

Town of Redwater encourages deterring skunks

The Town of Redwater is committed to helping residents concerned skunks and potential invasions. Skunks are common in wildlife, particularly in the fall, as they prepare for the colder months. It is important to note that skunks are considered wildlife and are under the authority of Alberta Fish and Wildlife.

The Town of Redwater offers assistance with skunk trap rentals to address any skunk-related sues. Residents can rent these traps with a 100% refundable deposit of \$20.00. If skunks are causing problems in residential yards, these traps can be an effective es. Skunks are drawn

about trap availability, contact the Town Office. It is important to note that skunk traps will not be available between October 15 to March 15 unless explicitly agreed to by the Bylaw Enforcement Officer.

To prevent skunks from making your property their home, it is important to take proactive steps. Make sure garbage is secured. Skunks are attracted to unsecured trash, so it is crucial to ensure garbage is stored in tightly sealed bins. Consider using animal-proof bins and keeping them indoors or in a shed until pickup day to prevent skunks from accessing them.

Remove food sourc-

solution. To inquire to various food sources, including leftover pet food, fallen fruit, and birdseed. To deter skunks, carefully clean up fallen food items and avoid leaving pet outside overnight. Additionally, consider using bird feeders with baffles to prevent spillage and reduce food availability for skunks.

> Install lights. Since skunks are nocturnal animals with poor eyesight, consider implementing a combination of motion-activated solar lights to illuminate your yard at night. This can help deter skunks by making the property less attractive as a potential habitat.

Pioneer Women and their journey West

The journey West may conjure images of cowboys, lawlessness, and a land yet to be explored. It invokes the idea of wagons, horses and farmers breaking their backs establishing workable land. However, the stories of the courageous and resilient women who helped shape this era

are often overlooked.

The decision to to western provinces and settle new land was monumental and difficult.

Women faced harsh living conditions, unforgiving landscapes, and the constant threat of danger. Despite these challenges, the West also presented unique opportunities for women to break free from the constraints of Eastern society. The Dominion Lands Act offered ownership of 160 acres of land free to any man over 18 or any woman heading a household. This opened the door for women who were single or widowed to have ownership of their own property, an opportunity that mostly had been denied to them. The move west offered women the chance to pursue careers and redefine their roles in society.

The expansion of the western provinces also provided women with the opportunity to lead unconventional lives and partake in audacious adventures, challenging societal norms of femininity and motivating a new wave of women to embrace their intrepid nature. Women played a crucial role in founding and upholding communities in the Old West. Apart from their traditional roles of nurturing and managing households, many women also took on the responsibility of educating the younger generation. Pioneer women also made significant contributions to the of frontier towns by participating in a wide range of business endeavors. Some women successfully operated shops, hotels, and restaurants, while others were involved in ranching, farming, and mining.

In both America and Canada, the western movements played a pivotal role in the beginnings of women's suffrage and the advancement of women's rights. While many women in the Old West conformed traditional gender roles, a considerable number challenged societal norms and expectations. The experiences of women in the western settlement were as diverse as the varied land they traveled upon. Some women found opportunities for independence and self-discovery, while others encountered exploitation, adversity, and discrimination. Despite the challenges, the pioneer women of the 1800s left an indelible mark on the western frontier, paving the way for future generations of women to pursue their dreams and advocate for equality.

The stories of women heading West and forging their own path serve as a powerful reminder of the courage, resilience, and determination that have profoundly shaped future generations of women. Block access to shelters. Skunks often seek shelter under decks, sheds, or porches. To prevent them from establishing dens in these areas, consider installing barriers such as lattice or wire mesh to block off access points. Additionally, ensure that any crawl spaces are sealed to prevent skunks from entering.

During fall clean up, trim overgrown vegetation. Overgrown shrubs, tall grass, and dense vegetation can provide ideal hiding spots for skunks. To minimize potential shelter options for skunks, regularly trim bushes, mow the lawn, and maintain landscaping to reduce areas where skunks can take refuge. And finally, use natural deterrents. Spraying areas where skunks may frequent with homemade or store-bought skunk repellents, such as those with strong odors like ammonia or vinegar, can help keep them away.

If a skunk is spotted on residential property, it is important to stay calm and give them space to leave on their own. Skunks typically give warning signs before spraying, such as stamping their front feet, raising their tails, hissing, and making forward charges. If a skunk frequently visits, consider renting a trap from the Town Office with a refundable deposit. Skunks can effectively be prevented from making a yard their home this fall. If there are any questions or assistance is required with trap rentals, feel free to contact the Town Office.

Roseridge hosting free Regional Household **Hazardous Waste** Roundup in Gibbons

Fall is the ideal time to properly dispose of household hazardous waste products accumulated over the year. If you have some half-empty paint cans, mystery liquids in unmarked containers and old electronics hanging around the house, Roseridge Waste Commission's upcoming Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Roundups is for you.

The free event occurs at the Gibbons Cultural Center on Saturday, Oct. 5, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and is open to everyone in the Sturgeon Region. Participants do not need a landfill permit to dispose of their hazardhousehold ous waste products or electronics.

