

NOTICE - PUBLIC HEARING

Proposed Amendment of Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015

On proposed Bylaw 09-2024 which would amend Land Use Bylaw 1194-2015, by adding and deleting the wording of definitions below to the General Administrative Procedures — Section 1.7 Definitions and adding Recreational Vehicle (Park Model only) as a discretionary land use within the Long Lake Residential District as follows:

Section 1.7 Definitions -

- Definition of Park model:
 - "Park model" means a type of recreational vehicle; however, for the purposes of this Bylaw, park models are not allowed in any District within this Land Use Bylaw unless either recreational vehicles or recreational vehicle parks are listed as a permitted or a discretionary use within the District, and, further, that a park model has been specifically identified and approved by the Development Authority within an approved development permit. The approval of a Park Model by the Development Authority shall be a discretionary use, regardless of whether recreational vehicles or recreational vehicle parks are listed as a permitted or a discretionary use within the District. As well, park models shall not be used as dwellings within the municipality.
- Definition of Recreational vehicle:
 - "Recreational vehicle" means a vehicular type of unit primarily designed as temporary living quarters for recreational camping or travel use, which either has its own motor or is mounted or drawn by another vehicle. Recreational vehicles include travel trailers, camping trailers, truck campers, 5th wheels, or motor homes, but not manufactured homes, a park model, a garage package, or a cabin on any sort of transportation device such as skids or wheels up to a maximum interior space of 75 m2 (807.3 sq. ft.). Any vehicle larger than 75 m2 (807.3 sq. ft.) in interior space shall be considered to be a manufactured home for the purpose of this Bylaw.

8.8 RL - Long Lake Residential District, (3) Discretionary Uses

- Existing Long Lake Residential District:
 - That Recreational vehicle (Park Models only) be added as a discretionary use under the discretionary column to the Long Lake Residential District.





a 30-minute period as a safety precaution.

Low Air Temperature Policy: The pool will remain closed if the outside air temperature is 11 degrees Celsius or colder during scheduled swim times and will reopen once the temperature reaches 12 degrees Celsius or higher. To ensure the health and safety of patrons, please note the following policy regarding the Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) and its impact on pool activities: When the AQHI levels are between 7 and 10, pool activities may be canceled or adjusted to mitigate any potential health risks posed by poor air quality. If the AQHI reaches a level of ten or higher, the pool will be closed entirely to protect the well-being of our guests and staff.

If swimming lessons need to be canceled due to inclement weather, all participants will receive timely notification. Every effort will be made to arrange make-up sessions, which typically take place on the Friday of the same week.

Please note that no refunds will be provided for canceled lessons.

To stay informed about pool and swimming lesson closures, contact the pool directly, check the pool's social media pages and website during their regular business hours, and sign up to receive phone notifications if you are registered for a program.

Holding their own: Restaurant and bar sales in Alberta

The restaurant and bar sector is important in and of itself, but it also helps us assess the overall direction of the economy. If sales in the sector are on the rise, it points to a degree of consumer confidence and underlying economic momentum. If sales are sluggish or falling, it sends up a red flag.

With the numbers now in for April, we can say that monthly sales in Alberta grew by 2.0% on a seasonally-adjusted basis. The growth came, however, after a 1.9% pullback in March.

To get a better sense of the trend, it helps to look at how things are shaping up on a year-to-date basis (YTD). When we do that, sales in Alberta were up by 4.4% over the first four months of the year compared to the same period in 2023. The increase, moreover, was on top of a 17.6% YTD jump in 2023 when the sector was bouncing back from the pandemic.

Another way to look at this is sales per capita. Combining the latest quarterly population figures with quarterly revenue, we find that sales per Albertan in Q1 2024 were roughly the same as they were in Q1 2023. Compared to Q1 2022, however, they were 16.1% higher.

What does this add up to? Given the elevated inflation and higher borrowing costs that have prevailed over the last two years, the fact that restaurant and bar sales have not gone down has been a good thing for the sector (recognizing that higher sales do not necessarily mean higher net earnings as operating costs also have to be considered).

The stats also highlight the role played by resilient consumer

spending in warding off the recession that seemed inevitable when interest rates started going up. Albertans are spending more, not less, at restaurants and bars than there were before inflation and interest rates shot up.

At the same time, the lack of per capita growth in the first quarter and indications that the YTD volume of sales has flattened point to consumer fatigue setting in as the lagged impact of higher borrowing costs lands

on more and more households.

With this in mind, we will be carefully watching the trajectory of restaurant and bar sales to see falling interest rates boost consumer spending as expected.

