## Listeners walk in "Our Father's Footsteps"



The Friends of the Redwater Public Library, a group of volunteers, engage in fundraising activities throughout the year to provide additional resources and programs to the Redwater Public Library. The group strives to sponsor a minimum of one program annually for the benefit of the local schools. On April 8, the Friends of the Redwater Public Library brought Don Levers, a local author, to address the students of Redwater High School in the afternoon, followed by the author's visit at the Redwater Public Library in the evening.

Don Levers is the author of two children's books featuring the Ogopogo and Loot for the Taking (inspired by an actual events of a robbery in Vancouver). Levers most recent book Our Father's Footsteps, takes readers on a journey of "What if" in moments based off historical documents

and family letters. The book uses historical context and facts mingled with creative non-fiction to give voices to four different men, telling their stories and

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
experiences of World War 2.

Don Levers shared that the inspiration behind his book came from a conversation with Gord Steinke and an upcoming trip to Normandy. Steinke remarked how great it would be to walk in your dads' footsteps. This conversation left a lasting impression on Levers and set the foundation for "Our Father's Footsteps." The library provided a serene atmosphere, and he was able to settle into a regal chair and read from his book, sharing with the audience the sacrifices of the soldiers and the significance of the war.

The library visit was quiet and personal, inviting conversation from the audience, sharing their own personal histories and family experiences. Don Levers readings were engaging and pulled listeners into the private lives of four different soldiers "what if" through

thoughts and words. The stories were interspersed with humoments morous and punctuated his historical documents and photos. Levers managed to draw the audience into the everyday moment and then set them amid the chaos of battles.

"Our Father's Footsteps" incorporates real excerpts of family letters and notes and features a variety of historical photos to bring readers into the lives of three Canadian and one British soldier. The stories are a poignant reminder of the men who would never return home, the ones who never had a chance to become fathers, who never had a life beyond their enlistment into World War 2. However, it was also a reminder of all soldiers of all wars, the stories of ordinary people falling in extraordinary circumstances. The stories pull deep reflections of one's own fathers and little piece of

## Public Safety Minister addresses RCMP vacancy rates

Mike Ellis, deputy premier and minister of Public Safety and Emergency Services, held a rural media roundtable on April 15, 2024, to discuss the currently tabled Bill 11, the Public Safety and Emergency Services Statutes Amendment Act 2024. If passed, Bill 11 will enable the creation of an independent police agency to augment and support other police services in the

province, including the RCMP.

Ellis began his opening statement with an impactful presentation of RCMP statistics in Alberta. Alberta currently has over 1900 authorized RCMP officer positions; however, the current number of officers is 1498, with over one hundred of those officers on leave. This is a 21.6 % vacancy rate of these important positions. He expressed the bottom line that Alberta is paying for services

it is not receiving.

Ellis, drawing on his own experience in the police force, highlighted that when someone dials 911, they expect a police officer to arrive and assist them, regardless of whether they live in a remote community in rural Alberta or downtown Edmonton. However, expectation is not always met. Nonetheless, he clarified that this is not a fault of police officers who work tirelessly on the frontlines within

the RCMP services. He Ellis maintained a expressed his respect and gratitude to the hardworking officers. He explained that this is a staffing issue, not just in Alberta but across Canada. As communities reach out for help, Ellis aims to empower communities to meet their individual needs.

As discussions on the panel focused around RCMP recruitment issues and concerns that Bill 11 would have an increased impact on the RCMP vacancy rate,

stance of "Boots on the ground," repeatedly emphasizing the need for more visible presence and rural police coverage, especially in rural Alberta, stating concerns that there are areas without 24/7 policing coverage. The quickest way to conduct police-like functions in Alberta is to train individuals to perform tasks that are already being carried out by the Alberta Sheriffs.

As Ellis concluded

dia roundtable, he re-emphasized the importance of visible police presence in rural areas and the role of Alberta Sheriffs, their policing functions and duties, and ability to attend emergency tions promptly. Mike Ellis stressed; this is a quicker approach than addressing the challenges of recruitment for the RCMP. "We don't time," commented Ellis, "rural Alberta needs help."

## **Sturgeon County Council approves 2024** property tax rates

Sturgeon Council approved a 1.37 per cent municipal tax rate increase. This means a property valued at \$500,000 will pay \$26 more in municipal taxes in 2024. A business valued at \$1 million will pay \$148 more.

Property taxes help pay for municipal services, including snow clearing, road and bridge construction and maintenance, parks and trail improvements, drainage infrastructure, animal control, and much more. "This year's budget and tax rate demonstrates we are not without our challenges and must react to maintain service levels amid rising costs outside of our control," said Mayor Alanna Hnatiw.

