





#### What is Bylaw PD-02-2024?

The MDP is a high-level, policy document that guides the long-term vision for how the town will grow and develop. The MDP provides a broad framework that quides decisions on land use, infrastructure, housing, economic development, and environmental sustainability. The new plan is built on seven guiding principles: A Prosperous and Efficient Town; An Affordable and Livable Town; A Distinct and Vibrant Town; A Healthy and Safe Town, A Resilient Town; A Collaborative Town and; An Organized and Effective Town.

#### What does this mean?

If adopted, the new MDP will set a clear vision and framework for Redwater's future. Guided by principles like prosperity, livability, safety, and resilience, it will shape decisions on land use, housing, economic growth, and infrastructure. This plan will ensure sustainable growth while preserving Redwater's unique identity and supporting a vibrant, collaborative community.

#### How can I get more information

Any member of the public may review the proposed bylaw and ask questions. A copy of the proposed bylaw is available at redwater.ca or you can visit the Town Office during office hours where staff can explain what is proposed, how it might impact you, and how the Public Hearing process works.



Lemm, a retired military pilot renowned for his sharp wit, unparalleled sarcasm, and love of adventure, passed away on Thursday,

December 19, 2024, at the age of 82 years. Born in Creston, British Columbia to Mary and William Lemm he called Penticton his home until he enlisted in the Canadian Air Force and lived in various parts of the country until settling in Sturgeon County in 1982.

Bob, as he was known by friends, family, and countless fellow service members, led a life filled with high-flying achievements, a few misadventures, and a lot of laughter. After retiring from a career as a military pilot, he found new ways to stay airborne—whether navigating the skies in his personal plane or simply steering conversations into bold, humorous and sometimes contentious territory. He had a rare gift of making anyone laugh, often with a well-timed guip or a perfectly delivered sarcastic remark. His trademark humor made him a beloved figure in both his military and civilian life.

Living on a farm filled Bob with a passion for collecting—and let's be honest, borderline hoarding. This place has become a mechanical wonderland, filled with cars,

engines, wrenches, and tools stacked in every corner. It's not so much about organization as it is about rescuing old projects and the faint hope that one day, something might come in handy. The farm is a testament to the joy of fixing things that don't need fixing and collecting "just in case"—even if that case never comes. If something of yours was borrowed, please let us know so we can ensure you get it and a few other items back.

Though Bob's demeanour was legendary, it was his love for his family that defined him. He is survived by his wife, Theresa Poulin; two grown children Sonja Shank (Vincent) and David Lemm (Danielle); and five grandchildren, all of whom will carry his wit, humor, and legacy forward. Bob's love for them was unwavering, and while he often joked that he had "seen it all," nothing in life brought him more joy than watching the family grow and thrive.

## **COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS** December 17, 2024

Below is a brief summary of decisions made at the December 17, 2024, Regular Council meeting:

#### **Delegation - Thorhild and District Agricultural Society**

Council accepted the presentation from the Thorhild and District Agricultural Society for information, and further approved the request from the Thorhild and District Agricultural Society for operating costs for 50% of funding of utilities and insurance expense for a total of \$40,984.

#### Long Lake Block Wells Survey Follow-up

Council directed Administration to extend the deadline for responses to the Long Lake Block Wells survey to February 3, 2025.

#### 2025 Draft Operating and Capital Budgets

Council approved the amended 2025 Operating Budget, and the 2025 Capital Budget as presented, and further directed Administration to bring forward a 2025 budget summary to a future Council meeting.

#### Draft Bylaw 16-2024 Water and Wastewater Rates Bylaw

Council gave first reading to draft Bylaw 16-2024 Water and Wastewater Rates.

#### **Request to Waive Application Fees**

Council waived the Development Permit Application fee for The Friends of Newbrook Library Society of \$70 and Egremont Community Club of \$200 for their gazebo developments. Council did not waive the Safety Codes fees as requested by The Friends of Newbrook Library Society and Egremont Community Club for their gazebo developments.

#### **Bounty - Beaver and Pocket Gopher Tails**

Council increased the bounty to \$40 per beaver tail and \$3 per pocket gopher tail effective January 1, 2025.

#### **Victoria Trail**

Council directed Administration to obtain costs of replacing the Victoria Trail signs and bring back to a future Council meeting.

#### Correspondence for Action - Chair of the Thorhild County Library Board

Council directed Administration to draft a response to the Chair of the Thorhild County Library Board for Council's approval.

Supervise Outdoor Time: Keep a close eye on pets outside, as those not used to cold can struggle even for short periods.

## HAMLET SIDEWALK CLEARING

Help keep our hamlets safe for pedestrians by clearing snow and ice from sidewalks bordering your property, including in front of your driveway. Please avoid placing snow and ice onto the roadway or adjacent properties.

Remember, it is required by Thorhild County's Community Standards Bylaw that snow and ice is removed from any sidewalk within 48 hours after snow and ice has been deposited.

#### SNOWPLOWING ON PRIVATE PROPERTY

Thorhild County operates a driveway snow removal program for residents (excluding hamlets) who register and pay for flags.


- Driveways will be addressed after all County roads are cleared
- Driveway plowing consists of one pass in and back out
- Fees and flags must be purchased before the work is done
- Each flag is good for one plow only

#### Fee:

\$35.00/Flag

\$20.00/Flag for seniors 65+ who are physically living on the property and can provide age verification.

To register for driveway cleaning, sign an easement form and pick up a flag. After the storm, place the flag at the end of your driveway where it can be seen by the grader operator. Visit the County Administration Building at 801 1st Street, Thorhild, to obtain and sign the easement form.






