If you have driven through Thorhild any Friday throughout the summer around lunchtime, you may notice an abundance of people at the North Corridor Co-op grocery store. The large

gathering is not because shoppers are clamouring for a sale, the majority are there to grab a hamburger or hot dog. They are attending the North Corridor Co-op Fundraiser BBQs. The first Fundraiser BBQ was held in

May of 2022. The mission and vision statements of North Corridor Co-op are "To be the trusted lead in the communities we serve and provide outstanding co-op experiences." Through a team effort, the idea

was formed to host community BBQ fundraisers for local organizations and community groups. The program grew, running from May through the beginning of September

Raccoon sightings on the rise

The distinct black rings on a bushy and bristly tall may have caught your eye, but what catches your attention immediately is the sweet face with a pointed snout, and eyes encased in the distinguished black mask. You have just encountered a raccoon. While endearingly nicknamed trash pandas, their intelligence and curious nature combined with the way the mischievous way they frolic may make even the most stoic hearts soften slightly with an overload of cuteness.

While the population of raccoons has generally been found only in southeast Alberta, over the past years an increase of these little critters has been finding their way to central Alberta and even farther north. The notice of kits tagging along behind mama 'coon indicates that there is now a breeding population in the area. The engaging personalities and playful antics may be entertaining but do not be fooled by their soft, content chattering. Do not approach.

Raccoons are notorious for their messes, ability to tear into garbage and cause extreme damage to buildings, including wiring. These little imps also only need a space of four to six inches to gain entry into a building or site. They are also very adaptable to their food sources. While they may enjoy a feast of frogs and insects, they do not hesitate to help themselves to a nest full of eggs, a bird feeder full of fresh seeds, garden produce or any scraps that may provide a tasty treat. Once a food source has been established, raccoons will treat it as a return buffet. Some people have a full understanding of how devastating on the property can be, but many do not understand the implications. How can this cute little creature be a problem?

Raccoons are a controlled animal in Alberta, just like skunks and bats.

Due to the risk of rabies, they are not to be handled or coaxed into domestication. They are also known carriers of diseases and parasites such as raccoon roundworm and canine distemper. Diseases can be passed on to humans and animals making them very ill. Viruses can also be spread from their urine and fecal matter. Just like cats, they have a designated bathroom area and sandboxes often make great lavatory areas. While raccoons are generally afraid of humans, they have been known to attack without warning. They will often attack to protect their food sources, homes, babies or if they themselves are ill. So, the question that stands is, what do you do when confronted with a "trash panda" friend?

The approach of many farmers in a small-town rural community is to "take care" of the pest problem themselves. This

approach is certainly legal and widely used. Raccoons can be hunted and trapped in Alberta year-round without a license as long as the person is on land they have a right to hunt on. However, if trapping, DO NOT RELOCATE. This advice was offered by Thorhild County Agricultural Fieldman, Clarence Dowhan. He advised that with raccoons (and all other wild animals), "the raccoon is now trap smart so will be impossible to re-trap. It becomes someone else's problem and 9 times out of 10 it will find its way back to where it was trapped." Dowhan expounded with a story of a producer relocating a "poor little thing" only to have the raccoon return to his property 3-4 weeks later. The feisty critter managed to get into his house and caused mass destruction to the interior. The result was a lot of money shelled out and a professional trapper working 6 weeks to outsmart

and deal with the problem.

The population of raccoons is expanding but not at a shocking rate and currently Alberta does not have a policy taking action to reduce or remove raccoons. Nevertheless, many communities view these varmints as unwanted guests. While individual municipalities may have different policies regarding pest populations, however you choose to deal with them, be smart and be safe. The use of poison is illegal. If trapping, use enclosed traps instead of wire to protect fingers and hands when transporting. Or simply contact your local municipality or Alberta Fish and Wildlife when confronted by a raccoon that will not move on, especially if you are uncertain how to proceed. Never put yourself at risk when dealing with wildlife. They are, for lack of a better word, wild. And wild means unpredictable.




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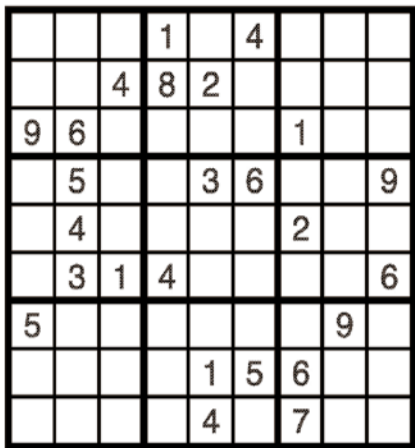

