## Newbrook Ag Society hosts fundraiser dinner

On September 12, 2023, the Wilson family awoke up at 4am riddled with confusion at their home feeling too warm and the ethereal orange glow that seemed to permeate the night. Daughter Samantha relayed her confusion as she laid in bed hearing the continual coughing of her father. By the time their fire alarms sounded, the Wilson family had only minutes to evacuate their home. Everything was gone in twenty minutes.

The Wilsons, located in the Newbrook area, expressed their gratitude to Thorhild County Fire Department for their quick response to the call. The home went up like paper, but the Wilsons were extremely pleased with the dedication of the crew and the preventative response. As the family described the dry conditions and dry creek bed along the property and acres of farmland awaiting harvest, they all agreed that although their home was lost, the outcome could have been much worse. What was even more amazing was the people and neighbours who showed up

immediately clothes and offers to help rebuild.

The resulting loss was described as "an emotional rodeo." Everything the family owned was gone. Millie Wilson (wife, mother) emotionally explained that a fire never comes at a suitable time but happened in the midst of a family diagnosis of breast cancer and her own health challenges requiring heart surgery. The community stepped in to embrace them in a showing of familial support. As Millie was in the hospital, ladies showed up in droves to assist Samantha in cleaning and sorting through the ashes, people supported Ian (husband/father) in rebuilding the homestead they had been on since 1986. As a family that prefers to be behind the scenes and offering help instead of asking for it, Millie Wilson's voice broke explaining how hard it was for them to be in the spotlight and the overwhelming response of their neighbours and strangers, "people who had nothing were there to give what little they had."

#### **COMMUNITY NOTICE**

#### **ANNUAL VEGETATION** MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Each year, CN is required to manage vegetation on its right-of-way. Managing this vegetation contributes to mitigating fire risks and enhances the efficiency of inspection of track infrastructure.

To ensure safe railway operations, the annual vegetation management program will be carried out on CN rail lines in the province of Alberta. A certified applicator (Davey Tree Expert Company Ltd., 1-800-465-6367) will apply herbicides on and around the railway tracks (primarily along the 24-foot graveled area/ballast). Product requirements for setbacks in the vicinity of dwellings, aquatic environments and municipal water supplies will be met.

CN only uses herbicides that have been approved for use in Canada and in the province within which they are applied.

The program is expected to take place from May to October 2024.

## Where to find extra cash with your name on it

(NC) Many of us are finding it hard to manage the rising costs of living like rent, groceries and other necessities. It may feel like you can't make ends meet, let alone get ahead. But what if there is cash waiting for you?

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) calculates that it has distributed approximately \$1.4 billion in cheques that have not been cashed yet, and one of these could have your name on it. Some of them date back to 1998 – a bit like finding an unclaimed lottery ticket in a drawer or \$20 in your old coat pocket.

In 2020, a grandparent discovered they had over 100 cheques uncashed worth almost \$50,000. As a pensioner and primary caretaker for their grandchildren the money was very much needed and appreciated. amount was a combination of many benefits. Make sure you check with the agency for any uncashed cheques you may have on file.

These cheques never expire, and if you've already signed up for My Account, you should be able to see if you have one right away.

If you haven't signed up for the online account yet you can do it on the

CRA website or by calling their general enquiries line at 800-959-8281.

While you're at it, you may want to sign up for direct deposit to have your money securely deposited into your bank account. That way, you'll never miss a cheque again.



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



#### COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS March 26, 2024

## Alberta continues to lead all provinces in population growth

#### **Annual growth** remains red hot

Alberta added 202.324 residents roughly the population of two Red Deers—between January 1, 2023 and January 1, 2024 for a growth rate of 4.4%. You have to go back to 1981 to find a higher pace of annual growth.

That 4.4% was also the highest of any province and well above the national rate of 3.2% the highest it has been since 1957.

