The Festival of Trees, inaugurated in 2014, has become a vital component of Redwater's Kris Kringle Mingle and holiday festivities during the festive weekend. In its inaugural year, twenty-six trees were registered for the friendly competition, a tradition that consistently draws at least twenty trees annually. Various groups and organizations vie not only for bragging rights but also for the honour of receiving hand-precertificates sented recognizing their

achievement in the Festival of Trees.

Every winning tree results in a \$50 donation to the Redwater Food Bank on behalf of the winning organization. Town of Redwater Mayor, David McRae, personally handed out certificates to representatives the winning organizations, expressing gratitude for their participation acknowledging the considerable effort involved, stating, "It is so appreciated!" McRae further expressed pride in the collective effort of individuals rallying for a common cause, making these

events immensely successful. The true beneficiaries, emphasized, are the children and visitors who delight in the uniquely decorated trees, carefully studying each one and casting votes for their favorites.

Susan Krochter, chairperson of the Redwater Food Bank, graciously accepted the donation on behalf of the food bank. She also conveyed her appreciation for the Town of Redwater team that tirelessly prodonations moted to the food bank during the holiday season. Over the two-day period

encompassing the Kris Kringle Mingle, market, and activities, a total of 950 pounds of food and \$1000 in cash donations were collected. Krochter expressed astonishment at the unprecedented generosity, noting that the food donation shopping cart had to be emptied 10 times. She explained that typically, they empty it a couple of times over the two-day weekend, but never ten times. With grocery prices causing strain on families, each dollar and every donated item contributes significantly to making a positive impact.

Fort Saskatchewan RCMP warn public of 'Emergency Scam'

Fort Saskatchewan RCMP are advising the public that there has been an increase in the number of "Emergency Scams" reported to the Detachment this month. These scams are referred to as Emergency Scams, or sometimes "Grandparent" or "Grandchild" scams.

These scams often involve a phone call being placed to the victim claiming a loved one is in trouble with the courts or law enforcement and a payment is needed to help them. The suspects will often pretend to be a police officer, judge, or family member. Suspects will usually ask for cash, however more recently they have been asking for payment by Bitcoin.

Fort Saskatchewan RCMP want to remind citizens of the following:

- Bail is always paid in person at a courthouse or correctional centre
- Never send money to anyone you don't know
- If a person claims to be a police officer or judge, call that police service or court house directly to confirm the situation - police and courts will never ask for any form of payment
- Never give out personinformation over

the phone or online to someone you don't know—the police or courts will not ask for personal information over the phone

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Council approves 2024 budget, sets municipal tax rate increase

Council 2024 budget, sets municipal tax rate increase

Sturgeon County to maintain one of the lowest residential tax rates in the province

County Sturgeon Council approved the 2024 budgets and set a 2.13 per cent municipal tax rate increase, which means a homeowner with a property valued at \$500,000 will pay \$41 more per tax year.

Council reduced the municipal tax rate increase from the 3.87 per cent increase proposed in October. This was achieved through thoughtful deliberations higher-than-exand industrial pected assessment.

"Council is committed to keeping taxes low while delivering services that support a strong and thriving community. The 2024 budget reflects our dedication to giving residents and businesses the best value for their hard-earned tax dollars. It balances this with

approves investment in key infrastructure, which contributes to our continued growth and prosperity."

The \$135.7 million budget includes a \$49.5 million capital budget to fund roads, bridges, and drainage work, and a \$86.8 million operating budget to fund dayto-day services, like fire services, snow removal, utilities and community services.

A County homeowner with a property valued at \$500,000 will pay \$41, or \$3.41 per month, more in municipal taxes in 2024. A business owner with a business valued at \$1 million will pay \$229, or \$19.08 per month, more in municipal taxes.

Council is prioritizing utility rate affordability. Some elements related to utility rates are outside of the County's control. Council continues to work through changes with utility providers to ensure residents receive fair and sustainable rates. The County is committed to transparency and will keep the community informed as it navigates these challenges.

"I'm pleased to bring forward a budget that is innovative and responsive to community needs," said Hnatiw. "Much like our residents and businesses, we keep an eye on our expenses throughout the year and look for the best value when delivering our programs and services."

A 2.13 per cent municipal tax increase planned in the budget does not mean each tax bill will increase by 2.13 per cent. Sturgeon County must collect taxes on behalf of the provincial government for education, rural policing, and seniors housing. These amounts account for approximately 40 per cent of taxes due. The final tax rate will be set in the spring after the province determines requisition amounts.

We will continue to deliver public interest materials to addresses. This includes community newspapers (and community newspapers with inserts of a public interest nature). It also includes mailings from elected



upcoming thoughts of new years' resolutions may place pickleball sessions on the list of becoming more active.


