It had been years since he had pulled out his antique binder and thresher, but as the October weather remained beautiful with no rain in the forecast, he and his family decided to harvest a portion of their oats crop the good old-fashioned way. Chomay explained he has had the equipment for about twenty years and used to farm this way with horses after meeting someone

who did the same. He expressed that this method is a lot more work and moves at a slower pace but was a fun hobby. As Chomay and his wife, Kathy, began their family, life became more fast-paced, and this technique was no longer feasible.

The Redwater Food Bank will receive 25% of the proceeds obtained from the Harvest Dinner Fundraiser.

season. A catered dinner of roasted beef and creamed chicken complemented was with all the fixings, including perogies and cabbage rolls. If one had room, a variety of desserts were available to top off the meal. 

much time is needed for this experience, and on a farm, there is always so much to do and catch up on. His son changed his mind by saying they should. So, with sons Jonathan and preparations were made, setting the stage for a traditional threshing bee. While traditional would involve the use of a team of horses, they made an exception and attached the binder and wagons to tractors. With only a handful of people being told of their project, word spread, and on the afternoon of the threshing day, over a dozen vehicles

A team of friends and neighbors armed themselves with pitchforks and were ready to put in a day's work for the opportunity to be a part of a piece of farming history.

Retired farmers beamed as they watched the younger generation scramble to throw bundles onto the slow-moving wagon. Laughter erupted as people took their turns to feed the bound oats into the thresher with calls of "Whatever you do, don't drop the pitchfork in!" It was an afternoon that gathered people together, showing a future generation how it was done. Brent Chomay conveyed

that this was a dying Conversations could be heard about the dangers of the original wooden threshers and how they would blow apart. People spoke about their grandparents. Several expressed the soothing nature of the methodic and physical labor, the satisfaction of the demanding work behind it all. As Kathy Chomay called her son to bring a truck closer and the end gate was opened to reveal coffee, hot chocolate, and refreshments for the "crew," one could almost imagine past generations of farming ancestors smiling out at the scene unfolding before them.

continuous monitoring. Although there is a sign on the bins asking for clothing only, sometimes other items that need to

be taken to the landfill are left behind. Sometimes, the bins fill up fast; other times, it is slow going, so whoever is responsible within the Lions Club for servicing the bins needs to keep an eye on them. Angela Semeniuk and her husband have been servicing the bins for many years, and this year, they decided it would be their last year. That decision raised a discussion

about who wants to take over. For some time, it looked like no one could do so due to other obligations until their relatively new Lions member, Larry Saunders from Warspite, stepped up and promised to do it for a year and then see how it would go. This is a huge commitment, especially since it requires Larry to come from Warspite on his bike to check on the bins and fill the container. Luckily, he gets help from Robert Brown occasionally; it is nice not to have to do this alone. "I feel it is a great service to the community that we should not lightly let go," Larry

says. "The Lions have been doing this for so long; we do not want to lose it. What else are people going to do with their clothes? Everything may end up in the landfill, a loss of resources and an extra burden to the landfill." Larry has a big heart for the community; he is often the first to volunteer if anyone is asked to help within the Lions Club. The Lions Club is happy; after all, their motto is "we serve." They can continue to serve the community with the bins. The bins will remain where they are, as they are easily accessible to the public.



Bylaw PD-01-2023 proposes to establish specific rules and regulations for land development within the Town as well as outlining the process and authorities for making decisions on development permit applications. ### How can I get more information






Fun By The Numbers



County, and a handful of clients in outlying areas. As a staple of the community for over thirty years, the Redwater Food Bank is only successful due to the amazing time and dedication of its current eighteen volunteers and the overwhelming support of local schools, individuals, businesses, organizations, the Town of Redwater, and County of Thorhild.

