It is a place to meet with friends and make connections. Coffee groups are a fantastic way to fight loneliness and enhance a social network of support and belonging. Research shows that people who are more socially connected are at a reduced risk of depression and anxiety. On the other hand, those who are more isolated and lonely are at an increased risk of cognitive impairment, including dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

As individuals age, the need for social interaction becomes even more vital.

Being part of a group allows for the pooling of resources and mutual support.

Additionally, isolation can contribute to various physical ailments such as heart diseases, strokes, and Type 1 diabetes, and it is linked to an increased risk of premortality. mature Regular social engagements can provide structure and comfort, giving older adults something to look forward to and anchoring their days or weeks. Redwater Legion's morning coffee group is not just about the health benefits. It's a unique gathering that holds a special place



in its history, rooted in the tradition of sharing a good cup of coffee.

During challenging times and when far from home, it's often the little things that matter the most. For soldiers, a cup of coffee holds a special place. It has been a staple in U.S. military rations since 1832. While Canadian troops favored tea due to their British rations, the Korean War impacted Canadian soldiers and their preference for American foods, including coffee. The operation saw troops landing on a 50-mile coastline divided into five codenamed beaches: Gold, Juno, Omaha, Sword, and Utah.

Omaha and Utah were entrusted to the Americans, Gold and Sword were under British command, and Juno was the responsibility of the Canadians.

The sacrifices made on that fateful day were profound, with 4,414 Allied troops laying down their lives. Despite the heavy toll and the prolonged struggle to liberate the strategically crucial city of Caen, the landings were hailed as a success. This monumental event marked the beginning of the end for Hitler and Nazi Germany.

The sheer scale and significance of the invasion have etched it into the collective consciousness. It served as a turning point in the war, capturing the public's imagination with its dramatic magnitude. From the moment the troops stormed the beaches on D-Day, World War II in Europe unfolded as a relentless battle until Germany's eventual surrender. The human need to comprehend such profound events is met by the power and significance of D-Day, providing a wealth of compelling stories that continue to resonate.

As time passes, there is a growing awareness of the swift passage of this generation. It is crucial to preserve their stories and honor the memories of those who rest at Normandy, as well as those who bravely fought and survived. As these veterans are aging, it is becoming increasingly important to ensure that their stories are not lost with them.





Here's How It Works:







and strengthening, and it became routine and normalcy amid the chaos of war.

Union soldiers during the Civil War were allotted 36 pounds of coffee every year.

They brewed their daily coffee using water from canteens and muddy puddles, even from brackish bays and the Mississippi River, fluids so unappealing that even their horses refused to drink them. The soldiers relied on coffee before and after marches, while on patrol, and even during combat. This ritual and warmth fostered camaraderie and provided much-needed boosts of energy, a break, and a simple reprieve.

While Redwater Legion does not find itself at the center of a battle, it brings home the sense of closeness and community that comes from wrapping hands around a hot cup of coffee and sharing a togetherness three mornings a week.

Monday Municipality Matters looks at sewer auguring

The Town of Redwater has recently been discussing sewer maintenance. As a municipality, it is important for residents to understand that while sewer issues can be inconvenient, the town aims to clarify responsibilities, after-hours call-outs and fees, and provide guidance on when it is necessary to call a plumber.

When it comes to sewer auguring, it's essential to understand the division of responsibilities. Municipal responsibilities include maintaining and repairing main sewer lines under public streets and alleys or any issues on public property. Responsibilities to residents are maintaining and repairing sewer lines from their property to the main sewer line or

any issues on private property.

The response to sewer backups is outlined in Utility Maintenance Policy #503.1.

After-hours callouts for sewer issues are available if the problem occurs outside regular business hours. Residents can report emergent issues to the municipality's regular line and will be connected with on-call staff. A staff member will assess the situation to determine the cause and location of the problem. The issue will be promptly addressed if it is within the municipality's responsibility. If the problem lies within the resident's responsibility, they will be advised on the

next steps. Residents of the Town of Redwater should note and understand the costs associated with after-hours sewer au-Municipal guring. Charges are if the problem is within the municipality's responsibility, the municipality will cover the cost of the service.

Residential charges are if the issue is deemed to be the resident's responsibility; the property owner

member will assess will be accountable for the situation to de- any expenses related termine the cause and to the service.

The Town of Redwater Fees & amp; Charges Bylaw and are as follows:

- Sewer Backup during regular business hours: \$400.00 for each call-out
- Sewer Backup after regular business hours: \$500.00 for each call out (for up to 2 hours), and then \$100.00 for each subsequent hour


The Town of Redwater understands that sewer problems can often be unavoidable; however, they offer valuable recommendations to minimize the risks. Their three main tips for preventing sewer issues are prop-

er disposal, routine

maintenance, and being mindful of tree roots and their potential to invade and block sewer lines.

Even with mindful attentiveness, there are tell-tale signs that it is time to call a plumber. Residents should be on alert if they experience recurring clogs, slow drainage, foul odors, sewage backups, or water damage. Understanding individual responsibilities, knowing when to call a plumber, and understanding how after-hours services work can better prepare residents to handle sewer issues.




