Gardening with Galia

Redwater's Mayor's Breakfast returns and is enjoyed by many

The time for starting the garden is quickly approaching, and in preparation for that, seeds need to be started indoors. Galia Alexander from Warspite is

the go-to person to ask about starting plants, especially for organic gardening. On April 3, she hosted a workshop at the Smoky Lake Library, where participants learned about starting tomatoes and

peppers. "Tomatoes from your garden are so different in flavour from tomatoes you buy in the store," Galia explains. "The store-bought tomatoes are grown to last longer, to be picked early, they have to

withstand being transported, and they do not nearly have the flavour of homegrown tomatoes. You can choose to grow the fanciest tomatoes at home, the

The occasion marked the first Breakfast with the Mayor event that has been held in town since Covid, and

attendance exceeded organizer Jennifer Edworthy's expectations.

"I picked an arbitrary number of 100 guests I wanted to have for the event," explained Edworthy, Town of Redwater Community Services Supervisor. "And we are actually sitting at 120 people."

The breakfast event featured a number of speakers besides Mayor McRae, starting with Treena Lane, Town of Redwater Land Use/Economic Development

Dancers from Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club (TUDC) competed in Lloydminster on the weekend of March 25.

The Ukrainian Dancing on the Border Festival was adjudicated

by Vasyl Kanevets, a native of Kyiv, Ukraine, and featured dancing clubs from both Saskatchewan and Alberta competing.

Dancers from TUDC, under the instruction of Odessa Bahri and Jessie Balan, took home two silver and

two gold medals in the competition.

"Group three earned a gold medal in the Polissian and a silver medal in the Poltavski," shared Chelsea Anaka, spokesperson for the TUDC. "Group four also earned a silver medal in the

Poltavski and a gold in the Transcarpathian."

With the next festival not until May, dancers have turned their attention to the dance club's 50th anniversary event on April 29.

Thorhild Ukrainian Dancing Club was formed in 1973, and

was one of the first Ukrainian Dancing Clubs in Northeastern Alberta.

"We are wanting to recognize this milestone of the club with an impressive 50th anniversary celebration," said Anaka.

The event, which

will be held at Pembina Place in Redwater, will showcase both past and present dancers, and include performances by Volya Ukrainian Dance Ensemble and live music by Millenia. A dinner will also be served at the event.

ones that taste best. And start them early, grow them in a deep (5-gallon) pail.” Galia is very knowledgeable. She is building a small market garden in Warspite with her partner, Chris. Her garden will be no-till, where the soil structure is not disrupted. The market garden will also be a learning place for people wanting to grow their own garden, as Galia is always open to questions. She will teach about no-till gardening on Seedy Saturday, April 22, at the Smoky Lake Complex. For this workshop, she supplies all that is needed at no cost: potting soil, seeds and little containers to grow the seeds in, with a variety of tomato and pepper seeds to choose from. Growing plants from seeds can be challenging. “Ensure your soil is damp but not too wet, or your seeds will rot. Please place them in a spot with plenty of sun. Once they start growing, keep an eye on them. If the plants grow long stakes, very thin and tilted towards the window, that is a sign that they don’t get enough sun”, Galia teaches. Her workshop is fun and inspiring, and the 15 participants are eager to start. With six weeks to go until the end of May, the usual time to plant outside, there is some preparation to do. Watching the plants grow is a fun part of the process. “Tomato and pepper plants cannot handle frost. So if you plant them in a pail, you can harden them by putting them outside during the day and bringing them in at night. Once the frost is gone, you can leave them outside”, Galia says. She also gives several other tips for maintaining the plants and storing the fruit (tomatoes and peppers are fruits) so they will last for months. All participants went home with twelve tomato seeds in little pots and twelve pepper seeds—a good start for gardening season.

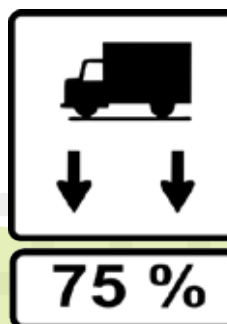

Officer. Members of the audience listened aptly as Lane provided a brief update on the town's land use planning.

"The land use bylaw was last reviewed in 2013, so we are doing a complete overhaul. One of the primary changes is a focus on red tape reduction."

The next speaker was Sean Collins, the CEO of Varme, an Edmonton-based company

that is a subsidiary of Green Transition Holding in Norway. Varme's inclusion in the event was as a newly incorporated business with plans for the Industrial Heartland just south of Redwater.

"We are working to create a waste-to-energy plant that integrates carbon capture close to Redwater," shared Collins. "We are really excited to turn waste into something useful, and we hope to

break ground by the end of the year."

As the business speakers finished, Metis Elder Garry Gairdner came to the stage for a presentation on Metis culture. His interesting story was followed by a traditional Indigenous story told through dance by brothers Boomer and Noble Keewatin. The Fort Saskatchewan Multicultural Association was recognized for connecting event organizers with these two presenters.

