From near and far, visitors came to Métis Crossing to celebrate the Métis culture and history. It was a place to gather, share stories and experience the vibrant culture. "Im excited to see the community gather once again. Please take time to connect and participate in our beautiful

Nation of Alberta (MNA) President Audrey Poitras said in her welcoming address. That is precisely what the roughly 1800 visitors did. They visited each other and enjoyed the music of various musicians throughout the day. Apart from the meal, the podium with the musicians may have been the most prominent attraction. The dance floor quickly filled up for the jigging competition, while

entertained the audience with his music during dinner. The audience was treated to a free dinner of bison meat with vegetables, potatoes, salad, and dessert. No one needed to leave hungry. 



COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS JULY 11, 2023

Below is a brief summary of decisions and discussions at the July 11, 2023, Regular Council meeting:

Bylaw 11-2023: Repeal Bylaw 1031-2002

At the June 27, 2023 Council meeting, Bylaw 11-2023 received First and Second Readings. Council passed the Third Reading for Bylaw 11-2023, which cancels part of the Community Reserve Park within SW 23-63-19-W4M.

Public Hearing: Bylaw 09-2023 To Amend Section 8.2 of the Land Use Bylaw

On June 13, 2023, Council approved First Reading for proposed Bylaw 09-2023 to add a text amendment to the AG - Agricultural land use district of Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015. Prior to considering Second and Third Readings for Bylaw 09-2023 Council held a public hearing. After the public hearing closed, Council gave Bylaw 09-2023 Second and Third Readings.

Appointment of Auctioneer for the 2023 Public Auction

Council directed Administration to contact third party auctioneers for the 2023 Public Auction and bring back the list of potential candidates and their fees to the July 25, 2023 Council meeting.

Policy 606 - Community and Recreational Service Fees

Council approved the amendment to the swimming pool fees in Policy 606 as follows:

Bronze Medallion - \$125.00 Bronze Cross - \$140.00

Bronze Medallion/Cross Combination Course - \$225.00

Notice of Motion - Informational Document

Councillor Janine Paly provided a Notice of Motion that the County explore the potential of a partnership with Aspen View Public Schools to create an informational document on the Family School Liaison Program. By way of the Notice of Motion, the matter will be automatically included in the next Regular Council meeting agenda.

Government of Alberta Rangeland/Watershed Programs

Council directed that correspondence from the Government of Alberta regarding a Rangeland Sustainability Program and Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program be referred to the County's Agricultural Service Board.

Radway Post Office

Council directed Administration to submit the Radway Post Office survey to the Radway Post Office



Thorhild resident to celebrate 100th birthday

Mr. Steve Kolach of Thorhild, Alberta will be celebrating his 100th Birthday on July 28. Time does not drag for Steve because he is able to walk unaided, his hearing is good, his memory is excellent, and he doesn't look like a 100-year-old man. Even his doctor is amazed.

Steve's story began on July 28, 1923, on the family farm at SE 22-59-24-W4 in Thorhild, Alberta. Steve was the youngest of five children born to Andrew and Katherine Kolach. Steve's father passed away prior to his birth and his mother married Safron Budney in 1924. They had four children.

Life on the farm was one big struggle. It was bad enough fighting the elements: frost, ground and bushfires, mosquitoes, dust storms, drought, hail, and harness thieves, but then came the Depression. The year 1933 brought the worst hailstorm that set the family back another ten years.

At the age of seven, Steve began his schooling at the brand-new Ingleside school, two and a half miles away and in grade nine, he became janitor of the school for \$15.00/ month. Steve completed grade eleven but regretted that he had to quit school to man the farm with the start of the war.

At the age of 15, Steve purchased a saxophone for \$60.00 with borrowed funds and with a lifelong friend, they started an orchestra called the "Silvertones". In 1949, a new band

called the "All Stars" was formed, which was followed by the "Rocky Ramblers" in 1955. Although Steve gave up the band life in 1957, he has never lost his love for music, still serenading his family on special occasions via saxophone or singing at social functions.

Steve met his wife Pauline (nee Zibrowski) in 1955, by accident, on a trip to buy a chocolate bar. They were married on August 4, 1956, and will soon be celebrating 67 years of marriage. They were blessed with two daughters, Karen and Shelley.

