The Newbrook 4-H Club held their livestock achievement day on June 7. Members in the beef, swine and poultry projects gathered at the Victoria Trail Arena in Waskatenau at 9:30.

We had our food members hold their achievement day on May 26 in Newbrook, and the horse project members on June 2nd in Waskatenau. We also had members that participated in a carcass project, and they had their viewing on May 14.

Members started the day with unloading their animals and getting set up. At 10:30 all of the market steer projects were weighed on our new club scale. Thank you to Chad Ollikka for helping us with this purchase. This year the steers ranged from 825 pounds to 1795 pounds. There were a few cranky animals in the beginning, but everyone calmed down as the day went on. We had 24 market steers, 4 heifers, 1 cow/calf pair, 5 market swine and 4 poultry projects.

Throughout the day our Cleaver Kids held a small concession with treats and goodies for our families and audience.

Members took a break for lunch. Thank you to North Corridor Co-op for providing us with hot dogs and buns.

Members got busy with their animals and our show started at 1:00. Our judge this year was Dan Skeels. The day started with our 4 heifer projects. All our projects were owned and shown by junior members, and they had a challenge as the heifers were just not happy. The Grand Champion Heifer was shown by Raelynn Ollikka and Reserve Champion went to Daniel Kozma.

At the beginning of the year, we had 4 cow/calf projects registered but unfortunately only 1 two-year-old pair made it to show. Jacob Hyde brought in his pair and received an award for completion of his project this year.

We then moved onto our grooming and showmanship classes. Our



judge for these classes was Mitch McCrady. Members are split into their age category and judged on how they have groomed and prepared the animal for show and then how they show that animal. Showmanship results are as follows: Junior 1st -Alyssa Ollikka, 2nd Raelynn Ollikka. Intermediate 1st - Willow Lyons, 2nd Makenna Ollikka. Senior - 1st Gavin Ollikka, 2nd

Denver Lyons. Grooming results: Junior 1st - Daniel Kozma, 2nd Raelynn Ollikka. Intermediate - 1st Maddox Day, 2nd Makenna Ollikka. Senior 1st Shelby Dowhan, 2nd Gavin Ollikka.

After the completion of the showmanship and grooming classes the beef members took a break for the poultry and market swine members. We had 4 poultry members. Each member raised 3 chickens for sale and butcher. Members

brought their chickens into the ring and followed the judge's instructions on how to check their eyes, wings, bodies etc. The members had to do this presentation in front of the audience and in the end, all received an award for their hard work.

The market swine members now had their chance in the ring. All the swine were brought in at the same time and members had to work hard keeping their pig away from the others so that the judge could see them at all times. Members were judged on

confirmation, grooming and showmanship. Grand Champion Swine belonged to Carter Ollikka and Reserve to Carter Stevens. Grooming Annabelle 1st Stevens, Mackenzie Stevens. Showmanship 1st Carter Stevens, 2nd Gavin Ollikka.

Beef members returned to the ring with their market steers. We had 4 classes of steers and then an overall class. In the end Grand Champion Steer went to Alyssa Ollikka and Reserve Champion Steer to Cohen Ollikka.

This year's winner for rate of gain was Makenna Ollikka. The members had a good day showing their animals and their hard work through the year paid off at the sale.

We had over 50 buvers register for our sale at 5:00. We cannot thank our buyers and community enough for your support of our club. The sale started with our chicken projects. Chickens were sold as a pen of 3. The average price per bird was \$323. The lowest price was \$185 to the highest at \$450 a bird. The market swine was

next to sell. The average for the swine was \$1090 per animal. Then we had our market steers sell. Our lowest price per pound was \$3.50 to the highest at \$5.30. average at the end was \$4.27/lb this year. A huge thank you goes to Waste Management purchasing a steer and then donating it back to our club to resell with proceeds going to the club.

Understanding grief and loss


When a community member approached Thorhild County Family Resource Centre inquiring about services for dealing with grief and the grieving process, Thorhild FCSS collaborated Rural Connections and Alberta Provincial Family Resource Network to enlist the services of Jody Cook, a Clinical Social Worker. Held at the Radway New Horizons Drop in Center, Cook facilitated the workshop "Understanding Your Grief and Loss" and acted as a soothing

guide to help participants find their way through the battlefield of personal grief. During the workshop, Jody Cook encouraged participants to share their personal stories and experiences, emphasizing that they could do so at their own pace and comfort level. She guided them through various tools and strategies, such as breathing exercises, visualization techniques, and healthy coping mechanisms, to help them navigate their grieving process. Cook reassured them that their feelings were valid, emphasizing that they

were not alone in their grief. "You're not crazy, you're grieving." She spoke softly and offered gentle encouragement, urging them to allow themselves to fully experience and acknowledge the physical and emotional effects of grief. Cook acknowledged the difficulty of being vulnerable, highlighting the unique and individual nature of the grieving experience for each person.

