The Redwater Citizens on Patrol (RCOP) program continues to serve as a vital part of the local crime prevention strategy, offering both support to the RCMP and reassurance to residents. A not-for-profit chapter of Alberta Citizens on Patrol (ACOPA), RCOP is made up entirely of dedicated volunteers who patrol Redwater and its surrounding subdivisions, observing and reporting any suspicious activity.

"We are the eyes and ears for the local RCMP, reporting suspicious activity. Our presence helps to deter crime," explained Henry Goeckel, a spokesperson for the group.

Currently, RCOP has 14 active members. Volunteers patrol in pairs using a vehicle owned and maintained by the organization.

Building tomorrow: how Thorhild County is driving local economic change

Thorhild County submission

Thorhild County is setting its sights on creating a bright future through continuing its Economic Development initiative aimed at strengthening the regional economy. Since the launch of this project in September 2024, the County has focused on economic development through supporting local businesses, promoting entrepreneurship, and increasing investment readiness. By addressing both present-day challenges and future opportunities, the County aims to build a resilient economic foundation that serves the entire community.

This work is being carried out in partnership with Lochaven Consulting, a firm with over 25 years of experience in economic development and management consulting. The shared goal is to strengthen the economy from the ground up and prepare the community for future growth.

The seamless registration and support provided to those impacted showcased the hard work and preparation of each member. Their ability to adapt and step in wherever needed made a crucial difference, ensuring that everyone received the care and assistance they required during that turbulent time.


When directed to open the reception centre, everyone pitched in to set up tables and chairs, put on coffee, set up snacks, hung signs, reviewed maps and information and waited for evacuees to arrive. The reception centre remained open and manned through the night into the late afternoon of May 7. Approximately forty households were registered and while many had family nearby to stay with, several households did require accommodations in Westlock.

While not all team members received a direct call to action for this particular response, it is essential to emphasize that this was a result of the team's substantial structure and readiness. Having a strong enough group to meet the immediate needs of the residents is a testament to their dedication and preparation. If the situation had escalated, all hands would have been on deck, demonstrating the true spirit of teamwork that defines the local ESS.

Regarding ESS and their response, the team leaders believe that communication and feedback are vital to growth and effectiveness. It is encouraged that all team members







share thoughts on what worked well, suggestions for improvements, and any insights from this experience. Personal experiences and voices are invaluable in shaping response strategies for future emergencies.

As ESS reflects on the recent event, they extend their deepest gratitude to each volunteer for their hard work, commitment, and compassion. These individuals are the backbone of our community's emergency response efforts, and it is through their unwavering support that as a community there is connection and commitment to face any challenge that comes their way.

A thank you goes out once again

for the incredible service of everyone involved. Comments regarding emergency services revolved not only around the ESS volunteers and their amazing dedication, but also around Thorhild County's fire department and their quick readiness and spectacular staging in their response to the fire.

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



Redwater RCMP makes arrest in wildfire sprinkler tampering investigation

On May 8, 2025, Redwater **RCMP** members were conducting patrols in the evacuation zone when they noticed a male that appeared to be trespassing. Upon further investigation, they learned that the man was tampering with sprinkler

systems that were set up by the fire department to protect residences from wildfires, rendering them inactive. Officers the susarrested pect and charges are pending approval. An update is anticipated once charges are laid.

"We want to send a clear message to those who have evacuated as well as to those who enter evacuation zones to cause

harm" stated S/Sgt. Michael Jaszczyszyn, District Advisory NCO for Eastern Alberta District. "We are patrolling evacuation areas to ensure the safety of the communities and will continue to apprehend, arrest and charge all those who commit activities criminal within those zones, especially those than can facilitate the spread of wildfires".

Sturgeon County Council requests public input on proposed Bylaw #1680/25 Sturgeon Industrial Park Offsite Levy Bylaw 1548/21 Amendment.

Sturgeon County Council deems it necessary to establish Off-Site Levies to pay for the capital costs of new and expanded roads, for new or expanded water and wastewater facilities, for new or expanded stormwater facilities, and the land required in connection with those facilities, all of which will be required as a result of anticipated subdivision and development within the Sturgeon Industrial Park Area.

A bylaw is needed to amend existing bylaws, and a public hearing must be held.

If adopted, these amendments will allow for more flexible and responsive land use management within the Town of Redwater. The changes ensure that the Land Use Bylaw continues to support development that meets the needs of the community, improves accessibility and equity in site design, and provides clearer administrative procedures. The updates also introduce new discretionary and permitted uses to support a broader range of residential, commercial, and industrial activity.

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

The House in the Middle of the Road

In the heart of the Victoria District, nestled along the winding Victoria Trail, stands a peculiar landmark known to all (and registered as a local landmark and historic location) as "The House in the Middle of the Road." For decades, it has captured the attention of passersby and locals alike, primarily due to its unique position — mere feet from the road, right at a gentle bend. To those approaching from the east, it appeared as though the house was daringly situated right in the path of travel, a fitting nickname for a building with such a remarkable presence.

The tale of this house begins in the early 1900s, amidst the fond memories of homesteading life. River Lot 14, where the house now stands, was once home to Simon Whitford and

his family, who lived in simpler structures closer to the riverbanks. In 1905, Simon applied for a homestead, a promise of land and stability for his family's future.