"These events help us keep these items requiring special handling out of the landfill," said Roseridge Executive Director Susan Berry, noting the upcoming Gibbons event is the second of two held by the Commission this vear. The first was held in Morinville this past spring.

Roseridge will accept a large variety of items at the upcoming roundup, which is a partnership with the Alberta Recycling Management thority.

"Any items that display the hazard symbols (corrosive, flammable, reactive/ explosive, toxic/poison), including but not limited to pesticides/ herbicides, cleaning products, and autoproducts," motive Berry explained.

Additionally, common, regulated items received at past events include PCB ballasts, fluorescent light tubes, flammable liquids, including old gas, paint thinners and solvents, mercury bulbs, sulfuric acid, ammonia acid, hydrochloric acid, fire extinguishers, bear spray, propane, malathion, carbon dioxide cylinders, and diesel.

However, Berrv points out that items over 20 litres (5 gallons) or needles/biomedical materials are not accepted at the event due to special handling and disposal requirements.

Berry recommends that residents safely store accepted household hazardous waste


on their property for one of the two regional events where it can be disposed of safely and for free.

In addition to household hazardous waste, the event will include an electronics roundup, where anything with a plug, from old hair dryers to television sets, is accepted. While that opens the door for safe disposal of various electronics products, items containing freon are excluded due to special handling requirements.

"It's convenient, in town, and completely free," Berry said. "Stop in and bring it, even if you have one or two items. Bring those one or two items and keep them out of the landfill."

Roseridgeisopening its new and improved facility on Monday, Oct. 21, but anticipates continuing the Household Hazardous Waste Roundups twice a year as a free event for all residents.

Roseridge Waste Commission is a regional partnership between Bon Accord, Gibbons, Legal, Morinville, Sturgeon County, and Redwater.

Alberta bound continues: KID'S CORNER Province leads in population growth

'Alberta bound, Alberta bound It's good to be Alberta bound'

Hot off the demographic data presses, we are sending a second Twenty-Four today summarizing today's release of the latest population estimates from Statistics Canada.

Population growth continues to run red hot. Alberta's population is quickly closing in on the 5 million mark. It stood at 4.89 million as of July 1, 2024, up 46,200 in the second quarter for a nationleading increase of 1.0%.

Over the last four quarters, an astonishing 204,209 people have been

added to the province (the equivalent of about two Red Deers), representing a growth rate of 4.4%. Alberta's population grew faster than any other province over this period, far exceeding the national growth rate of 3%.

The differentiator interprovincial migration, which shows few signs of slowing as people continue to flock to Alberta from the rest of Canada. Alberta gained 9,654 people (on a net basis) from other provinces and territories in the

second quarter of 2024. This was the 12th quarter in a row in which Alberta's population grew from interprovincial migration, a turnaround from the quarterly losses during the period between mid-2015 and mid-2021.







Reflexology: a worldwide practice

World Reflexology Week was recognized in 2024 from September September 29. The week celebrated and highlighted the benefits of reflexology and encouraged added awareness and understanding of the practice. Reflexology is found and practiced in cultures worldwide and has been praised for providing a huge range of health benefits and an overall improvement in well-being. Reflexology is a type of massage that uses different amounts of pressure on the feet, hands, and ears. It is based on the theory that the hands, feet, and ears are connected to certain organs and body systems. In Canada, Registered Canadian Reflexology provide Therapists this technique and method of care and

Reflexology is a practice rooted in the ancient Chinese belief in "qi" (pronounced "chee"), which can be described as "vital energy". According to this belief, qi is a vital life force that flows through each person. When an individual experiences stress, their body may block the flow of qi, leading to an imbalance that can result in illness. Reflexology tries to remove obstructions to the flow of qi throughout the body. In 1890s, British scientists made a discovery that completely changed the understanding of the human body. They found that nerves connect the skin and internal organs and play a crucial role in how the body responds to external stimulation. This led to the understanding that the body's entire nervous system is incredibly adaptable and can adjust to outside factors, including touch. Reflexology harnesses the power of touch to promote relaxation and overall well-being. Reflexologists focus their touch on calming the central ner-

vous system, leading

to a range of benefits similar to those of traditional massage techniques and alternative medicine.

Experts have discussed that the brain's role in creating and interpreting pain is a complex process. It is suggested that the brain can generate pain as a subjective experience, and this can be influenced by physical stimuli as well as emotional and mental distress. Reflexology may effectively reduce pain by providing a calming touch, which can improve mood and alleviate stress.

Reflexology can also be traced to zone theory; this theory explains that the body is divided into ten vertical zones, each corresponding to specific fingers and toes. By applying pressure to these specific points on the hands and feet, practitioners believe they can access and body parts within a particular zone. This holistic method reaffirms the interconnectedness of the body and the potential for healing specific ailments through the touch of reflexology.

Overall, reflexology is a safe methof treatment. It is non-invasive and comfortable to

influence different receive; it may help reduce stress, aid in digestion, help insomnia, and reduce pain. However, it is always recommended that individuals do their own research and speak to health professionals on their own. 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



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
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
