Holy Family Catholic receiving new school

LAKELAND - Lakeland Catholic will be getting a new home for Holy Family Catholic School located in Waskatenau, after years of it remaining a top priority for the division.

A replacement school has been included in the 2023 provincial budget.

"We are thrilled to see our Waskatenau school included in this year's provincial school projects," said Board Chair Mary Anne Penner. "A new building is needed to support the growing enrollment and programming at Holy Family Catholic School, and this news is truly worth celebrating."

The current facility was built over several phases, with the main portion of the building constructed in the 1930's. Two expansions followed.

Over the years, Lakeland Catholic has maintained the building, while keeping the overall replacement of the school at the top of their priority list. Earlier this

year, the division met with Minister of Education Adriana LaGrange to emphasize the importance of this project.

"Our school population is continually growing, and we are looking forward to expanding the learning opportunities offered at Holy Family" school Principal Farrah Ollikka said. "Our entire school community is overjoyed."

"This is wonderful news for the Holy Family School community and our entire division. This project has been an urgent priority for Lakeland Catholic and we anticipate moving forward with next steps toward preparing for construction and planning for future learning at a brand new school facility" said Superintendent Pamela Guilbault.

A new display board is being created to honour the discovery and provide more information as to how important the discovery was. The theme for this year's Discovery Days will also reflect the important anniversary.

The museum is currently open on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m.- 3:00 p.m. for residents to explore the exhibits showcasing the town's history, as well as ask any questions of the knowledgeable volunteers.

Public Library. “We have mailed out invitations to influential past members of the library board and staff, as well as to strong supporters of our library.”

The open house event will include a scavenger hunt for children as well as a trivia contest for adults based on exhibits showcasing the library’s history that will be displayed. Volunteers at the Redwater Museum have been instrumental in finding and providing historical documents and photos to the library for the event. All of the displays will be up for the course of the week to give everyone a chance to come and see them.

As well as the museum, a number of other town organizations have stepped forward to help the library celebrate this anniversary. “Cupcakes for the event have been donated by IGA and coffee from Tim Hortons,” said Pruss.

The Town of Redwater has donated a gift basket as a prize, and Redwater Home Hardware has also donated prizes for the scavenger hunt and trivia contest.

“We also received \$300 from the Lions Club, that will be provided to the library as \$300 per year for three years,” explained Pruss. “This was the amount of the original contribution that the Lion’s Club made to start the library 70 years ago.”

Easter Farmers' Market in Smoky Lake

The Smoky Lake Farmers' Market runs from the first Saturday in April through to Christmas and then takes a break. This year's market started on April 1st, followed by the Easter market on April 8th from

10-12. "It was really busy, but by 11:15, it got quieter. I am just beginning with this and have sold a few items. Hopefully, it will pick up throughout the year," Mirian Paes says.

Mirian likes to crochet and knit and has knitted Easter bunnies, egg baskets,

toques, neck warmers and other items. The market is entirely volunteer-driven and approved by Alberta Agriculture. They follow the 80/20 rule: priority is given to home-produced items within Alberta. Out-of-province products fall within the 20% category, as

do resale products if space is available. This Easter market fills up the main hall at the Ag Complex, and the variety of vendors is impressive: from Ukrainian food and crafts to pet treats, from sausages and meat to Sock Junkies and Pampered Chef, to mention a few. There is a good balance between vendors with food items (in all its varieties) and non-food items (here, too, is a large variety). The market has a welcoming atmosphere with a musician playing the accordion. Although the season has just started, nothing beats good preparation, and they are already looking towards the Pumpkin Fair on October 7 and trying to attract vendors. The Pumpkin Fair market is the biggest market of the year, running from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., and in 2022, it was packed with vendors. Pat Flynn brings to everyone's attention the need to register early for the Pumpkin Fair Market. "There will be two locations, and there is transportation provided between the locations. Make sure you register on time to ensure you have a table", she announces. Before the Pumpkin Fair, many farmers markets will come to Smoky Lake.