Tragically, he passed away before his application was approved. His wife took up the mantle, continuing the dream for their family, but fate had other plans, claiming her life in 1906 before she could see the homestead realized.

After the Whitfords, Henry Anderson, sonin-law to Simon, and his partner Joseph Favell took ownership of the land. Between 1906 and 1912, they began constructing the notable house that stands there today, marking a shift from the simpler life of earlier years to a more substantial settlement style. It wasn't until 1912 that Henry finally saw his homestead application approved,

although his efforts had long been set into motion by the generations of the past.

The architectural style of "The House in the Middle of the Road" reflects this progression. With its one-and-a-half stories, shingled distinctive gable roof, dormer windows, and dovetail log construction, the house represented a blend of practicality and emerging artistic flair. Unlike the single room log homes that had come before, this residence stood as a testament to the increasing complexity and creativity of homebuilding, embracing innovations such as multi-levels and wooden shingle cladding.

As years rolled on, the property changed hands, each new owner adding their touch to its story. In 1914, Spurge Van Iderstein purchased the property and later sold

it to Ivan Ference in 1926. Then in 1948, the Charuk brothers, Sam and Tarus, came into the picture. They made the house their home, living there until 1974. After they moved on, the property entered the hands of Donald Van Iderstein, grandson of its earlier owner, Spurge. In 1988, Brent Fletcher took over, keeping the legacy alive to this day.

Today, "The House in the Middle of the Road" stands not just as a structure made of logs and shingles but as a living history of the community, a remarkable narrative of the hopes and hardships of the settlers who came before, reflecting their dreams, struggles, and the inevitable changes that shaped the land over time. Each weathered log and empty window tells a story, a reminder of the resilience and evolution of life in the Victoria District.

Patrol routes include all streets and alleys in Redwater, as well as the nearby industrial area. Waterdale Subdivision, Park Hills and Juniper Subdivision. Members use the ACOPA app during patrols to trace their routes and document any concerns. These reports are then forwarded to the local RCMP for follow-up.

Beyond their patrol work, RCOP members participate in regular meetings to stay informed and engaged. Monthly member meetings are held at the Redwater Legion, additional while

monthly sessions involve representatives from the RCMP, peace officers, sheriffs, and the Safe Communities for Sturgeon County initiative. These collaborative meetings focus on addressing crime trends and discussing potential solutions to issues facing the community.

In 2024, RCOP members completed an impressive 38 patrols. covering a total of 1,869 kilometers. They logged 249.6 hours of driving time, contributed 136 hours to administrative duties, and dedicated 397.2 hours to events and community engagement activities.

RCOP's commitment

to community involvement goes beyond patrolling. The group has hosted crime prevention seminars and taken part in numerous British Columbia, and local events, including Saskatchewan. This sig-Redwater Discovery Days, the Festival of Trees, Kris Kringle, and Redwater Community Night. On Halloween, RCOP members add a visible safety presence by handing out candy while on patrol. contributing to a safer and more festive atmosphere for local children and families.

Looking ahead, RCOP is preparing to host the 2025 ACOPA Annual General Meeting and workshops. Scheduled September 12-14, the event is expected to bring together over 100 Citizens on Patrol members from across Alberta. nificant gathering will highlight the Redwater chapter's role within the broader network of community-based public safety initiatives.

To become an RCOP member, individuals must complete an application process that includes submitting a clear criminal record check and a clean driver's abstract. New recruits are encouraged to attend COPA workshops and safety seminars, and full training is provided. The

organization is actively welcoming new members, and anyone interested is invited to attend the monthly meeting held on the third and Cannabis (AGLC), Wednesday of each which will help finance month at the Redwater Legion Hall or to reach out via email at redwatercopa@gmail.com.

To support its operations, RCOP has introduced window decals and gate signs that promote the group's visibility within the community. "Proceeds of these sales go towards truck maintenance, fuel, insurance and other miscellaneous expenses," noted Goeckel. The decals are available for \$10, while larger gate signs are

priced at \$50. The organization also recently completed a fundraising casino through Alberta Gaming, Liquor RCOP's activities for the next three years.

Despite the group's achievements strong community support, one ongoing challenge remains: creasing membership. "Recruiting more members. With additional members, we can do more patrols," said Goeckel. As crime prevention relies on community involvement, RCOP encourages anvone interested in making a difference to consider joining their ranks.



Responding to growth: Residential building permits in Alberta

The monthly numreleased morning by Statistics Canada show an uptick in the value of residential building permits in Alberta in March.

by multiple-dwelling projects, permit value was up by 20% compared to March 2024.

The monthly numbers tend to be quite volatile, so it's important to look at the trend over a longer period. As the chart below shows, residential permit


values have been on a strong upward trend since 2022.

The upward trend in permit value is in keeping with the rapid pace of housing starts in the province.

Both the permit and housing starts trends point to the need for housing construction to continue to catch up to the population boom Alberta has been experiencing 2023. Alberta's population growth was the highest in the country last year at 3.5%* with real-time estimates showing it just passed the 5-million mark.


Although Alberta's population growth is forecast to slow, ongoing increases combined with the housing backlog will continue to support new residential construction in the province. Our current tracking sees housing starts cooling slightly to 45K this year from 47.8K in 2024, but this still represents a strong pace of new home construction in the province.
