The Redwater Rebels are gearing up for an exciting season, and one of their first big moves is the signing of veteran defenceman Wesley Gryba-Smith—a driven, agile player whose passion for the game runs deep.

Hailing from Grandview, Manitoba, Wesley's hockey story started early. "I started when I was four," he said. "My parents got me playing for the Rocanville Tigers pre-novice team." What began as a small-town beginning quickly

evolved into a serious journey through competitive hockey.

As he progressed, Wesley suited up for the Moosomin Ice Badgers AA and later the Parkland Rangers AAA, where he really found his stride—and caught the attention of scouts. "That's where I was noticed by the Gibbons Pioneers and signed there," he explained. "It was a big step in my development."

His 2023-24 season with the Gibbons Pioneers was a strong one. Wesley notched 14 points in 21 games, showcasing his ability

to contribute at both ends of the ice. Still, he wasn't done chasing lifelong dreams.

"I took a year away from junior hockey to play for the team I dreamed of playing for as a kid—the Rocanville Senior Tigers," he shared. "We made it all the way to the finals but lost out."

Still, it was an amazing experience."

That experience gave Wesley a renewed sense of purpose. Enter the Redwater Rebels.

"That's when Ryder [owner of the Rebels]

contacted me,” he said. “I was really excited to get this offer and the opportunity to play junior again.”

energy, and leadership is exactly what the Rebels need as they prepare to make their mark in their inaugural season.

“I'm ready to dig in and give everything I've got,” he said. “This is a team I believe in, and I'm proud to be a part of it.” As the puck drops on a fresh season, all eyes will be on Redwater—and on Wesley Gryba-Smith, a player bringing not just skill, but heart, history, and hometown grit to the ice.



There's always room for pizza

When it comes to pizza, it is often difficult to stop after just one slice. Although pizza originated in Italy, people from all around the world have made pizza their own by experimenting with different flavor combinations and toppings.


Whether you're in the camp who thinks it isn't pizza if there's more than mozzarella cheese and red sauce on the crust or the one who feels the sky's the limit for pizza adventures, it's hard not to like "Buffalo Chicken Pizza." This recipe pairs the heat and tang of Buffalo wings with the familiarity of pizza's crunch. Try this medley of flavor, courtesy of "30-Minute Meal Prep: 100 Healthy and Delicious Recipes to Eat All Week" (Sourcebooks) by Robin Miller.

Buffalo Chicken Pizza

Serves 4

- 13.8-ounce container refrigerated pizza dough
- 1 cup ricotta cheese
- 3 tablespoons powdered ranch dip/dressing mix
- 2 cups shredded cooked chicken
- 1/4 cup hot sauce, such as Frank's, or hot sauce of choice
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

- Chopped fresh chives for serving (optional)
 - Bottled ranch dressing for serving (optional)
1. Preheat the oven to 400 F. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper or aluminum foil.
 2. Unroll the pizza dough on the prepared pan, and shape as desired. I chose a 10-by-12-inch rectangle. Bake for 6 minutes.
 3. Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the ricotta and powdered ranch, and mix well.
 4. In another bowl, combine the chicken and hot sauce, and mix to cover the chicken with the sauce.
 5. Spread the ricotta mixture all over the pre-baked crust, to within half an inch of the edge.
 6. Arrange the chicken over the ricotta, and top with the mozzarella.
 7. Bake for 6 to 10 minutes, until the edges of the crust are golden brown and the cheese melts.
 8. Top with fresh chives (if using), and serve with ranch dressing on the side (if using).



Sizzling seafood is a summertime staple

It's grilling season, and people are on the lookout for delicious recipes they can easily cook outdoors. Many fall back on tried-and-true favorites because they may be apprehensive about grilling with new ingredients. But grilling is more than just burgers and steaks. In fact, seafood is a great option for the grill, and it cooks up in a snap.

The following recipe for "Grilled Striper with Cactus and Black Beans" from "Jon Bonnell's Texas Favorites" (Gibbs Smith) is a great seafood dish to grill up this summer.

Grilled Striper with Cactus and Black Beans

Serves 4

- 4 fillets wild striped bass, approximately 8 ounces each
- 1 teaspoon southwestern blend rub
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 4 cactus paddles (called nopales in Mexican markets)
- 3 cups Bacon-Laced Black Beans (see below)
- 1 lemon

1. Clean the fish well, removing any bones and scales, and pat dry. Dust each fillet

with the rub, then brush each with canola oil just before grilling. Grill over high heat for 3 to 4 minutes on each side until the fish is cooked through. The time may vary, depending on your grill.

