

Music students perform at Winspear Centre

Band and choir students from Redwater and Ochre Park Schools took over the Winspear Centre on Monday, April 24. The students joined band and choir members from schools across the Sturgeon Public School Board to perform in the 43rd annual Sturgeon Night of Music and Fine Arts.

The event featured collaborative performances by bands and choirs and displayed select pieces of art created by students in the lobby for all to enjoy. The event was hosted by Sturgeon Public Schools Superintendent Shawna Warren, and she was quick to share the joy felt by all in attendance at being able to hold the event after a hiatus due to Covid.

"What you have seen with the art show in the lobby and what you are about to see on the stage is a culmination of a great deal of work by students and teachers," Warren shared in her opening address to the audience.

The evening consisted of 16 performances, of which students from Redwater School and Ochre Park School performed nine.

"What is great about the Sturgeon Night of Music (SNOM) is that students get to perform with other students in the division, so they hear other voices and instruments that are not just from their classes or school and perform with bigger groups as well.

The greatest part of SNOM is getting to perform on the Winspear stage, which has amazing acoustics, so our songs sound very different than just performing in our school gym. The ability to combine our instruments and voices with more than just our school is something unique," shared Redwater School Music Director Terra Beth Dowhaluk.

"Students benefrom practicing and performing with students from other schools so much," added Jason Booker, Music Director at Ochre Park School. "It gives them a chance to hear other voices and learn together. It's also really great for kids to work with other music teachers and choir directors. We all benefit from each other's knowledge and draw from each other's energy and passion for music."

Redwater School is privileged to have an exceptional music program, and students performed at the event at the junior high, high school and honor band levels. This was the first year that the high school band was able to collaborate with the Sturgeon Composite High School band class, and together the ensemble performed three arrangements to close out the night of music.

"Many rural schools do not have band programs as they are expensive to run and keep going, but band is more than just students

playing instruments in a group," explained Dowhaluk.

Students in the junior high band are also able to attend a music camp in March, where they are able to work with master musicians, play as a mass band, and enjoy the fun of camp.

A 50/50 raffle was held during the event to help raise money for music programs at schools across the Sturgeon Public School Board, and it was announced that the raffle sold out before the end of the event.

Participants do not need a landfill permit for this free event, and the event is open to the entire Sturgeon County Region, regardless of where participants live.

"Until our new facility opens in 2024, Household Hazardous Wastes are not accepted at Roseridge. We ask that residents safely store their household hazardous waste on their property for these regional events, where they can dispose of them for free. These events help us keep these items out of the landfill."

Roseridge currently holds a spring and fall event. The second event of 2023 is planned for Gibbons in the fall.

"Roseridge has taken on this role from the municipalities to support a regional effort and collaboration," Berry said. "Rather than each of the municipalities duplicating the service and offering it on their own, we're doing it on behalf of the entire region."

Household hazardous waste products include, but are not limited to: acetone, ant/wasp spray, barbeque starters, antifreeze, car waxes and polishes, glues, hair colouring, aerosol hair spray, nail polish remover, paint thinners, rechargeable batteries, shoe polish, spa and pool chemicals, weed killers and windshield washer solutions.

Household cleaners regarded as household hazardous waste include abrasive cleaners, aerosol air fresheners, all-purpose cleaners, ammonia, bleach, disinfectants, drain cleaners, fabric softeners, glass cleaners, laundry starch, laundry stain removers, mildew removers, oven cleaners, rug and upholstery cleaners, toilet cleaners, and tub and tile cleaners.

"If you are unsure, bring it," Berry said, noting the default should be to bring everything.

In addition to the household hazardous waste, the event will include an electronics roundup where they will accept anything with a plug, from old hair dryers to television sets.

The Prospects Hockey Club will also collect automotive batteries to fund their program during the event.

Barry and the Commission hope for another successful event and encourage the area's residents to come out regardless of whether they live in Morinville, Redwater or anywhere throughout Sturgeon County.

"It's completely free. It's convenient. It's in town. Stop in and bring it, even if you have one or two items," Barry said. "Bring those one or two items and keep them out of the landfill."

Roseridge Landfill Commission is a regional partnership between Bon Accord, Gibbons, Legal, Morinville, Sturgeon County, and Redwater.







FIRE RESTRICTION NOW IN EFFECT Effective April 27, 2023 at 1:00 p.m.



