12- year hiatus, which was always a favourite but was canceled due to a decrease in the number of volunteers. This year, just like last showed amazing support and many hands quick to pitch in to make the Bullarama a success. "We have a really strong core group of volunteers with the Ag Society, and we were pleased that we filled all the volunteer spots within a few days of sending

out the call," remarked Alex Torguson, President of the organizing committee.

Local talents also shone through the competition, with Aidan Mazurenko and Brody Bandurka representing the community. Aidan made a commendable short go with a score of 79.5 points, ultimately securing a 5th place finish overall in the event average, despite being bucked off in the

championship round.

The event concluded with Gilmar Santana from Brazil taking home the title, scoring an impressive 83.5 points in the championship round and winning \$3,475.00 as part of his victory.

Aside from the exhilarating rodeo rides that had spectators cheering and gasping, the Bullarama also featured a table auction and a 50/50 draw, which raised funds to

assist in replacing a compressor for the local ice plant, scheduled for installation this fall.

The night wrapped up with an adult dance featuring the Ryan Snow Band, where the dance floor was filled with energy, as everyone pulled up their boots and enjoyed a night of two-stepping, twirling toe-tapping enjoyment.

Sturgeon County launches first- ever Youth Emergency Services Academy

Sturgeon County is set to host its first Youth Emergency Services (YES) Academy from July 21 to 23, 2025. This unique, immersive experience will bring together thirty youth, ages 14 to 17, for a three-day, two-night program designed to mirror the responsibilities and demands of emergency service professionals.

The academy is designed to engage youth in meaningful ways, enhance their understanding of emergency services, and spark interest in potential careers

within the field. Throughout the program, participants will engage in handson activities, physical training, and informative presentations that reflect the real-world experiences of first responders.

Throughout camp, youth will eat, sleep, train, and learn in a structured environment that closely resembles the experience of attending a professional emergency services academy. Sessions will be led by experts from a range of organizations, including the (K-Division), Fire Services, Enforcement Services,

Canadian Armed Forces, Emergency Medical Services, and Corrections. These sessions will focus on emergency services skills and knowledge, while also promoting teamwork and personal growth.

The program is open to Sturgeon County residents between the ages of 14 and 17, who are currently enrolled in school, capable of moderate physical activity, and able to demonstrate responsibility and commitment. Applications will be accepted until 4:30 PM on Friday, May 16, 2025.

Participants will be

selected based on eligibility, a completed application form (including a waiver, agreements, and a reference letter), and demonstrated interest in emergency services. Strong teamwork, leadership abilities, and good disciplinary standing at school will also be considered.

Springtime in Alberta comes with a noticeably dry start

spring folds across central Alberta, the province is grappling with unusually dry conditions that raise concerns for agriculture, wildlife, and water resources. Typically spring brings with it the smell of rainfall and an explosion of varying shades of green as the world comes back to life. Instead, this spring so far has brought about a stark and worrying reality for residents and farmers alike. Several counties have already issued fire advisories for their communities and extending farther east,

there are outright fire bans already in place.

Historically, Alberta springs have seen a mix of precipitation and mild temperatures, allowing for a gradual thaw and replenishment of soil moisture. However, this year, many regions are noticing lower than usual rainfall. There are also reports that several areas of the province are experiencing drought conditions due to low snowpack.

There is always concern that this will lead to an impact on wildfire season, crops and natural ecosystems. Predominantly, farmers within rural areas discussing their

of moisture. They rely heavily on not only rainfall, but soil saturation as well for the success and germination of their crops.

Another ongoing concern is over irrigation and the demands it places on already reduced water sources. These systems are at risk of increased pressure especially if the dry conditions follow into the summer months. The challenges and exploration of alternative strategies are crucial to avoid depletion of water that is there.

Beyond agriculture, the dry weather is also affecting

concern over the lack Alberta's diverse ecosystems. Wildlife, which depends on healthy habitats supported by regular rainfall, is feeling the impact. Streams and rivers are running lower than usual, which affects fish populations and other aquatic life forms, altering the balance of local ecosystems.

