Redwater RCMP reminds motorists to slow down as kids return to school

Redwater RCMP wants drivers to pay extra attention in school and playground zones this September, as children return to class.

Consider the following tips to keep everyone safe this back-to-school season:

• Plan ahead: give yourself extra time to avoid being rushed – it can prevent speeding and allows you to keep safety-focused.

• Know the rules of the road: Reduce your speed to the posted limit in school or playground zones, and pay attention to crossing guard directions. Do not pass school busses with flashing alternating red lights (unless on the other side of a divided highway) - this could result in fines of up to \$567 and six demerits. Avoid blocking crosswalks with your vehicle.

• Stay vigilant: Children can get distracted when school is starting or letting out and may not fully understand the rules of the road. Keep an eye out for kids!

PUBLIC HEARINGS – Bylaw 1648/23: Redistricting Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17 and Non-Statutory Public Hearing for the Estates of Tuscany Outline Plan


Public Hearing - Bylaw 1648/23

Redistricting Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17

Sturgeon County Council requests public input on proposed Bylaw 1648/23. The property owner wants to develop a multi-lot subdivision on their lands at NE-13-54-25-W4M in Sturgeon Valley. This land is currently districted as AG - Agriculture District, which does not allow this type of subdivision and development.


The land must be redistricted before a subdivision application can be submitted. The proposed bylaw would redistrict a portion of NE-13-54-25-W4M from AG - Agriculture District to R7 - Transitional Valley Residential District and PU - Public Utility District.

Each time land is redistricted, a bylaw is needed to amend the Land Use Bylaw, and a public hearing must be held.



Non-Statutory Public Hearing - Estates of Tuscany Outline Plan

Sturgeon County Council also requests public input through a non-statutory public hearing for the proposed Estates of Tuscany Outline Plan. This document would guide the future phases of planning and development of the same lands the property owner is seeking to redistrict NE-13-54-25-W4M.



Note: the east-west collector roadway dedication is conceptual and subject to refinement at the detailed design stage.

Opening up new markets: Canada's natural gas prospects set to improve in the medium term

The current natural gas story in Canada is mixed: short term pain from exceptionally low prices (the AECO price benchmark averaged just \$0.82/MMBtu in August), but solid medium-term prospects.

2024 is the year of market access for Alberta crude oil with TMX coming on line.

But it's on the

natural gas side too, as the new Coastal GasLink pipeline feeds into LNG Canada's natural gas export facility in Kitimat.

Canada is the fifth largest natural gas producer in the world, but does not yet export liquefied natural gas (LNG) to the global market. That will change next year with the completion of the first phase of the LNG Canada facility.

Another

project has been added to the list this year. Cedar LNG announced in late June that it reached a final investment decision and will proceed with the construction of a US\$3.4 billion floating LNG facility in the traditional territory of the Haisla Nation near Kitimat.

Cedar LNG is majority-owned by the Haisla Nation, in partnership with Pembina Pipeline Corp., with 50.1% and 49.9% ownership, respectively.

The new LNG export capacity will support Alberta's natural gas producers with an expected improvement in prices due to the greater market access for western Canadian gas.

In the latest ATB Capital Markets Energy Sector Survey, west coast LNG and crude pipelines ranked as the top growth opportunities for the sector.

the Air Quality Health Index (also commonly known as the AQHI), InfoSmog (in Quebec), special air quality statements or air quality advisories to determine if it is safe to participate in outdoor activities. At home, consider using a certified portable air cleaner, and reduce air contaminants caused by indoor sources such as smoke, candles, cleaning products and incense.

and develops a deeper understanding of the world around them, seek out opportunities to strengthen their financial literacy.

Even at an early age, they'll likely start to accumulate some birthday or chores money.

Explain to them how they have some choices on how to spend that money: use it for instant rewards like buying candy or a small toy, save the money up for a larger coveted item, or use it for a mix of short- and long-term rewards.