Steve ran the Searle elevator for 17 years until he purchased Thorhild Feed Services in 1968. With Steve as the operator, Pauline as the bookkeeper, and a hired hand, they ran the business until he had enough of the grain dust. They sold the business in 1979 and at the age of 56 Steve retired. Steve was never

one to sit still, and he has many interests that continue to keep him busy and active. Steve has always been very involved in his community, and he served on the Thorhild Village Council for six years, and was Deputy Mayor for one year. He was a Volunteer Firefighter for over 30 years, and was President of the Thorhild Community Association twice. President of the Holy Eucharist Ukrainian Church Catholic and President of the Seniors Drop-In Center for 15 years. Just last year Steve

served as a banker at two AGLC charitable bingo events in support of the community. Most recently Steve was presentthe Queen's Platinum Jubilee Award in recognition of his many years of volunteer service in the community. Steve is also a 69year member of the Thorhild Lions Club and was honoured with the Melvin Jones Fellowship last year. Steve looks forward to weekly Bingo at the Thorhild Golden Age Drop-In Centre, monthly trips to Edmonton on the Thorhild County bus and spending time with family and friends.

Steve and Pauline have lived in the same home for over 55 years and have nurtured a large garden their entire married life. They have been fortunate to be able to travel to Hawaii and Mexico numerous times; Europe, Asia, Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji; cruises to Alaska, the Panama Canal and the Caribbean; as well as trips throughout the U.S.A. and Canada.


So, what is the secret to live to 100? Steve says it's due to Pauline's good home cooking, keeping a positive attitude, his zest for living, conlearning, tinuous surrounding yourself with good friends and family and it helps that he got some good genes from his mother - she lived to 96. All in all, Steve is still going strong. His family and friends so much enjoy his company, story-telling and warm sense of humour.

"We started organizing in January and have been very busy getting sponsors and setting everything up. Registrations filled up in a few hours; some were on the waitlist. Some people cancelled within the past few days, so we were happy accommodating some people on that list". A look at the list of participants showed a high number of PeeWees under 11. Three tips to help disaster proof your home



(NC) Extreme weather events are becoming more frequent and more intense across the country. That's according to data from Public Safety Canada, which also found that the most common events are floods, forest fires, earthquakes, thunderstorms, hurricanes and winter storms.

No one wants to go though one of these, but some of us will. Here are some tips to help protect against the worst of the damage affecting you, your family and your property so you make it through unscathed.

1. Know the risks to your home

The more you know about what might occur in your area, the better you can prepare. Risks differ from region to region. To get an idea, consider how your geography affects you: For instance, homes next to the Atlantic Ocean may be at risk for hurricanes, the West Coast has earthquakes to consider, and central Canada might focus on what to do in

a white out. Find out if you live in a flood plain and consider historical weather events that have passed through your region.

2. Make a plan just in case

An emergency plan is a crucial step to prepare your home and family for the unexpected. In it, you should include safe meeting places, important information like insurance details contact information for friends and family. Also note your home's emergency exit routes, the location of at least one emergency kit, and any important steps and reminders for when a disaster occurs.

3. Ready your physical space

In addition to creating an emergency plan, take steps to help make your home more resilient:

- Take care of landscaping and cut back any dead branches.
- Store important documents above floor level, and not

- in the basement.
- Keep heavier items on lower levels of shelves.
- Use surge protectors to prevent power surges when electricity comes back on after an outage.
- Fix cracks, gaps and leaks promptly.
- Ensure landscaping grades away from the home and downspouts point away from the foundation.
- Consider adding backup power if you use a sump pump.
- Consider installing backflow valves for toilets and drains.
- Install weatherstripping around doors and windows.
- Consider durable or fireproof materials such as insulated concrete forms if you are remodelling.
- Store an emergency kit on the premises with supplies to get you through several days.

Wildfire smoke and summertime smog lead to higher Air Quality Health Index (AHQI) ratings from April to June 2023

From April through June 2023, Fort Air Partnership (FAP) recorded 12,716 hours of air monitoring data for use in calculating the Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) at seven stations in our Airshed.

Summary Exceedances

There were one-hour exceedances of the Alberta Ambient Air Quality Objectives (AAAQO) and 88 exceedances of the 24-hour objective in the second quarter of 2023.

The increased number of high and veryhigh-risk AOHI hours resulted from wildfire smoke and summertime smog in the FAP Airshed. Wildfire smoke increased the amount of fine particulate matter in our Airshed. especially from May 16-25 and

June 8-14, but also on June 2-3 and June 16. Regional meteorological conditions (which led to smog formation) resulted in a 24hour fine particulate matter exceedance on April 1.

were 494 There one-hour exceedances of fine particulate matter caused by wildfire smoke. There were also 46 onehour exceedances of ozone levels caused by wildfire smoke and/or summertime smog, three onehour exceedances of benzene with an undetermined source, and one one-hour exceedance of hydrogen sulphide with an undetermined source.

