Three Sturgeon County athletes to represent Team Alberta

Three local football players are heading to the national stage. Mason Funk, Travis Heal, and Micah Lorenzin have been named to Team Alberta's roster for the 2025 Football Canada

U16 Western Challenge.

It's a big moment not just for the players, but for Sturgeon County, which will have strong representation at one of the most competitive youth football tournaments in the country.

The path to making the

team was highly competitive. It started with over 400 hopefuls- 200 from Northern Alberta and 200 from the south. From those tryouts, 100 players from each region were selected to compete in a North vs South showcase. After that, just 66

were invited to a final provincial camp, where coaches made the tough decision of narrowing it down to the top 40 athletes to represent Alberta on the national stage.

Alberta tackles age-appropriate book concerns

Alberta Education and Childcare Minister Demetrios Nicolaidis hosted a rural media roundtable on June 17 to discuss proposed age-appropriate book standards for schools. The discussion addressed implementation concerns for school boards, particularly for schools located within municipal libraries, which would not be subject to the new guidelines despite providing access to students.

The proposed standards aim to protect "underage minor" children and would affect school libraries from kindergarten through grade twelve. Nicolaidis emphasized that the initiative is not about banning diverse materials but rather establishing clear guidelines for schools to follow. He stated that compliance would largely be the responsibility of individual districts, which may choose to limit or remove certain materials.

Currently, four biographical graphic novels have been flagged as concerning, though Nicolaidis remarked on the difficulty in quantifying the total number of inappropriate materials that could be impacted by these guidelines. He acknowledged the value of coming-of-age themes for older children but expressed disagreement regarding the inclusion of sexually explicit content.

Redwater welcomes new mural to downtown

The Redwater Art Society has recently completed an exciting community enhancement project by installing a mural in the heart of downtown Redwater. This impressive piece can be found at the north end of the Library/Town office on 50th Avenue, with photographs documenting the mural's creation generously provided by the Redwater and District Museum.

The mural not only beautifies the area but also pays homage to the rich history of the Redwater community. The mural serves as a

reminder of the pioneering spirit of local families, such as the Litwins. Mrs. Mary Litwin (nee Kolmatycki), along with her mother and young son Nestor, were part of the original homesteaders in the Redwater district, having begun their journey in 1904. With 15 children, the Litwin family epitomized the determination and resilience of pioneers. Nestor went on to serve his country in the RCAF, and despite facing challenges, including a serious injury in 1957, he became an influential educator, teaching at St. Francis of Assisi from 1966 to 1994.

The mural also reflects the hard-working spirit of the oil industry in Redwater, featuring a depiction of roughnecks on a drilling rig from 1949. Drilling was tough, gritty, and fraught with dangers, requiring strength and agility from those who worked on the rigs, often without the benefit of modern safety equipment.

The realization of this mural would not have been possible without the generous support of several local organizations. Special thanks are extended to the Redwater Legion for their financial contributions, the Redwater Museum for both financial support and historical photographs, and the Town of Redwater, particularly Dede Gordy and Cliff Dallyn, for their unwavering encouragement.

A heartfelt appreciation goes to the dedicated members of the Redwater Art Society, whose commitment and efficiency were vital to bringing this mural to life. The club, which has been nurturing the arts in the community since the 1980s, counts Terri Hannah (president), Orphelia McKenna, Lea Cook, Della Shannon, Barbara Gaboury, Lola Alsmo, Carol Cook, Chantel Antoniak, and Jeannie Hare among its committed members.

For those interested in learning more about the mural and the history behind it, a visit to the Redwater Museum is highly recommended. The museum is open during the summer months from Monday to Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., providing a wealth of knowledge about the local area and its storied past. This mural stands as a testament to the community spirit of Redwater, capturing a piece of its history and the creativity of an amazing group of people.


In Legal and Gibbons, the "Best Tasting Lemonade" was served by Wai Lemi, run by siblings Kadence, Arianna, Scarlett, and

Nicolaides also highlighted preliminary findings from a public survey on the new rules, noting that a detailed overview will be released soon.

Additionally, he mentioned meetings with early childcare education providers, addressing topics such as the childcare affordability grant and the renegotiation of the Alberta Canada-wide early learning and childcare agreement.

Looking ahead, Nicolaides confirmed scheduled discussions with the Alberta Teachers Association (ATA), which has recently voted to strike due to concerns over long-standing education underfunding resulting in inadequate staffing for school libraries.

Although the guidelines have not been implemented yet, they are anticipated to take effect in the 2025 school year.

