracy Woloshyniuk, librarian of the Newbrook Public Library, recalls managing the library when it was located in the now-empty Newbrook School. She reminisced about the age and disrepair of the building and went so far as to call it scary. She commented that she would practically beg patrons to stay for a coffee so she wouldn't have to be alone. In the last year at that location, she would have a dozen buckets set out when it rained to collect all the water dripping in through the ceiling, the entire space smelling of mildew. This derelict ending began a journey of fundraising efforts and endless calls for donations and any means for a new building or any

new location to house Newbrook Library.

A cheerfully red building now, located next to Newbrook Hall & Grounds, is the product of those efforts. Tracy has made it her mission to make everything accessible through this library, just like a city library has to offer. With affordability issues, she may not have certain resources as part of their inventory, but she will always work to bring things in to borrow or use. Such items have included a 3D printer and a virtual reality system. Tracy motioned to the space and stated that this may be a small collection, but she will work to get you any library item you are looking for. Even though the collection is smaller than what you would find at a larger location, it still boasts not only books but Lego, board games, puzzles, movies and even a stationary bike to encourage physical literacy. The library also hosts a variety of events, including Halloween and Christmas parties, Lego clubs and even a lock your kids in the library event, which turned the library essentially into a fun escape room.

With so many businesses in this small community now closed, library" and it is evithe library has now become the hub of Newbrook. Tracy talked about one of her goals when she moved to this building: to create a big community living room. The success of her goal is evident. As patrons come and go, they sit in the welcoming chairs and stay for a visit instead of just grabbing books and running. A bank of café style booths line the back wall, and community members pop in to sit and chat and enjoy a cup of cof-Thursdays are luncheon days. For \$8, people can stop in from noon to 1 and sit down to a lunch prepared by the volunteer group, Friends of Newbrook Public Library Society.

Newbrook Library has become affectionately known as "the unquiet

dent that Tracy and all the patrons embrace that. With 2023 celebrating its 65th birthday, anyone is welcome to join them every 65 days for a small celebration and discussion highlighting ent e-resources. Rumour has it there will also be cake at each of these parties. "Because who doesn't like cake?" Tracy said. And the plans keep coming. In addition to working on bringing in speakers like horticulture instructors and Alberta health services, she also talks about the community garden they once had. She envisions a future with raised garden beds for local residents to use, perhaps an outdoor reading garden; a community living room that spills outside.

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



Coffee talk

A small group gathered at the Thorhild Library on March 9th for the second meeting of a free community program, Coffee Talk. Cindy Neumiller, Alberta Health Services Health Promotions Facilitator out of Westlock, spoke to the gathering about poison prevention, which typically affects children. Through information and trivia

games, she educated the group about proper storage of potential poisons, being mindful of look-a-likes (medication that appears to be candy) and being attentive to your own behavior with products that are harmful to children. Many poisoning situations involving cannabis and e-cigarettes often occur because children want to imitate what they are seeing. Neumiller

highlighted facts like the most frequent call Alberta's poison centre for children aged 0-5 is about acetaminophen or ibuprofen and to be attentive to items that are generally not looked upon as poisons, like mouthwash. "It's an expensive problem," Neumiller stated. "It costs 1.6 million dollars on our health care system every year for something that is preventable." She also informed those in attendance that PADIS (Poison & Drug Information Service) can



be accessed 24/7 at 1-800-332-1414.

Last month, the Coffee Talk program discussed fall prevention, cancer screening and other health services. The goal of this monthly program is to share messages about injury prevention. Majeau, who attended sessions, stated she the program

informative and a great way to find out about different health services and also a way to meet people in the community. Sue Marshall, who was also attending, added to Majeau's comment, saying that these programs are important and that there is a concern because of the poor attendance. She said we may lose things like this simply because not enough people show up. Next month we will discuss outdoor play and keeping children safe in those environments.

Ochre Park School has PreK/ **Kindergarten Open House**

Those interested in enrolling their children in the PreK or Kindergarten programs at Ochre Park School were invited to an open house in February.

The school's principal, Mr. Calvin Anhorn, vice principal Jenaia Gingras and Sturgeon Public School Board Director of Learning Shelley Greenwood were on hand to answer questions and provide a face to a name for parents.

Mrs. Tarra Larson, the PreK teacher at the school, presented details about what the program entails and how to apply for your child to be part of the program.

"Screening is required

program," explained Mrs. Larson. "The district begins screening in March, and children must be accompanied by a legal guardian."

Bookings for screenappointments can be made by calling the central office at 780-939-4341 ext. 1257. Children enter the program primarily because of a need for speech and language help or because of behavioural difficulties.

The PreK program is based on learning through play.

"We don't do worksheets because that isn't how a threeyear-old's works," said Mrs. Larson. "We nurture strengths and curiosities, and our number one goal is to create a relationship with your kiddo."

Children in

program have access to an array of specialists, including a speech and language practitioner, an occupational therapist, and an educational psychologist.

The kindergarten open house was presented by teacher Mrs. Geneva Fossen.

Children who attend kindergarten at Ochre Park are split into K1 and K2, with K1 attending on Mondays and Wednesdays and K2 on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Fridays alternate between the classes.

Similar to PreK, the program is structured to be child-centered and play-based, but Mrs. Fossen explained, "the new curriculum has quite a few skills that we have to expose the kids to."

After registering, before school begins in the fall, students will attend a staggered entry that consists of a couple of students.


"It eases some of the anxiety because when the children come back for their first full day, they will at least know a couple of other students," said Mrs. Fossen. Parents are notified of their child's staggered entry day in August.

Bussing is available for all students for morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up. There is, however, no midday bussing available for students in PreK who end their day at 11:20 a.m.

Children who were born in 2020 are eligible for junior PreK, while students born in 2019 can enter senior PreK. Those born in 2018 can enter kindergarten.



NATURAL GAS CARBON TAX INCREASE

The Alberta Carbon Tax is a federal program applied to any fuel that emits greenhouse gases, including transportation and heating fuels like diesel, gasoline, natural gas, and propane.

The carbon tax came into effect in 2020 and increases annually. In 2021, the Federal government announced an increase to the carbon tax annually at a rate of \$15 per tonne from 2023-2030. This translates to a carbon tax increase applied to natural gas from \$2.63 per gigajoule (GJ) to \$3.42 per gigajoule effective April 2023.


