creations. From pintsized Spidermen to shimmering cesses and from mischievous witches to bold wizards, the air was alive with colour and creativity.





TAKE NOTICE, that the Council of the Town of Redwater, in the Province of Alberta, has given first reading to borrowing Bylaw FIN-05-2024 which will, upon final passage and approval, authorize the proper officers of the said Town of Redwater to borrow monies from the Alberta Capital Finance Authority by way of debenture issue, to pay for the cost of the following municipal purpose(s), namely the the watermain rehabilitation / replacement project for 52 Avenue within the limits of the said municipality

The total cost of the aforesaid project amounts to an estimated \$465,000. The net amount to be reallocated on the credit and security of the municipality at large by the reallocation of debentures is \$465,000. The debentures are to be repayable to the Alberta Capital Finance Authority in twenty (20) equal consecutive semi-annual instalments of combined principal and interest, the semi-annual interest estimated at a maximum interest rate of 7%, or the interest rate as fixed from time to time by the Alberta Capital Finance Authority.

- resides in Alberta and the person's place of residence is located in the local jurisdiction on election day

Application summary

The Alberta Utilities Commission expects to receive an application from Apex Utilities Inc. to reapprove its franchise agreement with the Village of Waskatenau, following the submission deadline indicated below

The franchise agreement will, subject to further renewal, continue to allow Apex Utilities Inc. the exclusive right to deliver natural gas to the residents of the Village of Waskatenau for approximately 10 years from the effective date of the franchise agreement.

The franchise fee rate rider percentage will remain the same at 8 per cent. The average monthly franchise fee for an average residential customer is forecast to remain at \$7.55. The franchise fee is calculated based on distribution charges. An average residential customer uses about 120 gigaioules per year.

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