PUBLIC HEARING – Bylaw 1665/24 Amendment to Land Use Bylaw 1385/17

Sturgeon County Council is asking for public feedback on proposed Bylaw 1665/24. A property owner would like to continue to operate an existing natural resource extraction operation (Pit 45) on their land at 54309 Hwy 44 (legal land description: NE, NW, SE, SW-20-54-26-W4, NE-19-54-26-W4, SW-21-54-26-W4, and NE-17-54-26-W4).

This application does not propose expanding existing boundaries for aggregate extraction. To issue a new development permit in line with updated Land Use Bylaw regulations, subject lands must be rezoned. The applicant is requesting the land be rezoned to RE-DC2 – Resource Extraction Direct Control 2 District - which allows Sturgeon County Council to establish site-specific criteria and regulations that the operator must follow.

Each time land is rezoned, a bylaw is needed to amend the Land Use Bylaw, and a public hearing must be held. Learn more about the proposed bylaw and how to get involved at SturgeonCounty.ca/hearing-1665/





Newbrook Public Library hosts a day of science and discovery

On the afternoon of June 25, the Newbrook Public Library transformed into a center of innovation and learning as it welcomed the Telus World of Science - Science in Motion team. Expand your grilling horizons

Grillmasters are always looking to push the envelope and expand their grilling horizons. While standard fare like hot dogs and hamburgers will always find its way onto a backyard barbecue's menu, some grillmasters prefer to try new things and surprise their friends and family members along the way. Ambitious grillmasters hoping to surprise their guests should consider the following recipe for "Grilled Herb-Rubbed Game Birds" from Peggy Knickerbocker's "Simple Soirees" (Stewart, Tabori & Chang).

Grilled Herb-Rubbed Game Birds, Serves 6

- 6 game hens, squab, or pousins, cut in half
- 1 teaspoon salt
- For the marinade**
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh thyme or rosemary leaves
- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- Pinch of crushed red pepper flakes, optional
- Herb sprigs, for garnish

1. Pat the birds dry and season them generously with salt.
2. In a small bowl, stir together the garlic, salt, pepper, thyme, olive oil, and red pepper flakes.
3. Do not rinse the salt from the birds, but make sure they are very dry; pat with paper towels. The secret to crispness is very dry skin. Stuff a little of the marinade under the skin of the birds and rub the rest on the outside. Cover, refrigerate and marinate the birds for 30 minutes or overnight. Save any remaining marinade.
4. Prepare a charcoal fire or preheat a gas grill to medium.
5. When the coals are medium-hot, place the birds on the grill, skin-side down. Cook for about 15 minutes, until they are brown and crisp. Turn and continue to cook for another 15 to 20 minutes, brushing with a little of the remaining marinade. To check for doneness, make an incision at the point where the thigh meets the body of the bird, if the juices run clear and there is no visible redness, take them off the grill. Smaller birds will take a little less time, about 15 minutes on the skin side and only about 10

- minutes once flipped.
6. Transfer the birds to a warm platter and scatter a few sprigs of herbs over the tops.



Enjoy a Classic Diner Dessert at Home

Perhaps no dessert dish is as beloved as the banana split. And as any good banana split aficionado knows, diners often make a great banana split with fudge sauce.

For those who want to bring their favorite dessert out of the diner and into their own kitchens, it's not as hard as it sounds, and you won't have to worry about ice cream melting in the car. Dessert lovers who enjoy making their own banana splits should consider the following recipe for "Banana Splits With Hot Fudge Sauce" from Jennifer Joyce's "Diner" (Ryland, Peters & Small), a comforting collection of

recipes from the roadside diner.

Banana Splits With Hot Fudge Sauce Serves 4

- 4 small bananas
- 4 scoops each of strawberry, vanilla and chocolate ice cream
- 4 maraschino cherries
- 1/2 cup chopped, toasted pecans
- Hot fudge sauce**
- 3 ounces semisweet chocolate, chopped
- 3/4 cup heavy cream
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 cup light corn syrup

- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup sugar
- Whipped cream**
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1 tablespoon superfine sugar
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1. To make the hot fudge sauce, put the chocolate, cream and butter in a medium saucepan. When melted, add light corn syrup, vanilla extract and sugar, stirring constantly over medium heat. When nearly boiling, turn the heat down to low and simmer for 15 minutes without stirring. Let cool for 5 minutes before using.
2. To make the whipped cream, beat the heavy cream with the sugar and vanilla, and set aside. Peel the bananas and cut in half lengthwise. Take the dessert dishes and along the sides of each one, put 2 banana halves. Put one scoop of each flavor of ice cream between the bananas. Top with one spoonful of the whipped cream, a sprinkling of pecans and a cherry on top. Serve with a small pitcher of the hot fudge sauce to pour over.