> Dry conditions also bring with it the risk of wildfires. As everyone knows, dry springs have the potential to lead to destructive fire seasons and is always an opportunity for emergency services to prepare for potential wildfires and raise awareness about fire safety and emergency response.

> The drier conditions in Alberta this spring serve as a genuine reminder of the environmental challenges faced by the region. As residents. farmers, and wildlife look ahead at these challenging conditions, it brings up the importance of sustainable practices and collective action to safeguard Alberta's natural resources for the future.

> While the current situation is concerning, it also provides an opportunity for communities to come together and forge a path toward resilience in the face of adversity. It also serves as a serious reminder to be careful and diligent with everything from cigarettes to burn barrels to fire pits.

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FIRE ADVISORY NOW IN EFFECT Effective April 24, 2025 at 8:00 a.m.

In compliance with Thorhild County Emergency Services Bylaw 12-2023, Section 26, a Fire Advisory is hereby enacted for the municipality of Thorhild County until further notice.

All open fires requiring a fire permit under Bylaw 12-2023 are canceled, and no new permits will be issued. Property owners are strongly urged to inspect all previous burn sites to ensure that they are completely extinguished to mitigate any wildfire risk.

Prohibited Activities:

- All open fires necessitating a permit under Bylaw 12-2023
- · Wood campfires on public lands
- Discharge of fireworks
- Use of exploding targets

Approved Activities:

- Backyard fire pits in compliance with Bylaw 12-2023, Subsection 14(b)
- Wood campfires in designated public campgrounds
- Burn barrels and incinerators adhering to Bylaw 12-2023, Subsection 14(c)
- Use of CSA-approved propane and charcoal-fueled devices
- Open flame oil devices (e.g., tiki torches, deep fryers)
- CSA-approved electrical cooking and heating devices
- Operation of off-highway vehicles on public lands equipped with spark arresters

Thorhild County strongly advises all residents to exercise extreme caution when conducting any hot work (such as gas torch operations, grinding, cutting, etc.) or driving in grassy areas. Be alert to hot exhaust and maintain vehicles in a clean condition to prevent smoldering debris from causing fires. Ensure a suitable means of extinguishment (e.g., water, fire extinguisher, fire blanket) is readily accessible.

Please note that approved activities or devices do not exempt users from fines if they inadvertently start a wildfire.

Advance polling met with record number of voters

Although the 2025 Canadian Federal Election is now complete, as the election approached, advanced polling became a focal point for both voters and political analysts interested in gauging the electorate's mood ahead of the official voting day.

The advanced polling results, which are never published until all polls have closed, revealed significant trends that could shape the outcome of the election.

The week following advanced polls had each political leader hitting the ground running as participation in advanced polling saw a notable increase record-breaking numbers compared to previous elections, reflecting a growing

ceptance of early voting among Canadians. Many voters took advantage of the flexibility offered by advanced polling, resulting in higher turnout in key demographics, including younger voters and first-time voters.

In analyzing the results, several noteworthy trends emerged. For instance, regions with strong community engagement initiatives and extensive outreach efforts by local candidates tended to experience higher advanced voter turnout. These efforts included informational campaigns that emphasized the importance of participating in the democratic process and provided clear instructions on how to vote early. Additionally, certain issues dominated discussions

during the advanced polling period, such as healthcare, housing, tax rates, immigration, grocery prices, tariffs and more. Voter sentiment surrounding these topics significantly influenced the strategies employed by political parties as they geared up for the main election. The advanced polling data indicated that parties focusing heavily on these issues were more likely to appeal to the electorate.

The advanced polling serves as an upfront demonstration of potential shifts in each voters' allegiance. They highlight the differences in support between candidates and offer parties a stepping to double their efforts and engage voters before the official election date, all of course,



with the hopes that they will swing the vote in favour of their own party.

The conclusion of the advanced polling dates shone a light on an engaged and proactive electorate, raising expectations for a competitive and closely watched election. The final push leading up to election day is often fought with the insights

Self-inflicted: IMF sees trade war hurting U.S. economy the most

The prospects for the U.S. economy keep getting worse.

