



Smoky Lake Lions Club hosts swimming lessons

For 50 years, the Smoky Lake Lions Club has been hosting swimming lessons at Hanmore Lake. This year, the lessons were held from July 17-21. These swimming lessons are for children ages 0-12, and there is always huge interest from the wider region. "There is more demand than we can meet, so we have to select," Lion Dennis Jonker, president of the Smoky Lake Lions Club and the swimming lesson organizer, says. "Our Lions Club funds these lessons; we only ask for a \$10 registration fee. We are restricted in the number of children we can have here, first by the size of the lake and then by the number of instructors we can get.



New member added to Asia-Pacific free trade bloc

It still needs to be ratified, but the United Kingdom has formally agreed to join the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP).

Canada is a full member of the free trade bloc along with Australia, Brunei Darussalam, Chile, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, Singapore, and Vietnam.

With a combined GDPin2022ofUS\$14.6 trillion (including the UK), the CPTPP is one of the world's largest free trade zones.

The UK will be the first European country to join the CPTPP and the first new member since its formation in 2018.

The Asia-Pacific region is expected to be home to about half the world's middle-class consumers by 2035.

In 2022, Alberta exported \$8.7 billion worth of goods to CPTPP countries representing about 4% of our total merchandise exports. If we exclude the US, exports into the CPTPP zone accounted for 40% of

Alberta's exports in 2022.

Free trade agreements are not panaceas (ongoing barriers to Canadian beef and pork exports to the UK are a case in point), but as a major exporter, Alberta's economy benefits from Canada's participation in agreements that reduce barriers to the international flow of goods and services.

Alberta consumers also benefit from free trade agreements to the degree to which they reduce the costs of imported goods and services.

They are also stewards of several natural areas. This piece of land is nestled among Halfmoon the Lake Natural Area, Ghost Horse Hills Conservation Area and borders the Pioneer Trail North Foundation property. These properties work hand in hand to create an unbeoutdoor lievable space that invites people to cherish and embrace the freedom of the natural world.

On July 22, the Rainbow Equitation Society (RES) invited its members to a Summer Social. The event was the first in many years and was organized to encourage awareness of what they had to offer and a chance to meet new people and mingle for a day. The property has become a place where visitors know they have safety. peace, and a special quietness to attune to nature. No dogs are allowed off leash, and absolutely no-offroad vehicles are allowed, providing a safe place to work with horses or collect your thoughts as vou venture through over 5 kilometres of volunteer-maintained trails. The UniversityofAlberta **Biology** Department also monitors sites in the natural area for plant and animal diversity. Biologists from the Edmonton Native Plant Society monitor and keep


these areas as well; many of them may be rare or endangered. Across from the RES property, NAIT survey students are brought out to look at old survey mounds that are apparently hard to find now.

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS JULY 25, 2023

Below is a brief summary of decisions and discussions at the July 25, 2023, Regular Council meeting:

Delegation: RCMP Redwater Detachment

Sgt. Jeff Sehn presented an update on the Redwater RCMP Detachment Annual Priority Plan. Council accepted the presentation for information, and directed Administration to contact the Alberta Ministry of Health for a meeting with the Minister of Health at the Rural Municipalities of Alberta Fall Convention for discussions about mental health, and Alberta Transportation and RCMP K-Division to discuss highway concerns.

Delegation: Associated Engineering - Opal Road Drainage

A representative from Associated Engineering presented information on the drainage on a section of Opal Road. Council accepted the presentation for information and directed Administration to refer the matter to the CAO Budget Planning Session for 2024.

Emergency Services Survey Results

Council directed Administration to make amendments to the Emergency Services Bylaw 10-2022 based on the survey results, to include no charges to ratepayers for fire responses in the County.

Egremont Community Club Request

The Egremont Community Club previously requested Thorhild County return a parcel of land to the Club that was taken for tax notification in 1990. Council directed Administration to respond to the Egremont Community Club that Thorhild County considers this matter closed.