2. Clean the cactus paddles well with a sharp knife, removing any small needles. Grill the cactus over high heat, just tossing it right onto the grill bars — no oil, no seasonings. Once the cactus begins to bubble slightly, turn over and season with a sprinkle of the rub. As soon as both sides are lightly charred and the cactus is bubbling inside, it's ready to serve. Pull the cactus from the grill and cut into strips. Line a platter with a layer of the cactus and top with the black beans; then lay the grilled striper on top. Finish with a squeeze of fresh lemon and serve.


Bacon-Laced Black Beans

Serves 8 to 10

- 1 pound black turtle beans, rinsed under cold water
- 1 large yellow onion, diced and divided
- 4 strips bacon, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt

- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

1. Place the beans and half of the chopped onion in a saucepot with just enough cold water to cover. Soak in the fridge overnight, then simmer for approximately 1 hour (do not drain), just until the beans become soft. Strain the liquid into a separate bowl and keep it for later.
2. In a separate pot, render the bacon, then add the remaining onion and the garlic. Sauté until the onion has softened; then pour the beans and 1 cup of their cooking liquid into the pot. Puree the mix with a stick blender until smooth.



Make it a 'berry' good day for cobbler

Blueberries are out in full force when the weather warms. Blueberries are delicious freshly picked, and can be topped with some light cream for a refreshing dessert. Blueberries also are equally at home baked in muffins, breads and cobblers.

The following recipe for "Blueberry Lemon Cornmeal Cobbler" courtesy of "Vegan Cooking for Beginners!" with recipes curated by Publications International, Ltd., pairs the tang of lemon with the sweetness of blueberry for the perfect treat. It's great for dessert or even served for brunch.

Blueberry Lemon Cornmeal Cobbler

Makes 8 to 10 servings

- 3 tablespoons boiling water
- 1 tablespoon ground flaxseed
- 5 cups fresh blueberries
- 1/2 cup plus 1/3 cup sugar, divided
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice, divided
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 1/2 tablespoons finely grated lemon peel, divided
- 1/2 cup plain unsweetened soy milk or almond milk
- 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup fine-ground cornmeal

- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup coconut oil, melted

1. Preheat oven to 375 F. Spray 8-inch square baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Combine boiling water and flaxseed in small bowl. Let stand until cool.
2. Combine blueberries, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, cornstarch, and 1/2 tablespoon lemon peel in large bowl; toss to coat. Spoon into prepared pan.
3. Combine soy milk and remaining 2 tablespoons lemon juice in small bowl; let stand 5 minutes. Combine flour, cornmeal, remaining 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon peel, baking powder and salt in medium bowl; mix well. Add soy-milk mixture, coconut oil and flaxseed mixture; stir until just combined. Drop topping by 2 tablespoons into mounds over blueberry mixture.
4. Bake 40 to 45 minutes or until filling is bubbly and topping is golden brown. Let stand 30 minutes before serving.



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Labouring under tariffs: Job vacancies on the wane in Alberta



In another sign of labour market softening in Alberta, the job vacancy rate* has fallen for the 11th quarter in a row.

After reaching a high of 4.9% in the second quarter of 2022, the rate has come down by two percentage points to land at 2.9% as of the first quarter of this year.

The rate averaged 2.7% between 2015** and 2019 before ratcheting up in 2021 and 2022 as the disruptive impact of the pandemic and subsequent recovery worked their way through the economy.

In absolute terms,



the number of vacancies has fallen from over 100K in 2022 to under 62K today.

It is essentially the same story for Canada as a whole, with the

national vacancy rate also falling for 11 quarters in a row to 2.9%, albeit from a slightly higher peak of 5.6%.

An interesting development is that

Alberta's job vacancy rate has now converged with the national average after spending over seven years below it from 2016 to mid-2023.

Unlike the rest of Canada, the vacancy rate still remains higher than pre-COVID levels in Alberta.

Regionally within Alberta, the west side of the province (Banff-Jasper-Rocky Mountain House and Athabasca-Grande Prairie-Peace River) has the highest vacancy rate in the first quarter at 3.7% (down from a high of 7.8%) and the Red Deer region the lowest at 2.4% (down from a high of 5.0%).

While the overall vacancy rate has moderated, it is higher in some sectors than others. Two sectors continue to stand out in this regard: specialty construction trade

contractors and food services and drinking places.

With tariffs and ongoing trade war uncertainty dampening economic growth, we expect the labour market both nationally and provincially to continue to remain soft this year.