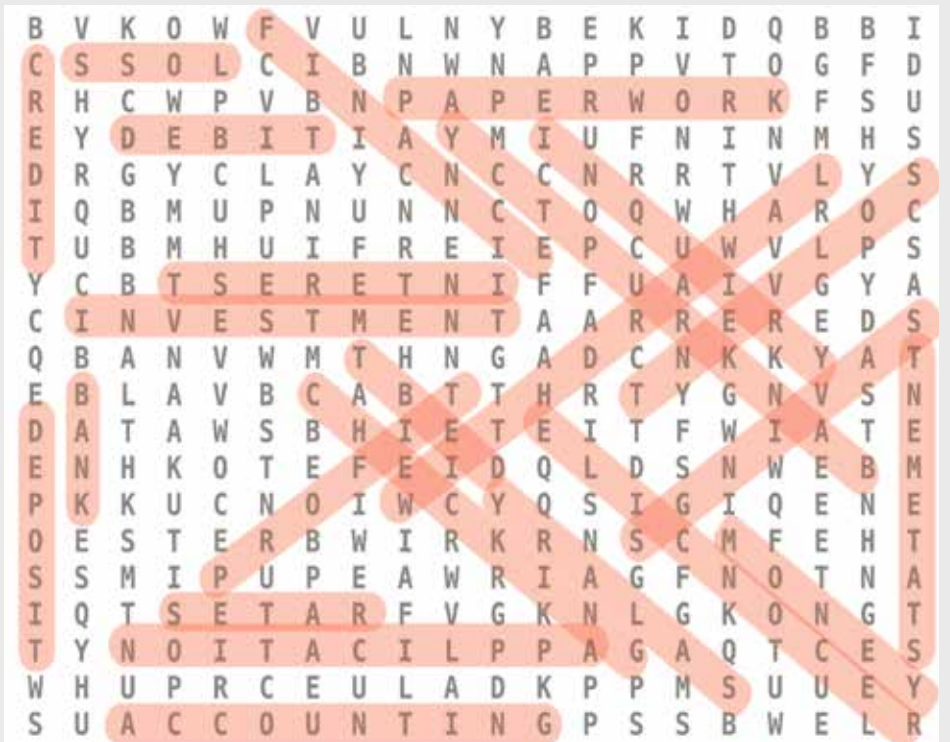

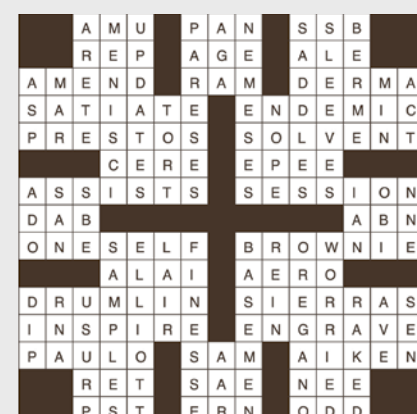

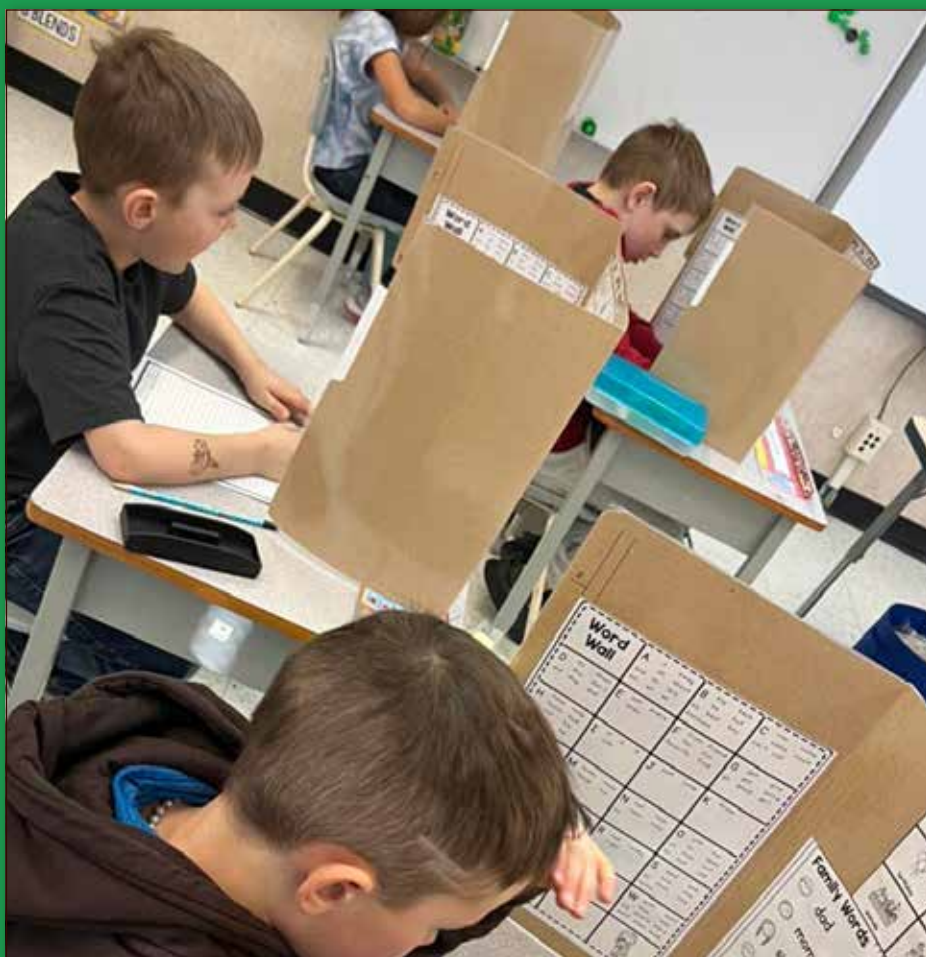
