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

The speaker clears his throat before addressing the crowd. There is an acknowledgment of the 75th anniversary of the first United Nations peacekeeping mission. Wreaths surround a war monument, and poppies stand brightly against lapels and breast pockets. Tiny voices inquire about what things are and what is happening. Faces marked by time watch silently and reflectively. The Last Post begins, and the flags are slowly lowered. It is coincidental that the train is rolling through town at this moment, its whistle piercing the cool morning air. The train moves on, and the whistle fades just as the clock strikes 11:11 am. Silence. Except, not quite silent. Someone swallows hard, and several sniffles of emotion are muffled by gloved hands. There is a soft sob unable to be contained.

This ceremony was one of many communities across Canada hosting and honouring National Remembrance Day. Each ceremony would be slightly different, with some communities having only a handful of attendees while others would gather by the tens of thousands. However, they all would have looked essentially the same. At the heart of National Remembrance Day, participants gather to reflect and honour those who have given their lives to service. Every ceremony holds a memory of childhoods affected by war, young men being called upon to defend their country, and families anxiously awaiting any news at home. Every ceremony grieves the loss of a parent, child, or loved one who never made it home. Every ceremony brings with it a young family, those teaching a new generation, reminding them of who these people were and what

Packing hope and smiles

Operation Christmas Child, a project of Samaritan's Purse and originally a program in the United Kingdom, commenced in 1993 as a response to a request fulfilled by Franklin Graham. He was asked to assist children in Eastern Europe who were facing hardships. The specific task was to fill shoeboxes with small trinkets, toys, and hygiene items for distribution to the children. Since its inception as a shoebox ministry, the project has expanded, annually distributing millions of boxes globally.

Numerous individuals, organizations, and businesses collaborate to contribute to this extensive Christmas endeavor, including St. Anne's Roman Catholic Church in Thorhild. What began over twenty years

ago as a small project incorporated into a Sunday School class evolved into an annual initiative inviting church members to pack their shoeboxes or donate items. Operation Christmas Child not only provided an opportunity to contribute to ministry work but also served as a lesson in empathy, prompting individuals to consider a world marked by hardships. The physical and emotional connection developed through envisioning a child and selecting items for that child imparts an understanding of touching the life of someone thousands of miles away.

The project at St. Anne's Parish gained momentum as donations and boxes poured in from individuals and students at the local school, adding to the piles of shoeboxes each year. As contributions of small items

and school supplies became integral to the annual event, St. Anne's parishioners organized packing parties held every November, a week before the boxes were collected. Potluck lunches were prepared, and children and adults alike gathered in the church basement, packing shoeboxes with love and prayers. Children often colored pictures or wrote personalized Christmas notes to include with the simple treasures, creating a unique surprise for the recipients.

goal Operation Christmas Child is a ministerial campaign designed to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ and bring joy to children, some of whom have never received a present before. While the overarching aim is to touch the lives of those around the world, for St. Anne's Parish, it evolved into an act of humility



November 8, Métis Crossing proudly hosted National Indigenous Veterans Day. The general public was invited along with some special guests, and around 50 indigenous and non-indigenous people answered that call. Juanita Marois, CEO at Métis Crossing and MC for this day, welcomed the public in the big hall where coffee, tea and pastries were offered. The organization had gone the extra mile by decorating the tables and the hall and inviting APTN to record the event. "The Veterans Day was held role of Métis Crossing on November 8, 1994, is to share the Métis culture with all people," Juanita explained, upon which she invited elder Lilly Rose Mevers to the microphone. Lilly Rose Meyers, elder and Knowledge Holder shared the pride in commemorating Indigenous heroes who fought for Canada. Bernie Poitras, District 12 captain, briefly referred to the importanceofMétisCrossing for everyone, Métis

ple alike: "This place is still in its infancy," he said, implying that there are significant events to come, of which we have seen some good examples this past summer. Bernie thanked the people who made the ultimate sacrifice and welcomed the elders they are still learning from. He thanked all in attendance for being here today and closed with: "Freedom is not cheap; it comes at a very high cost," as we can all witness from the war in Ukraine and Israel. The first Indigenous Indigenous when people came together to honour their veterans who fought Indigenous persons for Canada. 12000 Indigenous veterans served and sacrificed themselves in World War 1, World War 2 and the Korean War, but also on peacekeeping and peace enforcing missions throughout the world. Countries around the world have recognized their bravery and skill. Bruce Gordon, the next speaker, was one

of those brave Métis who served during the Suez crisis in 1956-1957 and commemorated the work of Métis military men and women abroad during missions. He pointed out the sacrifices made, being away from family and friends, sometimes in faraway countries under dangerous circumstances. Status Indians were exempt from the draft for World War 1 and 2 and had to give up their status to serve. More than 3000 enlisted in World War 2, but when they came back, they were no longer considered "Indians" [old term] under the Indian Act and could not re-enter their previous lives. That has all changed. Fifty were decorated for bravery during World War 1. More than 2700 persons of Indigenous origin serve in the Canadian Forces. The celebration ended with a wreath-laying ceremony at the monument worth visiting. The names of Indigenous veterans are engraved on plaques, dating back to the early 1800's.

Energy prices drive up Canada's international exports in September

The value of Canada's merchandise exports increased for the third month in a row in September. Adjusting for seasonality, Canada's exports rose 2.7% to reach \$67 billion.

In volume terms, the increase in exports was more modest at 0.4%

Driven by higher prices, foreign sales of Canadian crude oil were up by 12.6% and accounted for 90.2% of the net increase in

total export value.

Aircraft exports (+8.6%) and agricultural exports (+8.1%) also posted strong growth in September.


On a quarterly basis, exports increased for the first time since the second quarter of 2022. Foreign sales in the third quarter were 4.3% higher than the previous quarter with higher energy prices once again driving most of the improvement.

The strong showing on the exports side of the equation pushed Canada's trade surplus with the world to just over \$2 billion.

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

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