Appointment of Auctioneer for the 2023 Public Auction

Administration presented options for an auctioneer for the 2023 Public Auction to be held on August 8, 2023. Council appointed Auctioneer #3 as listed in the report to Council.

Rural Renewal Stream - Community Designation

Council previously directed Administration to proceed with the application to the Alberta Immigration Program Rural Renewal Stream Community Designation. Administration recommended that the County reach out to the community to see if there are businesses that require foreign workers and are willing to fully participate in the Rural Renewal Stream requirements. Council supported the recommendation.

Potential Partnership with Aspen View Public Schools

Council directed Administration to contact Aspen View Public Schools to inquire about collaborating on a document on a Family School Liason Program.

Emergency Services Incident Command Trailer

Council approved the purchase of an Incident Command Trailer with \$53,500 to come from sponsorship and \$3,597 to come from Emergency Services Capital Reserves.

Notice of Motion - Municipal Development Plan (MDP)

Councillor Trevor Dafoe provided a Notice of Motion as follows: 'Whereas the MGA requires the Municipal Development Plan to be kept current and it was last reviewed eight years ago. Whereas the MGA states that municipalities under 3,500 residents do not require an MDP. Be it resolved that Council consider whether to a) rescind the MDP, b) review and update the MDP and determine what costs may be incurred.'

Responses to County Council's Survey on the Emergency Services Bylaw

As a result of discussions at a town hall meeting on May 30, 2023, a survey was mailed to all County property owners to gather input on charges related to emergency services. In total, 2,648 surveys were mailed out, and as of the survey deadline of July 14, 2023, 850 responses were received.

NOXIOUS WEED WATCH

Several noxious weeds have been identified throughout the County. Noxious weeds are very invasive and spread very quickly, so due diligence with early control is key. If you see any of the following or are unsure about identification of a plant, please contact the Agricultural Services staff at 780-398-3977 ext. 3974.



Yellow Toadflax

<u>Provincial Designation:</u> Noxious Yellow toadflax grows up to 80 cm in height

by a creeping root system. Flowers are light yellow with an orange spot on its lower lip, like a snapdragon. It has long, slim, light green leaves.

Control

<u>Grazing:</u> Pasture invasions flourish because the plant is not palatable to livestock.

<u>Mechanical:</u> Thorough hand-pulling can be effective in soft soils where the roots can be removed easily. Repetition is required to deplete the seed bank and all root pieces. Mowing can assist by starving the roots.

Chemical: acid, Acetic Amitrole, Dichlorprop, Diuron, Glyphosate, Hexazinone, Imazapyr, MCPA, Metsulfuron-methyl, Picloram and Tribenuron-methyl & Thifensulfuron-methyl (in a product mix) are registered for use on toadflax. Always check product labels to ensure the herbicide is registered for use on the target plant in Canada by the Pest Management Regulatory Agency. Always read and follow label directions.



Orange Hawkweed

<u>Provincial Designation:</u> Prohibited Noxious Orange hawkweed grows from 30-60 cm in height with a hairy stem, that contains a milky fluid when broken open. Flowers are a bright orange-red cluster at the top. Leaves are bristly-hairy with few to no leaves being found on the stem.

Control

<u>Grazing:</u> Unknown. Invasive plants should never be considered as forage.

<u>Mechanical:</u> Mowing before flowering will prevent seed production of taller plants but will not inhibit reproduction via stolons and rhizomes. Hand digging of small infestations where all stolons and root can be removed may be effective. Root fragments can generate new plants, therefore any mechanical tilling/cultivation would be ineffective.

<u>Chemical:</u> Hexazinone, 2,4-D, and glyphosate are registered for use on Hieracium spp./ hawkweeds. Always check product labels to ensure the herbicide is registered for use on the target plant in Canada by the Pesticide Management Regulatory Agency.