In its March outlook, the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development downgraded its forecast for U.S. GDP growth in 2025 from 2.4% (as of its December outlook) to 2.2%.

Yesterday, another internationalorganization—the International Monetary Fund (IMF)—also downgraded its forecast for U.S. economic growth this year, dropping it 0.9 points from 2.7% (as of its January forecast) to just 1.8%. This is the largest downamong grade vanced economies.

The IMF is not forecasting a U.S. recession, but the odds of this happening have increased from 25% (as of the IMF's October outlook) to 37%.* (J.P. Morgan is more pessimistic, pegging the odds of a U.S. recession at 60%.)

The IMF forecast is based on information available as of April 4, 2025 (including the April 2 tariffs and initial responses), so it does not reflect the 90-day pause on the reciprocal tariffs announced by the U.S. on April 9 or the escalation of the U.S.-China trade war that has seen both countries impose tariffs on each other of over 100%. (See the tariff timeline prepared by The Peterson Institute for International Economics for information on the evolving trade war.)

The global outlook has also darkened with the IMF pegging real GDP growth this year at 2.8%, down from 3.3% in its January forecast.

As for Canada, the IMF shaved 0.6 percentage points off its previous forecast with growth now expected

to come in this year at just 1.4%.

The reasons given for the downgrades are not surprising: tariffs and the associated uncertainty surrounding them.

The IMF, however, doesn't stop there and stresses things could easily get worse: "Intensifying downside risks dominate the outlook.... Divergent and swiftly changing policy positions or deteriorating sentiment could lead to even tighter global financial conditions. Ratcheting up a trade war and heightened trade policy uncertainty may further hinder both short-term and long-term growth prospects."

*The recession risk for 2025 is defined by the IMF as the probability that 2025 annual growth in the U.S. will be below 1.2%, consistent with a shallow recession starting in the third quarter.





- 12/3 cups beef stock
- 3 bay leaves
- 4 to 5 sprigs young thyme, plus extra for garnishing
- 1 small bunch chives, snipped
- Freshly ground black peppercorns
- 1. Preheat the oven to 275 F.
- 2. Heat the sunflower oil in a large, wide saute pan or casserole dish set over a moderate heat until hot. Add the bacon and fry until golden and crisp, 7 to 8 minutes. Remove from the pan to a plate lined with paper towels.
- 3. Dust the chuck steak with the flour, shaking off the excess. Season with salt and pepper before browning in the pan, in batches, over a moderately high heat. Remove from the pan to a bowl.
- Return the pan to a medium heat. Add the butter, let it melt, and then stir in the onion, carrot, pearl onions, and a pinch of salt.
- Saute for 8 to 10 minutes until colored. Add the garlic and tomato passata, and cook for a further
- Return the beef to the pan and deglaze with the wine, scraping the base to release any stuck-on
- Stir in the stock, bay leaves and thyme sprigs, and bring to a boil. Once boiling, transfer to the oven.
- Braise for about 90 minutes to 2 hours, stirring occasionally, until the beef is tender and easy to
- Remove from the oven and season to taste with plenty of salt and pepper. Serve from the pan with a garnish of snipped chives and some thyme

- 2. Add the onion, garlic, celery, and a generous pinch of salt, cooking for 6 to 7 minutes until softened. 3. Stir in the dried herbs and vegetable stock. Bring
- to a simmer before stirring in the beets. 4. Simmer gently for 20 to 25 minutes until the beetroot is very tender to the tip of a knife.
- 5. Purée with an immersion blender, adding in some of the reserved beetroot juice to thin out the consistency to your liking; you can also thin it out with more stock or some water.
- 6. Return the soup to a simmer and stir in the yogurt and some salt and pepper to taste. Keep warm



- over a very low heat, making sure the soup does
- 7. To serve: When ready to serve, ladle into warm bowls and top with some yogurt.
- Garnish with a scattering of chopped pistachios, mixed seeds and some mint leaves before serving.

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





Students at Redwater School recently participated in the Civix Student Vote Canada program, an educational initiative that allows young Canadians to experience the democratic process firsthand. 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



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
