









Tracking the universe and history

Newbrook Observatory was established in the early 1950s because of the collaboration tween the US and Canada and their efforts to understand the upper atmosphere through meteor studies. While the scientific theories behind the studies are intriguing, that is another story entirely. What makes Newbrook Observatory fascinating is its historical significance and the impact it had on the space community. A tiny spot on the map was chosen for this site simply because the Federal Government already leasing land in this area and Western Canada was recognized for

its dark skies. Art Griffin, a scientist from Ontario. became the principal scientist in 1952 with the initial opening of the observatory. For the first four years, he studied the heavens, sparkling with untold secrets, and documented his results. Merging his information with the findings of other records helped to give the world a glimpse into the astonishing unknowns of space. What was out there? The nights were long, and the winters were difficult. However, the space was equipped with Meteor Camera, outdoor cameras,

and an excess of other state-of-theart research equipment. These amenities made the life of a passionate scientist comfortable and fulfilling as they embraced an occupation that at that time was so rare. The observatory was designed so that the room housing the camera had a roof that could be completely unhinged and pulled open to reveal the beauty of the darkness above, and the main office space was built with a glass dome to allow comfortable viewing in any weather. The world's fas-

cination with space

grew. The Cold War fueled a political battle between the United States and the Soviet Union to become technological leaders. America was scrambling in its desire to be the first country to launch into space. With aspirations and experimentation, they were dealt Historical Society a crushing blow on and October 4, 1957. The Soviet Union had successfully launched a satellite into the Earth's orbit. This accomplishment was met with a mix of emotions around the world. So, what does this have to do with Art Griffin, tucked away in a tiny observatory in Newbrook, Alberta? On the morning of October 9, 1957, Griffin the Super-Schmidt spotted a thin line of light moving across the sky and,



utilizing the outdoor cameras, caught the first image in North America of Sputnik. The Soviet Union had not been deceiving the world. Griffin had captured actual proof of their achievement.

With the progres-

sion of space exploration and technological advances, the need for these little research meteor stations became a thing of the past. By 1970, the Newbrook Observatory closed, and all the equipment had been removed. And there it stood, empty and mostly forgotten. A building that a random local would tell stories about or someone would mention that it could be something more: it was something special. Over two decades later, "something that special" was acknowledged. It was finally recognized as a Provincial Historic Resource.

Newbrook The County have been working to restore this distinctive location to become a place people would like to come and A Supervisit. Schmidt Meteor Camera has been tracked down and installed in the observatory, and current talks are in the works to restore the roof so it can once again be pulled open to reveal the building in its full glory. An exact replica of Sputnik

is showcased in the observatory alongside an image of the famous Sputnik 1 photograph. There is also a replica of the meteor that fell in Abee, AB, in 1952, just over 10 kilometres away from Newbrook.

The living quarters located next to observational building are being converted into a museum. When they began, there was nothing there but a shell of rooms and an organ. "No one knows where it came from or who it belonged to."

With many donations and helping hands, the Newbrook servatory Museum is taking shape. A room is being dedicated to school and church artifacts, and the main area showcases not only the life of the observatory but the history of the area. Photos and relics are presented everywhere you turn, proof of small-Thorhild town success in its prime. Car dealerships, hotels, bars, schools, churches, and theaters, are all the things that made these small communities a success and a place to be. The Newbrook Historical Society has much work to do but has visions of a place tourists want to see. They see a site well maintained and notable, a backdrop for photos, and above all else, a place to step back in

Competition Bureau to investigate Meta's abuse of its position, as evidenced by its decision to block Canadian news content from its digital platforms in Canada.

The applicants also request that Meta refrain from discriminating, by algorithm or by any other means, against content from Canadian news organizations on its digital platforms accessible in Canada.

Background: Meta recently announced

it is officially ending news availability in Canada. Meta has decided to block Canadian news content instead of following the requirements of Bill C-18. The law compels tech giants like Meta to pay Canadian news outlets for journalism they profit from, but do not pay for.

Google has now informed the Canadian government that they have made the decision that when the law takes effect they will be removing links to Canadian

news from Google Search, Google News, and Google Discover products.

Meta has now removed Canadian news for all Canadian users of its Facebook and Instagram platforms. —"we are announcing today that we have begun the process of ending news availability permanently in Canada," said Rachel Curran, head of public policy for Meta Canada.

Paul Deegan, president of News Media Canada, said this "intemperate" action will harm user experience and devalue the Facebook platform. "Without access to real fact-based news created by real journalists, Facebook will become far less attractive to users and advertisers. We expect more and more advertisers and their agencies will begin pulling advertising from the platform in response to this unilateral, undemocratic, and unreasonable move."

The Canadian Government's stance is that Meta's "bullying" tactics will not work with the government, which it says is ensuring those companies do not weaken Canada's democracy by threatening its domestic media industry.

Meta's actions have led to Canada's Federal Government and Provincial Governments in B.C. and Quebec to boycotting Meta. Many companies have followed suit.

The point is, does anyone in Canada believe having Meta and American billionaires in charge of what news Canadian citizens will or will not read, is a good idea?

Since 2008, close to 500 media outlets in 335 communities across Canada have closed, with more than 20,000 journalists losing their job.

For local rural journalism to survive in Canada, this needs to serve as a wake-up call to many local advertisers and event organizers. Local advertising matters, shopping local matters, and supporting local events matters.

in the early 1940s, Cowen returned to school.

"I finished school and needed a job," he shared. "I walked up the street in Calgary, and Imperial Oil was hiring."

Cowen ended up working with Imperial Oil through his retirement in 1987. He worked in BC, Alberta and Saskatchewan, starting gas plants, working as a foreman, and even going on geological surveys.

"I was out in the bush doing geological surveys for most of three years," Cowen explained. "Two of us would go on the surveys and paddle up and down the rivers and barely see anyone."

He shared a story about being on one

such survey, where the pair lost their canoe and ended up having to walk out before they were found.

Robert married his wife Marie in 1955, and together they raised four boys and a girl, all of who continue to live in the Redwater area. Their family also now includes five grand-children and two great-grandchildren.



So, did they find any actual ghosts? You'll have to find someone who was there and ask them.







Oil market expected to remain tight: EIA outlook

By ATB Financial Team

Energy The U.S. Information Administration (EIA) released its latest Short-Term Energy Outlook yesterday.

Overall, it's good news for oil producers like Canada and Alberta with prices expected to rise and supply to remain tight even as production

According to the new forecast, benchmark oil prices will continue to be supported by "voluntary cuts to Saudi Arabia's crude oil production and increasing global

demand."

West Texas Intermediate (WTI) is forecast to average just under US\$81 per barrel over the second half of 2023, or about 9% higher than in the EIA's July Outlook.

The average price next year is currently pegged at US\$81.48 compared to \$77.78 as of the previous forecast (+4.7%).

This bodes well for the prices received by Alberta producers as the higher WTI benchmark will also lift the price of our oil.

Global crude oil and liquids production is forecast to average


101.3 million barrels per day (mb/d) in 2023, just a titch higher than in the July outlook (+0.2%) before rising to 103.0 mb/d in 2024.

Global consumption meanwhile, will keep markets tight, averaging 101.2 mb/d this year and 102.8 mb/d in 2024.

Even though domestic U.S. crude oil production is expected to rise in 2023 and 2024 to record levels, the total amount of crude and other liquids the U.S. will import is forecast to increase both this year and next.