The Understanding Grief and Loss workshop was thoughtfully prepared with an ample supply of tissues

and a welcoming atmosphere to encourage open conversations, personal reflections, and shared experiences. Radway New Horizons Drop in Centre was transformed into a safe haven where individuals felt comfortable expressing their emotions, offering support through tears and hugs, while also finding moments of levity and hope amidst the pain of loss. There was a shared recognition that life can be painful, but there was also an emphasis on self-compassion and allowing oneself to find moments of respite.

Participants in the workshop expressed how the experience had been deeply healing and transformative. They found the group to be incredibly supportive and were amazed by the amount of

unexpected wisdom and insights shared by everyone. The connections formed were so powerful that they hoped to stay in touch and continue supporting each other. Tammy Kuefler, Thorhild Family Resource Network Coordinator, expressed her heartfelt regret that there wasn't a local support group like this available on a regular basis, as the participants had uplifted each other and shared valuable personal strategies for coping. Jody Cook provided a beautiful foundation for this workshop as she guided them through it all, explaining the goal was not to reach an end point but to find yourself on the journey, the right now. It was a gentle reminder that each person has control of their own narrative to turn the page of your own story and bit by bit, keep moving forward.

COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS June 11, 2024

Below is a brief summary of decisions made at the June 11, 2024, Regular Council meeting:

Unfinished business: Egremont Community Club Request for Operating Costs Funding Council approved the Egremont Community Club request for operating costs funding in the amount of \$7,758.95 for the 2023 operating year.

Establishment of the 2024 Public Auction Date

Council authorized the 2024 Public Auction date as Tuesday, September 10, 2024, commencing at 10:00 a.m.

2023 Public Auction Title Transfers

Council directed administration to transfer title of the following unsold 2023 public auction properties to Thorhild County

1) Lot 12, Block 2, Plan 3467 CE (4909 - 49 Ave, Hamlet of Radway)

2) Lot 3, Block 7, Plan 6526 NY (909 - 2 Street, Hamlet of Thorhild).

Storm Drain Repairs

Council approved the transfer of \$53,750 from operating reserves to replace four and add one new catch basins in the Hamlet of Thorhild.

New Business - First Reading for Proposed Bylaw 09-2024 to Amend Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015

Council waived the application fee of \$1,000.00 required for Land Use Bylaw amendments as listed in Policy 607 Planning and Development Services Schedule of Fees in relation to the applicants. Furthermore, Council approved First Reading to proposed Bylaw 09-2024, amending the text of Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015, and set the Public Hearing for 10:00 a.m., Tuesday, July 9, 2024, in the County Council Chambers at the County Administration Building for Bylaw 09-2024.

Correspondence for Action - Long Lake Cottage Owners Association (LLCOA)

Council directed Administration to respond to the LLCOA advising them that the ski chalet is a suitable option to rent for events and Council will continue to follow Policy 1213.

Community Economic Development Advisory Board (CEDAB)

Council appointed Shawn Oberg as a member at large to the Community Economic Development Advisory Board with the term to expire October 21, 2025.

Economic Development Officer Project

Council directed Administration to proceed with the advertising of a contract Economic Development Officer position for a 2-year term.

On proposed Bylaw 09-2024 which would amend Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015, by adding and deleting the wording of definitions below to the General Administrative Procedures – Section 1.7 Definitions and adding Recreational Vehicle (Park Model only) as a discretionary land use within the Long Lake Residential District as follows:

Section 1.7 Definitions -

- Definition of Park model:
 - "Park model" means a type of recreational vehicle; however, for the purposes of this Bylaw, park models are not allowed in any District within this Land Use Bylaw unless either recreational vehicles or recreational vehicle parks are listed as a permitted or a discretionary use within the District, and, further, that a park model has been specifically identified and approved by the Development Authority within an approved development permit. The approval of a Park Model by the Development Authority shall be a discretionary use, regardless of whether recreational vehicles or recreational vehicle parks are listed as a permitted or a discretionary use within the **District.** As well, park models shall not be used as dwellings within the municipality.
- Definition of **Recreational vehicle**:
 - "Recreational vehicle" means a vehicular type of unit primarily designed as temporary living quarters for recreational camping or travel use, which either has its own motor or is mounted or drawn by another vehicle. Recreational vehicles include travel trailers, camping trailers, truck campers, 5th wheels, or motor homes, but not manufactured homes, a park model, a garage package, or a cabin on any sort of transportation device such as skids or wheels up to a maximum interior space of 75 m2 (807.3 sq. ft.). Any vehicle larger than 75 m2 (807.3 sq. ft.) in interior space shall be considered to be a manufactured home for the purpose of this Bylaw.

8.8 RL - Long Lake Residential District, (3) Discretionary Uses

- Existing Long Lake Residential District:
 - That Recreational vehicle (Park Models only) be added as a discretionary use under the discretionary column to the Long Lake Residential District.