Thorhild Ukrainian Dance Club looks back on 50 years

As the Ukrainian dance 2022-2023 season is coming to an end, members of the Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club (TUDC) are reflecting on what a momentous achievement it is to be celebrating their 50th anniversary. The Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club is one of the oldest Ukrainian dancing clubs and one of the first to be formed in north-eastern Alberta. Carefully handwritten documents mark the beginning of that first year, with the first list of executives penned by Alice Toronchuk, Rosemarie Wakaryk, Olga Dmytryk and Mrs. Habach responsible for the beginning of this amazing journey. The first dance instructors were Elaine Golka and Dennis Koshman, who would teach 37 students a skill and talent that would remain with them for the rest of their lives. Without a proper dance studio, the Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club began following their path, borrowing time in the gymnasium at Thorhild Central School. The documents of the meetings throughout the years are a piece of history themselves; every member and every club event are carefully preserved in these papers.

In addition to the club's success, years of dancing, competing, and awards they proudly display, they are also in possession of a piece of local, cherished historical art. In 1935, Elevation of the Precious Cross Church Hall, located in Egremont, AB, became a focus of the community and held dances and concerts and produced numerous plays as well as choir music. In 1937, L. D. Snaychuk was commissioned to paint a backdrop for the hall's stage. In 1975, the Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club was allowed to remove this backdrop from the hall and use it for their own performances. This backdrop became such an important piece of club

history, that in 1994, a huge fundraising mission was undertaken for the full restoration and a custom storage/display unit for the backdrop. The original estimated cost of the restoration was \$8500, with the estimated cost of the storage unit at \$2000. Luckily, they were able to receive \$5000 through the Alberta Historical Grant and a \$1500 grant from the County of Thorhild. A restoration committee was set up, and these volunteers spent countless hours writing letters and reaching out to people in an effort to make this all happen. This backdrop will be on display at their 50th year-end concert.

Volunteers and donations are at the heart of TUDC and why the club continues to succeed. Because it is volunteer-based, fees are kept at reasonable rates to keep it affordable. While one member recalls seeing her mother and grandmother gathered around the table sewing outfits and headpieces, the club has slowly transitioned to


purchasing costumes directly from Ukraine. This process has put less pressure on the families, and the costumes are now authentic. These purchased costumes are all hand-made, and the club has been building an inventory from them to represent different regions in the Ukraine. Even with the challenges of Covid and the Russia/Ukraine war, TUDC was still able to purchase costumes. While the costumes belong to the club, a group of volunteers work in what is affectionately known as "the closet" and make all the adjustments needed for the dancer that the costume is assigned to. Each dancer receives one costume for the year for a small rental fee and has it tailored to themselves. If they require more than one costume, the rental fees remain minimal.

Donations also play a pivotal role in the club. Without them, the Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club would not have had the ability to maintain itself. The Thorhild Agricultural Society maintains a low rental fee for the club; the upstairs of Thorhild

Agriplex is now their permanent dance studio. The low costs and ability to utilize the space as their own gave them the opportunity to also purchase their own dance floor for the space. However, donations are not always monetary. The time that dancers, parents, grandparents and community members have put into the organization is worth more than any price tag. Megan Paly-Alexander, current president of TUDC board, said she would love to start listing names of people who have contributed to the success and continuation of Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club, but it would be impossible. There would be people who were forgotten, and not one person deserves to be left out of the thanks for anything that they have done. You all know who you are, TUDC recognizes and appreciates all you have done. Long time Redwater resident Barry Stachniak chose the monthly dinner at the Pioneer Club to present a young mother and her family with a generous donation. Almost exactly one year after Stachniak had won the 50/50 draw at a fundraiser at the Pioneer Club, he presented those winnings to Olena Shevchenko, her mother Alina and her son Hlib.

"I've never won anything in my life," shared Stachniak. "For a whole year, it was really eating at me about this money; I didn't spend any of it."

Shevchenko and her family were forced from

their homes in Ukraine when the war started and they chose to make Redwater their home. Her husband has continued to live in Ukraine, but they are working to get the documents filed for him to join them in Canada.

"I'm Ukrainian myself, and I really felt that they deserved to have the money that I won," explained Stachniak.

The catalyst for the donation of the money happened when Barry saw Olena at The Hairport for a pedicure, where she's been working as a nail technician.

"We started talking, and he found out that I was expecting my husband from Ukraine, and

we would need furniture to move into an apartment," shared Shevchenko. "A few days later, he said that he had money that he wanted to give us officially. I had no idea that it was his personal money and not from a relief fund."

The young family is still looking for an apartment before they will be able to accept any donations of furniture, but they hope to be able to get fully settled into Redwater once Olena's husband is able to arrive.

"I am very grateful to Barry and everyone who has helped us," said Shevchenko. "There are very kind and good people here."