Chairperson, Susan Krochter, stated, "We would be lost without the generosity of our supporters." She continued to expound on the incredible donations they receive as businesses and schools encourage each other with friendly competitions, as well as communities and organizations factoring financial donations to the food bank during their annual budgeting. Krochter also explained their gratitude to the local IGA for continually supplying them with bread and baked constant stock of potatoes, Food Banks Alberta for the majority of their eggs, and the Food Banks Alberta warehouse out of Leduc, ensuring they have the opportunity to purchase bulk items at reduced costs. These are not the only contributors that allow the Redwater Food Bank to supply those in need of a helping hand, and Krochter expressed her gratitude to each and every

donor; they are too numerous to name. Redwater Food Bank

is also extremely for-

tunate to be able to

receive local meat for their inventory. After countless hours and paperwork, farmers may now donate beef, poultry, and pork as long as it has the registered butchshop's stamp. Hunters may also donate wild game under these conditions if their hunt proved plentiful. Local gardeners with an abundance of harvest may also contribute fresh, cleaned vegetables. This is a huge win for the food bank as it continues an ongoing battle to meet the needs of the community. Since 2022, there has been a 45% increase in clientele. What is disheartening to note is that approximately 36% of their clients are now seniors. Due to the cost-of-living increases (groceries, utilities, housing), many seniors are being forced to ask for assistance. Susan Krochter noted that she has helped many goods, North Bank of these clients, and Potatoes for their they are reluctant and slightly uncomfortable, saying they have never needed a handout before.

Krochter has also noticed the struggle for families, making choices between necessities and which of these necessities need to take priority. A mother may sacrifice women's care products to provide breakfast for her children. These are not choices that anyone should have to make. "It is sometimes

challenging to keep focus and think outside the box," Krochter explained. demand Redwater Food Bank services increases, they collaborate with clients on pensions, disability, AISH, etc., to develop thirty-day cycles to utilize their income to its fullest and use the food bank to fill in the gaps. However, the food bank is not a sustainable answer. It can only provide a maximum of ten days' worth of food once every thirty days.

The strain is evident in these communities. The food bank is now also seeing an increase of multi-generational families utilizing their support. Aging parents are allowing their adult children to move back in with them, many of these children having their own families to support. Krochter said this was seen more during COVID as many individuals lost their jobs due to pandemic measures and now is being seen as people are stretched beyond their means and struggling to maintain growing costs. There are households of 6, 8, or more people in need. She also spoke of people in the communities going hungry, refusing to admit they need help.

The discussion with Susan Krochter gave a glimpse behind the scenes of a non-profit, charitable organization going beyond to work with clients. Their dedication to finding and utilizing

previously untapped resources is astonishing. The support of the community is equally unmatched. Not only are financontributions and item donations helping to maintain this organization, but Pembina Place also gave them a space to use free of rent, in addition to access to

a commercially inspected kitchen that is utilized to repackage bulk items such as flour in smaller portions. Local industry and support have also led to the purchase of commercial and domestic fridges and freezers, allowing the storage and distribution of perishable items. Susan Krochter repeatedly referred to the volunteers as a

"wonderful group!" affectionately referring to them as her "elves." However, non-stop volunteers are needed and always appreciated. And as the holiday season approaches, Krochter is thankful for the abundance it brings to their shelves and asks that people continue to think of the Redwater Food Bank throughout the year.



## Unemployment rate rises among young Albertans

The unemployment rate in Alberta held steady last month at 5.7%, but there was movement when looking at the rate by age group.

For those in the 15 to 24 cohort, the unemplovment rate went from 12.1% in August to 13.5% in September and has been on an upward trend since the spring (the data have been adjusted to account for regular seasonal patterns). As a result, the youth unemployment rate is averaging 11.7% so far this year compared to 10.8% over the course of 2022.

Although starting at a much lower level, the unemployment rate among Albertans 55 and over also went up in September, rising half a percentage

point to 5.0%—its highest reading since January. Despite this uptick, the average unemployment rate since January is below the 2022 average (4.7% versus 5.9%).

The unemployment rate of the big group in the middle—those aged 25-54—has fallen to its lowest level in over a year at 4.3% in September and is averaging roughly the same as it was last year.

One might think that an influx of new job seekers was driving up the unemployment rate among the younger and older groups, but both cohorts have seen their participation rate\* decline over the course of the year.

The participation rate for the 15-24 age group was down by 4.9 percentage points in September compared to the 2022 average while the participation rate for those 55 and over was off by 0.7 points. (The participation rate for the 25-54 group was down 0.9 points.)

Since the margin of error is greater for the 15-24 and 55 and over age groups than for the 25-54 group, monthto-month changes should be interpreted with more caution. However, the trend over several months does point to an increase in unemployment among those 15 to 24.

\*The participation rate is the total labour force (those working and those actively looking for work) expressed as a percentage of the population aged 15 years and over.
