

One of the old cowboys, Wayne Marcelle Gaboury, 75, died at his Smoky Lake home Monday, November 11, 2024. Wayne was born to **Bud and Lucille** Gaboury at Sexsmith, Alberta. A few years

later, Wayne was blessed with a brother Doug. Wayne and Doug had many adventures growing up on their farm near Teepee Creek.

Wayne made his start in the world working for a guiding outfit. Then he worked rigs for many years mainly with Nabors Drilling.

One August 17, 1968 he married the love of his life and lifelong best friend Barbara. They settled in Teepee Creek Alberta and built a farmstead in 1978 while working closely with his dad and brother farming as well as working in oil patch and driving his water truck.

Wayne is survived by his wife Barbara. Together, they had three children, Michelle (Geoff) Jackson, **Wade Gaboury and Nicole** (Marcus) Hallowes. Wayne is survived by grandchildren Elyse (Joey), Genevieve, Madeleine, Taylor, Reid, Addison, Layne, Tristan and Westin.

Wayne enjoyed working with horses most of his life and was a team roper on the NRA and

Timberland rodeo circuits. Wayne loved the Teepee Creek stampede and was on the organizing committee and participated in many stampede events. He won some prize money but

sometimes came home with nothing but muddy clothes and a perfect imprint of a horseshoe on his back from the wild horse race.

Wayne enjoyed golfing especially at Spruce Meadows out near Sexsmith. He was a decent curler and hurried hard at the Trucker's Bonspiel. The Gaboury's moved to Sexsmith in 1987 and there he started his business, Hi Pressure Washers.

Wayne and Barb never quit dreaming about horses and started racing standardbred horses in Grande Prairie and then in Cloverdale, BC. Retiring from horse racing and wanting to be near their children and Alberta sunny skies, they retired in Smoky Lake with their beloved dachshunds and ready crib board.

Wayne's family will be conducting a service with his immediate family. Wayne was a character but will be missed by many. Hoping he finds green pastures, a horse and dog to be a friend and a trail to lead an old cowboy home.

These sessions are an opportunity for you to share your input and ideas on the current MDP. Your feedback will play a key role in shaping the updated plan, ensuring it reflects the needs and aspirations of our community for the future.

Come help shape the future of Thorhild County!

At each Open House, there are three planned interactive sessions to gather valuable input:

- 1. Rural Community Mapping Workshop: This session features a large map of the county where residents can mark areas they envision for future land use, as well as highlight geographical areas of concern or aspiration, especially as they relate to rural and agricultural lands. This exercise is essential to help understand community members' priorities for rural spaces and gather insights on areas that need preservation, development, or special attention. Your input directly informs how to approach rural land use decisions in the updated MDP.
- 2. **Priority Setting:** There are identified, approximately 50 rural and community-focused theme words, representing topics and goals that could shape the municipality over the next 20 to 25 years. Residents can select the themes they feel are most important and should be emphasized in the Municipal Development Plan. This session is critical, as it ensures that the MDP aligns with rural values and aspirations, addressing areas such as agricultural preservation, environmental stewardship, and rural quality of life.





Relatively speaking: New vehicle sales in Alberta

New vehicle sales provide an indication of how a large slice of the retail sector is doing. They also provide a sense of how the economy is doing overall, with higher sales suggesting things are going well enough for more people and businesses to make a major purchase like a new vehicle. (Interest rates are also a factor with lower borrowing costs facilitating sales and vice versa.)

So what are the new vehicle sales statistics telling us about how things are going in Alberta?

On the bright side, the recent trend has a nice upward slope (see the chart below). The number of new vehicles sold in Alberta has increased 20 times (on a year-over-year basis) between January 2021 and September 2024.

Despite signs of consumer fatigue setting in (retail sales in Alberta have been fairly flat with per capita sales declining), the number of new cars being sold points to some underlying resilience in the provincial economy.

But, as the chart above also shows, relative to the years leading up to the pandemic, the number of units rolling off lots in Alberta in 2024 does not appear especially strong. Unit sales between January

and September 2024 were, for example, 8% lower than over the same period in 2018 even though Alberta's population was 14% larger.

Although it is a positive sign that new vehicles sales are on the rise in Alberta, because they down relative to past periods, this suggests two things: 1) there is likely more room for them to climb back up as the provincial economy expands next year (lower interest rates will also help): and 2) even though Alberta's economy is performing well vis-à-vis the country as a whole, it has lost a few steps since the last boom cycle period in 2014.

diligently installing new drywall throughout the facility. This funding has gone towards refinishing countertops and enhancing the kitchen area, which is currently undergoing an extensive renovation. Though not all of these funds have been utilized, they are earmarked for new stoves, a backsplash, and curtains. Discussions are actively taking place to determine the best allocation for these resources to fulfill the building's most critical needs


cal needs. With the excitement surrounding the newly refurbished facility, a surge of creative ideas are bubbling up. Thorhild Drop-In Centre now boasts a state-ofthe-art television and speaker system (purchased with funds from Thorhild Co-op BBQs), a free threeyear contract with MCSNet, and a diverse selection of games, all of which make it an ideal venue for a wide range of events. The dedicated volunteers are eagerly brainstorming new ways to expand what it can offer and create more activities within the community.

One new upcoming program is Floor Curling. Members discussing the building and its previous role as a hub of entertainment remarked,

They have been digging through back rooms and looking at ways to revisit some old favourite programs. This event will provide a platform for the community to voice its aspirations for the facility's future endeavors and an introduction to floor curling. The floor curling program, designed as a drop-in activity, is poised to evolve as interest grows. The space is being carefully prepped and painted, salvaged curling stones from previous generations are being lovingly oiled, new curling sticks have been acquired, and generous scoreboard donation from Redwater Floor Curling is set to elevate the experience. 
Each time land is redistricted, a bylaw is needed to amend the Land Use Bylaw, and a Public Hearing must be held.

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
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