Just under two-thirds of Alberta's growth since January 2023 came from net international migration with net interprovincial migration accounting for 27% of new residents and natural increase (births less deaths) for

tional residents\* continued to be a key driver of population growth in Alberta. Of the 130,870 residents gained from international migration last year, 60% (78,370) were in the non-permanent category.

Ontario was the main source of interprovincial migrants to Alberta, accounting for 42% of Alberta's net gain from the rest of the country last vear. British Columbia was the second largest source at 28% of the total followed by

Saskatchewan at 9%. While job opportunities are always a key factor keeping people in Alberta and attracting them to it, the relative affordability of housing has emerged as a driving force with average house prices several hundred thousand dollars higher in B.C. and Ontario than in Alberta.

#### Quarter-overquarter growth slower, but still strong

Zeroing in on the change between the third and fourth quarter of last year, the pace of population growth in Alberta slowed from 1.3% to 0.9%. Nationally, the growth rate also slowed, going from 1.1% to 0.6%.

Interprovincial migration, which can be quite sensitive to seasonal factors, fell from Strong gains from a net gain of 17,094 non-permanent interna- for Alberta in the third quarter to 9,913 additional residents in the fourth quarter (-42%). Despite the smaller gain, this was the 10th quarter in a row in which Alberta's population grew from interprovincial migration. a turnaround from the quarterly losses that marked the period between mid-2015 and mid-2021.

The pace of growth from other countries also slowed, falling from the record high of 39,212 to 31,037the third highest gain on record—for a drop of 21%. The pullback was much larger at the national level at -42%.

Our latest forecast (which uses the standard July 1 to June 30 period to assess annual population change), sees the slowdown evident in the fourth quarter of 2023 continuing with the result being more moderate population growth in 2024 and 2025 than we saw last year.

Alberta's population gains going forward will, however, still be strong compared to most other parts of Canada and developed economies around the world and, in turn, help drive ongoing economic expansion in the province.

\*A non permanent resident is a person from another country with a usual place of residence in Canada who has a work or study permit or who has claimed refugee status. Family members living with work or study permit holders are also included, unless these family members are already Canadian citizens or landed immigrants or permanent residents.



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## Redwater Museum features Japanese settlers

Kimura Lake, located approximately eight kilometers west of Redwater, is a kettle hole that has been around for hundreds of years. Until the mid-eighties, Kimura Lake remained unnamed. Alberta's Cultures Historic Site dedicated the name Kimura Lake in honor of Toyomatsu Kimura who originally settled the area in the early 1900s.

In the early 1900s, Toyomatsu Kimura departed from Fukuoka-Ken, Japan to Hawaii as part of a large labor force. In 1906,Kimura made the journey to Vancouver and over the following three years, he toiled on the railway in British Columbia under conditions resembling indentured servitude, as he was under a close contract with the company.

Shortly thereafter, he was made aware an opportunity to acquire land near Redwater. After ensuring compliance with all laws governing land sales to individuals of Asian descent, he proceeded with the purchase of a sizeable expanse of bushland in the Maybridge District, situated to the west of Redwater.

In 1919 Toyomatsu Kimura purchased his first quarter section which bordered south of the end of the lake and in the following year, purchased land on the west side of the lake where he eventually built his first home. In 1927, Kimura sold his business in Edmonton and moved to establish permanent residence in the Redwater area. That same year, Toyomatsu Kimura in partnership with a Mr. Saito, purchased an entire designated section School Land and two adjoining quarter that all encircled the lake. When the partnership was dissolved Kimura retained the western half section of the property.

Toyomatsu Kimura's unwavering dedication to his adopted homeland exemplified the pioneering spirit that defined his life. Despite facing unique challenges due to his ancestry, he carried the weight of responsibility with grace and determination. decision to name Kimura Lake in honor of Toyomatsu Kimura stands as a poignant well-deserved tribute to his enduring legacy of commitment, resilience, and perseverance in the face of adversity.

The club will be having their Mini show with their animals April 13 as they start to prepare for their final show in June









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### Redwater RCMP recover stolen property






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