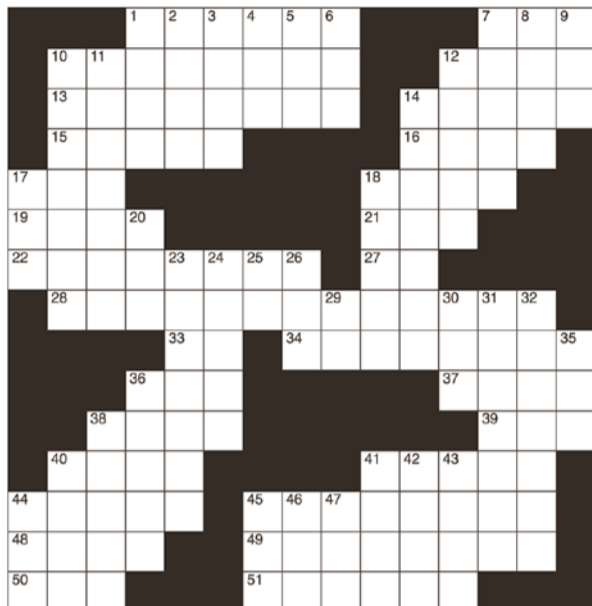

Organizations and groups that have applied and been accepted are asked to choose a Friday that works for them, choosing alternate dates if that Friday has already been booked. The job of that organization from there is to simply find volunteers. North Corridor Co-op does the rest. They provide everything needed for the fundraiser BBQ. The BBQ, the tent, propane, tables, and chairs...

right down to a cash float, debit machine and cleaning materials are all supplied. All the food (burgers, hotdogs, pop, buns, etc.) is also provided by the Co-op. In addition, a Co-op team member is there to continually assist each group throughout the lunch, providing set up and clean up help in addition to bringing a continual supply of food and beverages as needed. The organization volunteers take orders, cook, and serve the patrons. The goal

of these fundraising BBQs is that the groups provide the labour to put them on, but nothing else. There is no cost. All profits made during the lunch period go directly to them, operating and provision costs are completely covered by the Co-op. In addition to the profits, North Corridor Co-op provides an additional \$100 donation to each organization and treats their team members monthly to lunch, paying full price for additional

proceeds going towards the group. There is also a community BBQ Trailer that is outfitted with the same supplies that can be used off-site to provide additional benefits to the community. This trailer attends neighborhood events such as Radway Pioneer Days, local grad weekends and Albera Open Farm programs. It is also utilized at Thorhild and Boyle Schools for occasions like the annual Terry Fox Run. North Corridor BBQ

program is an amazing opportunity for local not-for-profits to benefit. For a few hours one Friday out of the summer, organizations have the opportunity to put in a little bit of work and in turn, receive a lump sum of profit directly to them. Throughout the summer it has been said that many individuals save their run to town for Fridays simply to grab a burger and support these groups. In 2022, the Friday BBQs raised over \$20,000 for local groups, this

year looks like it will surpass \$30,000. Any local organization that is interested in participating is urged to apply soon for the 2024 season, the Fridays fill up fast. 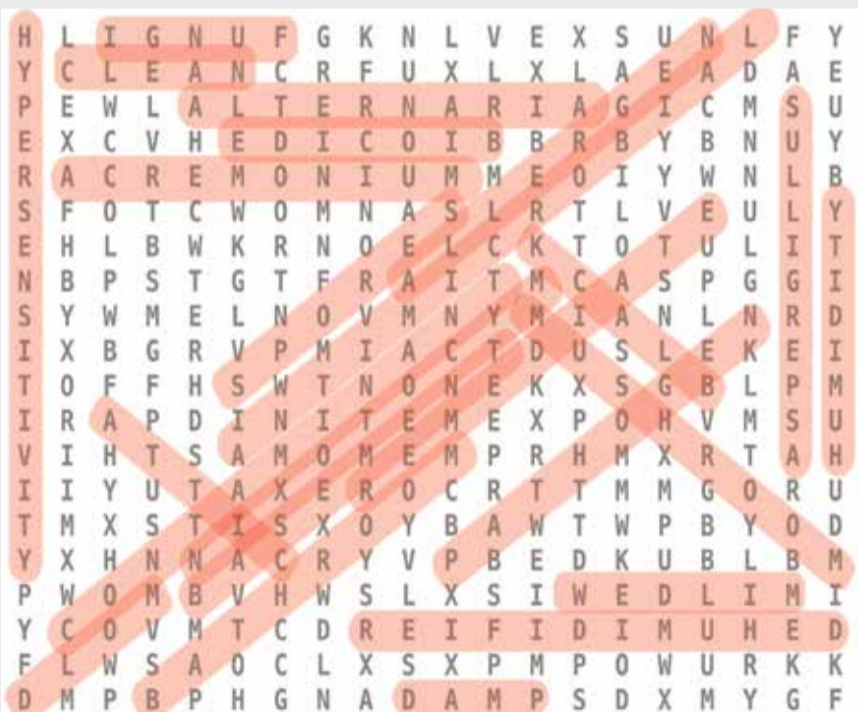