Add some flavor to an old favorite

When cooking cabbage, the trick to keeping it green is to cook it very briefly. To add flavor, add some bacon and nutmeg, just like in the following recipe for "Braised Cabbage With Bacon and Nutmeg" from Sophie Braimbridge's "Stylish Mediterranean" (Kyle Books).

Braised Cabbage With Bacon and Nutmeg Serves 4

- tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 5 ounces bacon or pancetta, sliced or diced
- 1 large garlic clove
- 1 heaped tablespoon chopped sage or rosemary leaves
- Good pinch of nutmeg
- Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

1. Remove the outer leaves of the cabbage and wash them if dirty or trim if wilting. Cut in half, removing any thick stems. Then finely slice. Quarter the remaining cabbage, remove the thick core

and finely slice.

2. Add the oil and bacon to a large lidded saucepan and cook on a high heat until light golden brown. Chop the garlic and sage, turn the heat to low, and add them to the pan. Cook briefly, then add the cabbage, adding a splash of water if you think the cabbage might brown.

- Season with nutmeg, salt and pepper. Cover the pan and cook gently for another 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, and adding a dash more water if it's sticking on the bottom. You want the cabbage to retain its nice green color.
3. Server immediately -- you can reheat it, but the color may fade!


health but also contribute to their overall well-being.

Flags lowered in Redwater for National Day of Remembrance for Victims of Terrorism

On June 23, the Town of Redwater joined municipalities across the country in lowering its flags to half-mast in solemn recognition of the National Day of Remembrance for Victims of Terrorism. Observed annually, the day honours the lives lost and forever changed by acts of terrorism, both in Canada and around the world.

The date was chosen to coincide with the anniversary of the Air India Flight 182 bombing in 1985—a heartbreaking tragedy that stands as the worst terrorist attack in Canadian history. The flight, en route from Toronto to London with a planned stop in Montreal, exploded in mid-air off the coast of Ireland, killing all 329 people on board. Of those lost, 280 were Canadian citizens, including families, children, and entire communities deeply affected by the unimaginable loss.

In Redwater, the flag at the Town Office was lowered

at sunrise and remained at half-mast until sunset. Though a small gesture, this act of remembrance aligns with a national show of respect and solidarity with those affected by terrorism. It reflects Canada's continued commitment to remembering the victims and recognizing the enduring impact these acts have on individuals, families, and communities.

Beyond the Air India tragedy, this day serves to honour all victims of terrorism—those who have been injured, displaced, or left to cope with the emotional trauma of violence. It is a reminder that terrorism is not just a distant, global issue; it has touched Canadian soil and Canadian lives.

In the years since 1985, Canada has seen other acts of violence driven by ideology or extremism. From attacks targeting public places to incidents that have taken the lives of soldiers, police, and civilians, the effects of terrorism have rippled across the nation in various

forms. While the motivations and circumstances vary; the pain left behind is tragically consistent.

Communities like Redwater take part in this national day not only to pay tribute to those lost, but to stand against violence in all forms. The act of lowering flags is a symbolic but powerful way to demonstrate respect, reflect on the lessons of the past, and commit to the values of peace, tolerance, and resilience.

Education and awareness also play a key role in the observance. Across the country, schools, workplaces, and organizations use the day to reflect on the causes and consequences of terrorism, as well as the importance of unity in its aftermath. Memorials, moments of silence, and remembrance ceremonies are held in cities and towns, creating space for reflection and healing.

In addition to its role in commemorating the victims, June 23 is a day to honour the strength of survivors

and the courage of first responders who have faced these crises with bravery and compassion. It is also a day to support those still living with the psychological effects of terrorism—grief, anxiety, and loss that linger long after the headlines fade.

The annual observance encourages Canadians to remain vigilant and informed, but also compassionate. As acts of terror continue to affect nations around the world, Canadians use this day to reaffirm a collective hope for a future where such violence no longer occurs—and to remember that behind every act of terrorism is a deeply human toll.

By participating in the National Day of Remembrance, the Town of Redwater recognizes that healing and memory are ongoing processes. The community stands in solidarity with all who have been impacted, and through this act of remembrance, helps to ensure that those lives are never forgotten.




