

Equipment malfunction at Thorhild Landfill leads to leachate release

On April 24, Waste Management of Canada Corporation (WM) reported an equipment malfunction at the Thorhild landfill, where a pump failed overnight, resulting in the release of leachate outside of the permitted lined area. Fortunately, the incident occurred well within the confines of WM’s property.

Upon discovering the issue, WM

immediately activated its response protocols, informing both Thorhild County and Alberta Environment and Protected Areas (AEPA) of the situation on the same day. Subsequently, a written update was provided to Thorhild County, detailing the incident and the company’s remediation efforts.

Despite the equipment failure, WM is reassuring the public that its design and

containment systems effectively contained the leachate, preventing it from impacting surrounding areas. “We take our environmental responsibilities seriously and want to assure the community that there has been no impact to downstream water sources,” stated a WM representative.

The company’s swift action in addressing the situation included halting operations, documenting the

incident, and undertaking necessary clean-up measures.

This involved the removal of potentially affected soils and the engagement of a third-party consultant to ensure compliance with AEPA requirements. By April 25, the remediation efforts were largely completed, with final steps expected to conclude in the coming days. “Environmental stewardship and safety for local communities

are core values at WM, and we are committed to addressing this issue promptly and effectively,” the representative added. As WM continues its efforts to maintain safety and environmental integrity, the company emphasizes its dedication to transparency and communication with the community throughout this process.

Many residents throughout Thorhild County have connected

under the group Thorhild County Residents United (TCRU) with the mission of “collaborating to bring positive change to our community.” In the aftermath of the leachate release, TCRU is determined to remain an active participant in the conversation surrounding and safeguarding their community’s health and environment and is striving to advocate for safer practices.






Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1548/21

Sturgeon County Council requests public input on proposed Bylaw #1680/25 Sturgeon Industrial Park Offsite Levy Bylaw 1548/21 Amendment.

Sturgeon County Council deems it necessary to establish Off-Site Levies to pay for the capital costs of new and expanded roads, for new or expanded water and wastewater facilities, for new or expanded stormwater facilities, and the land required in connection with those facilities, all of which will be required as a result of anticipated subdivision and development within the Sturgeon Industrial Park Area.

A bylaw is needed to amend existing bylaws, and a public hearing must be held.

Heartland Air Monitoring Partnership 2024 Annual Report to the Community Released

Heartland Air Monitoring Partnership (HAMP), the organization that monitors the air local residents breathe, has released its 2024 Annual Report to the Community.

Highlights

- Significant Improvement in Air Quality: During the spring, summer, and fall of 2024, the region experienced a 44% decrease in high and very high Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) readings compared to 2023. Overall,

air quality remained stable or improved across the Heartland, with HAMP’s long-term trends report confirming that the region’s poorest air quality days are typically linked to major natural events such as wildfires or winter temperature inversions. According to the 2024 public perception survey, over 91% of residents rated air quality as average or better—maintaining a stable trend since 2019.

- New Identity for HAMP: In May 2024, Fort Air Partnership officially rebranded to Heartland Air Monitoring Partnership (HAMP). The new name better reflects the organization’s broad regional reach and focus. HAMP also introduced a new logo featuring an owl, symbolizing vigilance, knowledge, and a commitment to clean air.
- Air Quality Monitoring and Data Insights:

HAMP expanded its monitoring network by relocating the portable Keith Purves station to Thorhild in April 2024, strengthening northern regional coverage. The organization’s continuous air monitoring equipment achieved a 98.58% uptime—well above the Government of Alberta’s 90% minimum requirement. Air quality exceedances also dropped significantly, from 2,178 in 2023 to 976

in 2024, largely due to reduced wildfire smoke impacts.

- Engaging and Educating the Community: In 2024, schools in the Airshed partnered with HAMP to install micro-sensors to track fine particulate matter with their students. A refreshed air quality curriculum is set to launch in fall 2025. HAMP’s Fresh Air Experience Photo Contest reached over 7,800 people on social media in October 2024, highlight-

ing community pride in clean air. Regular e-newsletters continue to deliver air quality insights to the community, with 10–12 issues annually.

Thorhild County residents living beside county gravel roads are eligible for new and/or maintenance applications of either oil or calcium dust suppression product.

OPTION 1: OIL BASED (County Residents)
NEW application of oil - \$4,578.00 per 100 lineal meters
MAINTENANCE Program - \$3,620.00 per 100 lineal meters.

OPTION 2: CALCIUM (County Residents)
Calcium - \$460.00 per 100 lineal meters.

County residents may apply for the Dust Suppression Program by calling the Public Works Office at 780-398-3977 and register to have a request form emailed.

You may also pick this up at the Public Works Office at 21414 Twp Rd 600A.

Payments can be made by mail, credit card, drop box at the County Administration Building. Please call 780-398-3741 to notify of drop box usage.

The application period is April 14 - May 31 of the current year. A late fee of \$100 per application after May 31 of the current application year will be applied.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENT INSPECTIONS





Redwater wildfire burns over 3,000 hectares — containment decreased amid shifting winds

STURGEONCOUNTY, AB — Fire crews continue their urgent efforts to control a wildfire in the Redwater Provincial Recreation Area, which has now burned an estimated 3,060 hectares as of May 9. The fire was previously reported as 70 per cent contained on May 4, but worsening wind and weather conditions have led to increased fire activity, and that level of containment no longer applies.

The wildfire originated from an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) that caught fire in a remote area, believed to be due to an electrical or mechanical malfunction. The resulting blaze quickly spread through dry forested terrain and continues to challenge responders due to shifting winds and difficult access.

Alberta Wildfire and Sturgeon County Fire Services are leading the response, supported by aerial suppression and heavy equipment. Crews are actively reinforcing fire guards and working to

protect homes and infrastructure near the fire's edge.

Evacuation Status

The evacuation areas remain in place and include:

- Evacuation Order: Between Range Road 213 east to Range Road 203, and Township Road 580 south to the North Saskatchewan River.
- Evacuation Alert: From Range Road 223 east to the North Saskatchewan River, and Township Road 580 south to Township Road 570, including areas near Redwater.

At least one farmhouse has been lost, and residents in surrounding areas are urged to be prepared to evacuate on short notice as the fire situation remains volatile.

A reception centre is open at the Morinville Leisure Centre, offering support to evacuees.

Stay Informed and Prepared

Officials urge the

public to:

- Check updates regularly at www.sturgeoncounty.ca/active-fire
- Be ready to evacuate quickly if alerts escalate
- Stay away from the Redwater Provincial Recreation Area and surrounding trails

While cooler temperatures may offer some help in the coming days, winds remain a major concern and fire crews are bracing for continued challenges. The safety of residents, responders, and property remains the top priority.