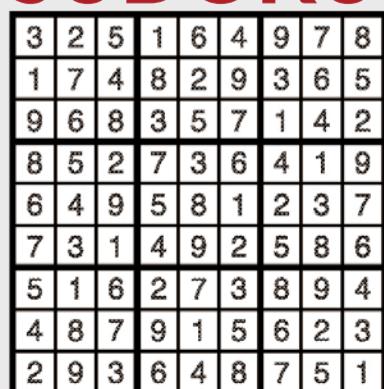

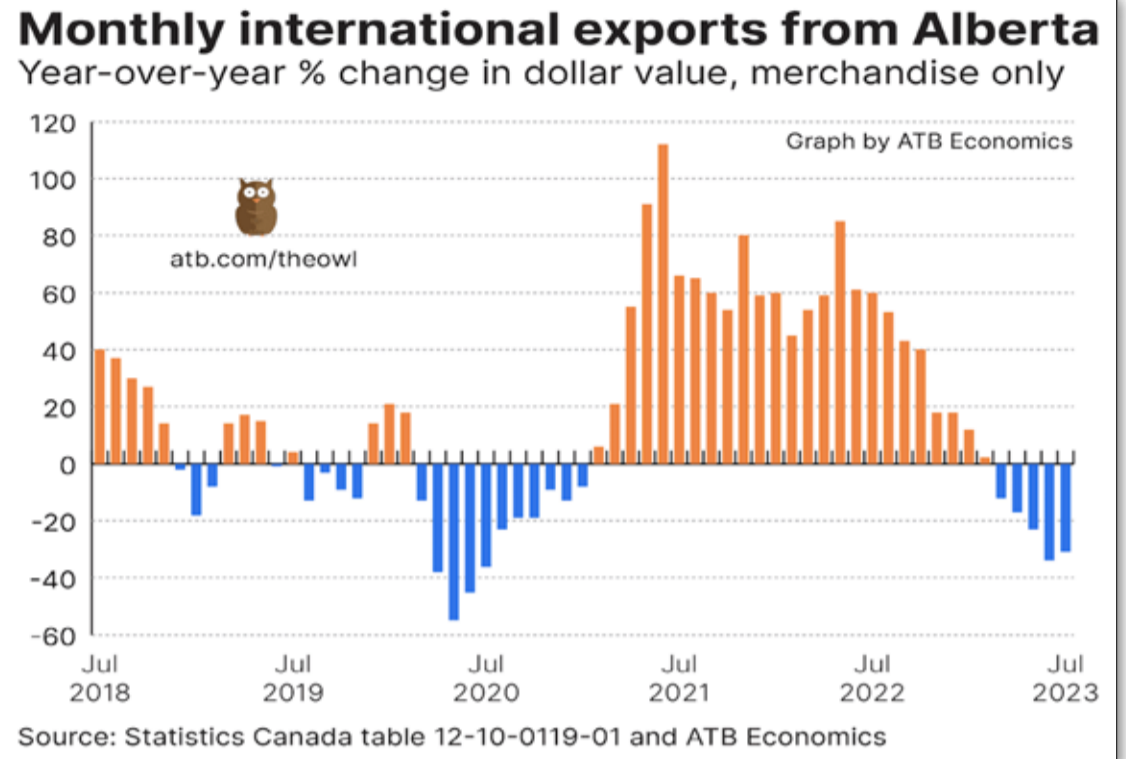

Current export value overshadowed by last year's record high

The dollar value of Alberta's international merchandise exports was higher in July than in June. However, exports continued to trend well below the record-setting levels seen last summer when energy and agriculture prices soared. The value of the goods Alberta exported to foreign markets increased by 1.9% in

July compared to the month before, but was down by 31% compared to 12 months earlier—the fifth year-over-year drop in a row. While Alberta's exports have come off their peaks, they were 11% higher than in July 2021. Representing about three-quarters of the total value of Alberta's international sales, energy exports almost single-handedly account for the

year-over-year (y/y) pullback, falling 37%. It's a similar story for chemicals (-19% y/y) and forest products (-37%), which have both come off last year's peaks. While agriculture exports were higher than last July (+9%), they too have come off their unusually high levels posted last fall, winter and early spring. The port strikes in BC influenced the July trade numbers for Canada. Statistics

Canada reports that exports leaving BC Marine terminals fell 23%, with declines in exports to Japan, South Korea, and India. However, with grain terminals remaining open, exports to China rose as a result of higher canola shipments. Alberta saw declines in its exports to several Asian countries between June and July but this was more than offset by higher exports to the U.S.