Air quality measurements are compared continuously to both one and 24-hour AAAQOs. An exceedance of an AAAQO is reported to the Alberta Government, and the likely cause of the exceedance is investigated.



Redwater RCMP arrest and charge male for arson

Redwater, Alta. - On July 2, 2023, at approximately 5 p.m., Redwater RCMP responded to a Redwater residence in response to a report of an intoxicated person who was causing a disturbance. During the course of the investigation, the suspect was located outside an area business and arrested for theft in relation to the disturbance. During the arrest, a fire was observed at the adjacent building, and police were approached by witnesses who advised that the arrested suspect was responsible for the fire.

Bank of Canada betting on slower growth

Last week's Bank of Canada interest rate decision—a 0.25 percentage point increase to 5%—was accompanied by a fresh set of growth projections for the Canadian economy. The Bank does this every second rate announcement, or once a quarter.

According to the July edition of the Monetary Policy Report (MPR), Canada's economy has been outperforming the Bank's expectations. Consumers, in particular, have been resilient spenders in the face of higher interest rates. Projected real GDP growth in 2023 was revised up to 1.8% (from 1.4% in April) thanks to a stronger-than-expected first half of the year.

The Bank expects consumers will slow their spending while exporters face weaker demand over the next year. As such, growth will moderate to an average of about 1% over the second half of 2023 and first half of 2024.

In other words, the forecast

is for sluggish growth over the next 12 months, but thankfully not an outright recession.

On an annual basis, the Bank expects the Canadian economy to expand by 1.2% next year.

These low numbers will, if things go as expected, be followed by a healthier annual growth rate in 2025 of around 2.4% (the 10-year average set before the pandemic was 2.3%).

At 1.8%, the Bank of Canada's forecast for US economic growth in 2023 is the same as Canada's, but this will be followed by an anemic 0.6% in 2024 and only 1.4% in 2025.

It's a similar story for the global economy, with growth slowing next year as tight monetary policy restricts demand followed by an uptick in 2025 as the negative effects of higher interest rates wane. **12** www.theredwaterreview.com Wednesday July 19, 2023

Family Resource Network Coordinator Tammy Kuefler mentioned a small response to the beginning of this summer program but was delighted with the influx of last-minute registrations for the July 12 activity; many of the families attending were joining this particular program for the first time.

Families packed up picnic lunches, sand toys, swimsuits and any beach paraphernalia they could think of and joined each other for a day at the lake. This is not the first time Thorhild County Family Centre has offered this program. For many years, they have utilized this small piece of paradise so close to home. The relaxed environment, with all the amenities you need, provides the perfect atmosphere for families to come together and meet

new people. The picnic & play program is not just from the conneca chance to hang tivity. Parents are out. It facilitates a safe place for children to meet new friends. isolated or alone. It provides something each family needs; the needs are not always apparent, but they find themselves leaving with something personal that they did not realize they were missing. It provides a mini-vacation in a world that is often overwrought with stress and anxiety. It gives families a chance to strengthen their own relationships by doing something together without the distractions of reality.

Children and parents flow from activities and groups, sometimes largely together, at other times one-on-one. Kuefler noted that it doesn't seem to matter how many families attend, whether it is a huge turnout (approximately 45 individuals was the largest to date) or only a couple of families. She notices that each individual gains something getting to open up about frustrations and dreams, or enjoying the simplicity of nothing conversations. Quiet children may play contently with other quiet ones, or they may who draws them into the chaos of play that often comes with freedom, water and sand.

Picnic & Play is a program that strives to build and maintain happy and healthy relationships. It is not about how many people attend. While more is generally merrier and more are always welcome, the overall outcome and purpose is to bring people together. Sometimes two families may have an easier time connecting than a group of ten families. Many parents in attendance commented about how happy they were that they decided to attend. They had a chance to be drawn out and reunite or meet someone new. The comment was also made that they were amazed none of the children were fighting or arguing; the games and sharing of toys came naturally and without coaxing.

The day would not have been complete without screams of excitement and pure childhood joy. "Look at the leeches I found!" "I caught minnows!" "Mom, I need a bigger pail!" "The butterfly landed right on my ball!" "Come see!"

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
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
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
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