Sun Safety for Everyone

Summertime fun almost always involves getting outside and enjoying the beautiful weather. But it's important to remember to protect yourself and loved ones from the sun's potentially harmful effects.

Start off by trying to stay out of the sun during the peak hours of UV radiation, which are most intense in the morning and afternoon. These rays go right through window glass and can penetrate deeply into the skin. These rays can cause temporary and permanent skin

changes, including premature aging, wrinkling, skin

damage, and sometimes skin cancer. Although individuals with darker skin do not sunburn as easily, they can still get skin cancer. So, it's important to use sun protection, no matter your skin colour.

Find shade if you need to be outdoors. You can also find how much UV exposure you are getting by using the shadow rule. If your shadow is longer than you, UV exposure is low. If your shadow is shorter than you, UV exposure is high.

Protect yourself!

You can start by wearing protective clothing. This can include:

- Wide-brimmed hats that protect the face and neck
- Tightly woven clothes made of thick material, such as unbleached cotton, polyester, wool, or silk
- Dark clothes with dyes added that help absorb UV radiation
- Loose-fitting long-sleeved clothes that cover as much of the skin as possible
- Clothes with a sun protection factor (SPF) in the fabric that doesn't wash out

Sunscreen is a key element to protecting



your skin, but it's important to use it yearround, both on cloudy and clear days. Wear a sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher every day and use sunscreen that blocks out both UVA and UVB radiation. Apply to all exposed skin, including the nose, lips, ears, scalp, back of the hands, and neck. Ensure you are applying 30 minutes before going into the sun, and re-apply every two hours and after swimming, exercising, or sweating.

Use protective lip balm or cream that has an SPF of 30 or higher to protect your lips from getting sunburned. Wear wraparound sunglasses and choose ones that block at least 99 per cent of UVA and UVB radiation.

Be careful when you are on sand, snow, or water because these surfaces can reflect 85 per cent of the sun's rays. Avoid artificial sources of UVA radiation, including sunlamps and tanning booths which, like the sun, can cause skin damage and increase the risk of skin cancer.

Selecting the right sunscreen for you

If you can't avoid being in the sun, use a sunscreen to help protect your skin while you are in the sun.

Sunscreens come in lotions, gels, creams, ointments, and sprays.

Here's how to choose the right sunscreen:

Read the sunscreen label.

- o Be sure that the sunscreen has a SPF of at least 30 or higher.
- Be sure that the sunscreen is "broad-spec-trum." This type of sunscreen protects the skin from ultraviolet A and B (UVA and UVB) rays.

- Check the expiration date on the sunscreen. Do not use the sunscreen after its expiration date. The ingredients in the sunscreen may not work as they should after that date.
- Follow the directions on the label for applying the sunscreen. Doing so will make sure that the sunscreen works well to protect your skin from the sun's ultraviolet rays.

Consider your situation.

- If your skin is sensitive to skin products or you've had a skin reaction (allergic reaction) to a sunscreen, use a sunscreen that is free of chemicals, para-aminobenzoic acid (PABA), preservatives, perfumes, and alcohol.
- If you're going to have high exposure to the sun, consider using a physical sunscreen. These sunscreens, such as zinc oxide, will stop most of the sunlight from reaching the skin. They are usually thick white or coloured cream. They prevent the skin from being exposed to the sun's ultraviolet rays. They are useful for highrisk areas such as the nose, lips, and shoulders.
- · If you need to use sunscreen and insect repellent with DEET, don't use a product that combines the two. You can apply sunscreen first and then apply the insect repellent with DEET. But the sunscreen

must be reapplied every 2 hours.

- If you are going swimming or are sweating, use a sunscreen labelled "water-resistant."
 The label will say if the sunscreen protects you for 40 minutes or 80 minutes.
- Use lip balm or cream that has an SPF of 30 or higher to protect your lips from getting sunburned.

Preventing sun exposure in children

Start protecting your child from the sun when your child is a baby. Because children spend a lot of time outdoors playing, they get most of their lifetime sun exposure in their first 18 years.

Keep babies younger than 12 months out of the sun. This is the safest thing to do for young babies. Children 12 months and older can go in the sun, but they should have their skin protected from too much sun exposure. Teach children how to protect their skin from the sun. Use the "ABCs" to do this.

- A = Away. Stay away from the sun as much as possible from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Find shade if you need to be outdoors.
- B = Block. Use a sunscreen with a SPF of 30 or higher to protect babies' and children's very sensitive skin.
- C = Cover up. Have your child wear clothing that covers the skin, hats with wide brims, and sunglasses with UV protection. Even oneyear-old children should wear sunglasses with UV protection.