Thorhild County has issued a Fire Restriction. All outstanding fire permits are hereby cancelled. With the dry conditions, cured dry grass becoming more prominent and lack of moisture the fire hazard is high at this time.

Anyone who has conducted permitted burns during the winter is reminded to check their burn sites to ensure they are completely extinguished.

Thorhild County urges everyone to use extreme caution when working or driving in grassy areas and be mindful of debris collecting on hot exhaust which can heat up, fall to the ground, and start a wildfire.

Fines for starting a fire during a Fire Advisory, Fire Restriction or Fire Ban are outlined in Bylaw 10-2022 Schedule "B."

The following activities are prohibited:

- Any fire requiring a Fire Permit
- Burn Barrels and Incinerators
- Recreational fires and backyard fire pits
- Campfires on public or private campgrounds

The following are allowed to be used with caution:

- Propane and natural gas-powered appliances
- Charcoal barbeques



Residents Thorhild County may have noticed a substantial number of vehicles parked outside the county office on the morning of April 24th. Regular council meetings occur on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month and are open to the public. The agendas and recordings for these meetings can be found on the Thorhild County website. A regular council meeting was the reason residents filled the council chambers. One county resident had requested an appearance before council and many members of the community showed up in support or concern over the issue he was to be presenting.

Under the Emergency Services Bylaw

for Thorhild County, when the Emergency Services Department has taken action to provide emergency services, charges will apply to the owner, occupant, or person for these services. The invoices for such services are to be paid within 30 days and are subject to interest rates and civil action if the amount remains unpaid. In August of 2022, Thorhild County released the results of a survey that had been completed by seventy-two respondents that was done in an effort to look at options to recover costs of emergency services. The purpose of this survey was to use the results to create an effective emergency service bylaw.

The concern brought forth by the county resident addressing

council was the actual cost of these services. Recently, a building on his property burned down and he received an invoice for almost \$80,000: shortly after, he received another one for approximately \$8,000. The concern he presented to council was the comparison of emergency service rates with other counties in the area and how much higher Thorhild County appeared to be. He continued to ask how the billing works if residents of the county are aware of the costs that can be accrued, and the concern that residents may refuse emergency services if they are afraid of the cost that might be waiting for them after help is provided. He also questioned the validity of what emergency services were dispatched

to his property and if they were all necessary. He stated how devastating this could be to some people and how a bill this size could cost someone everything they had worked to build in this community.

Council acknowledged his concerns and has allowed him 60 days to gather more information and evidence to present. A situation such as this reminds all county residents to familiarize themselves with all county bylaws and be aware of what is going on within their community. Attention and time are required of all individuals to ensure as much input and accurate information as possible are being received and presented. Ask the questions. Ensure a full understanding of what is going on.







came out, even from as far away as Fort Saskatchewan and St. Albert. Among them were other Lions from Smoky Lake and South Edmonton. Brenda started with some standard phrases often heard among long-time volunteers: "If you want it done right, you better do it yourself; by the time I've explained how to do it, I might as well do it myself; that's not the way we've always done it." It is obvious what she is aiming at: "We get set in our ways. We volunteer because our parents did, we feel guilty if we don't, or we do it out of duty. Others may find it hard to work with us, but that doesn't mean they don't want to do it", Brenda explains. "One of the things that have changed is how we communicate. It used to be like, everything

is fine if you don't hear anything. But now people want feedback, a pat on the back; they want to be asked, invited, encouraged and rewarded. Feedback is important for volunteer recruitment, retention and motivation. And the praise has to be in public. Nowadays, people volunteer because they want to be recognized and appreciated". Brenda has a rich experience to draw from. She is not a spring chicken herself, so she feels comfortable pointing out where the "older" population misses the right communication with younger generations to attract volunteers. And she has some great ideas to attract young volunteers: "Baby boomers believe in hard work; the younger generation believes in smart work. If you want young people to volunteer, delegate the responsibilities and

let them organize themselves. Get a group, such as a grade 11 or 4-H". She gives an example of an event where two grumpy seniors arranged the parking. No one was happy with them. Then a group of youngsters took over and did it their way, which was entirely different from how it was done before, but they organized themselves, and the place ran very smoothly. "Young people do not work for us; they work with us, and that is how they want it. Engage and involve them. Give them feedback and make an effort to see things their way." Her presentation is helpful and entertaining and often brings laughter to the audience. After two hours, participants go home with a wealth of ideas to attract volunteers and keep their clubs alive.