"While we understand any increase may be challenging for residents and business owners, we believe this is a responsible and balanced decision that allows us to deliver on our commitments now and into the future."

Residents' property tax bills are dependent on their propertv's assessed value. Assessment details can be viewed online at SturgeonCounty. ca/PropertyMap.

The County is also required to collect additional education, seniors' lodging and Designated Industrial Property (DIP) tax on behalf of the Government of Alberta.

American Kestrels are the smallest species of falcons found in North America. They are typically 8 to 12 inches long with a wingspan of about 20 inches. These birds of prey are known for their beautiful and distinctive coloration, with males having blue-gray wings and rusty-red backs, while females have brown wings and back. Both sexes have a prominent black vertical stripe below their eyes, which gives them the appearance of having a mustache and sideburns. They are known for their agile flight and hunting abilities, often preying on small mammals, birds, and insects.

Thorhild County offered residents a

Ag Services building and construct their own Kestrel nesting boxes and learn a little about these amazing birds and the benefits of having them close by. Lisa Card, Barrhead-Westlock-Athabasca ALUS coordinator, gave the builders an informative crash course on the American Kestrel, pointing out their distinguishing looks and explaining their behavior and value.


Card explained that the Kestrel population is declining about 2% every year and due to deforestation and the destruction of their natural habitats, cavity-nesting birds are relying more on manmade structures or nooks in buildings. A male kestrel will scout for appropriate spaces and attract their female chance to come out to to the area in hopes the Thorhild County it is an acceptable location. Once a pair is established, these fierce predators can eliminate hundreds of rodents/year and eat lots of grasshoppers during years of infestation.

The group Thorhild County builders constructed almost twenty new nesting boxes to provide summer homes the American Kestrel. The nesting box workshop students also learned that these birds prefer their doors to face the south, enjoy an open prairie view and like their fellow Kestrel neighbours to be at least half a mile away. Card also explained to the eager builders that the nesting boxes should be situated away from homes, although American Kestrels are predatory friends, they are also incredibly smelly and messy yard guests.

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
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# Smoky Lake hosts second successful STARS fundraiser

# Another swallow? Core inflation moving in the right direction

Last Wednesday, Tiff Macklem said the Bank of Canada is getting more confident inflation is heading in the right direction.

They just want to see more data to be convinced. Or in the words of Governor Macklem, "We're seeing what we need to see. We just need to see it for longer".

In other words, one swallow doesn't make a summer, but maybe a couple more could.

Less than a week later, we now have another month of data, and it looks pretty good overall.

Yes, the headline annual inflation rate rose from 2.8% in February to 2.9% in March. But that was expected because of higher gasoline prices. Consumer prices



excluding gasoline decelerated 0.1 points to 2.8% year-over-year (y/y).

The real progress came from trend or core inflation, which strips out some of the more volatile movements.

The trim measure of core prices eased 0.1 points to 3.1% y/y and the median measure dipped 0.2 points to 2.8% y/y. More importantly, annualized changes in the 3-month moving

average, which strips out base year effects, are below 2% for both measures.

Shelter remains the key source of inflation, rising +6.5% y/y. Mortgage interest costs remain a big driver, adding nearly a percentage point to headline inflation (excluding mortgage costs CPI inflation was 2%). This effect will dissipate as rates shift lower. Rent inflation (+8.5% y/y)remains high

will likely prove more durable due to ongoing housing supply issues.

Food prices are very elevated, but they continue to rise at a slower annual rate. In March, the increase was 3.0% y/y.

So the burning question – is this enough to cut in June? On its own, probably not. But we do get another inflation print next month, and that could be the deciding factor. Either way, we

are getting close.

We still think that the easing core inflation trend (if it holds), along with recent cracks in the labour market, would be enough for the Bank of Canada to justify rate cuts in June. But we wouldn't be surprised if the Bank waits to cut in July to buy more time (and gather more data) and announce alongside a new set of projections.

In Alberta, the annual inflation rate eased from 4.2% to 3.5%, but remained above the national average due to faster growing energy prices.

Electricity prices continued to put upward pressure on headline inflation in Alberta, although the impact is fading. The 26% y/y increase was entirely due to base period effects,

as \$25 rebates and a rate cap of 13.5 cents kw/h were in place in March 2023. On a month-over-month basis, electricity prices have declined the last three months, and should soon start subtracting from the annual inflation rate.

Gasoline prices (up 10.4% y/y) added more to annual inflation in Alberta than nationally (up 4.5% y/y), with the partial reinstatement of the fuel tax starting January 1 likely a contributing factor. Natural gas prices fell between February and March, but remained 11% higher than a year ago due to low prices in March 2023.

Excluding energy and food prices, Alberta's annual core inflation rate was 2.5% – below the national rate of 2.9%.



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
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
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
