The Town of Redwater is investing in community safety this fall by offering two youth-focused programs aimed at teaching practical life skills and emergency preparedness. The Junior Lifesavers Program and the Home Alone Safety Course will both take place in November at Pembina Place, giving young residents an opportunity to build confidence, responsibility, and knowledge in a supportive environment.

The Junior Lifesavers Program, scheduled for Thursday, November 13, runs from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Golf and Curling Lounge at Pembina Place. This non-certified first aid program introduces participants to a wide range of emergency response skills in a hands-on, accessible format. Topics covered include emergency scene management, head and spine trauma, choking protocols, burns, medical emergencies, and injuries related to heat and cold exposure. The course is designed to provide participants with practical tools they can use in everyday situations, whether caring for younger siblings, assisting elderly relatives, or volunteering in the community.

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
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Ease the break: The Bank of Canada cuts its policy rate to 2.5%

After an extended 'wait and see' period, the Bank of Canada decided it was time to resume its rate cutting last week.

The decision to trim its policy rate by 25 basis points to 2.5% did not shock us, and most others in our line of work. It was our call.


With today's cut - the first since March - the Bank is confident that enough progress is being made on inflation as it deals with the now-apparent negative effects of the trade war.

As we reported last week, headline inflation has cooperated, falling below 2% in each of the last five months. Core inflation is more sticky, but the Bank said today that too may be improving.

Meanwhile, the Canadian economy has cooled (GDP shrank 1.6% in 2025Q2) and the labour market has weakened (unemployment at 7.1% in August - highest since 2016 outside of the pandemic).

Stateside, the U.S. Federal Reserve is widely expected to cut its policy rate later today - not because of inflation progress (it's around 3%), but because of a darkening employment picture.

Thorhild County Council Approves Third ball diamond development

In a significant achievement for local sports enthusiasts, the Thorhild County Council has officially approved plans for the development of a third ball diamond within the community. This decision marks a significant step forward for both local sports organizations and youth programs. The approval comes with a commitment from the Council for a long-term lease of the land, paving the way for grant applications and sponsorships that will help fund the project without requiring any financial contribution from Thorhild County or Thorhild County residents. This endeavor

is a collaboration between the Thorhild Agricultural Society, Thorhild Minor Ball, and the Feledichuk Curran Memorial Tournament, bringing with it a united effort to enhance the community's recreational facilities. Though the origins of the idea for a third ball diamond are not definitively known, its benefits are clear. Thorhild Minor Ball will be able to provide a broader range of programming options to local youth, and the Feledichuk Curran Memorial Tournament plans to expand its capacity, allowing more teams to participate, which could lead to an increased fundraising opportunity for essential community organizations.

This expansion will also support the Thorhild & District Agricultural Society in attracting more visitors to its tradeshow, family fair, and dance, which will once again be held alongside the ball tournament in 2026. In a show of support for the project, community member Donna Ellefson referred to the upcoming facility as the "Field of Dreams," capturing the collective hope and enthusiasm surrounding this project. It's a remarkable culmination of efforts from three organizations working together to bring a greater resource to Thorhild. Now, as the project gains momentum, the focus shifts to securing the necessary

funding to cover the projected cost of \$87,000. The organizing trio is actively exploring various avenues, including fundraisers, grants, and corporate sponsors, to ensure the realization of this community dream. They encourage community involvement, inviting anyone interested to participate in fundraising efforts or to contribute as donors. With optimism in the air, a shared vision exists that construction of the new ball diamond will commence in time for the 2026 baseball season. The construction of the third diamond will be located on the old school site at the intersection of 6th Avenue and 2nd Street.

The hamlet of Namao has held tightly to its roots since the first family settled there in 1881. On September 13, the community came together to celebrate the 100-year-old building that now houses the Namao Museum.

The Namao Museum Society was formed in 1993 by local residents who wanted to preserve the area's history. They acquired a two-storey wood-frame home, built in 1925 by Miles and Catherine Kennedy for their family of eight children. Originally located on what is now the Sturgeon Valley Golf Course, the house was moved to Namao and restored as a museum.

Although the Kennedys only lived in the home briefly—Miles passed away in 1926 and Catherine in 1928—the building went on to serve tenants before the society relocated it. To

prepare the house for its new life, volunteers removed old rugs, uncovered hardwood floors, remodeled the kitchen, and saved features like an upstairs laundry chute. The bricks, each weighing six pounds, had to be stripped from the exterior before transport. Through casinos, bingos, bake sales, garage sales, and ticket raffles, the society raised the \$50,000 needed for moving and restoration.

The museum now invites visitors to explore furnished rooms, clothing displays, and unique collections. In 2005, the Namao Agricultural Barn was added, filled with artifacts from farming, coal mining, schools, and local stores. Outside, vintage machinery such as a paddle grain elevator and harrow cart are displayed, while inside visitors can

find relics like an early telephone system and accounts of the 1959 Carbondale train collision.

Exhibits also highlight the achievements of community members, including Lawrence McIntyre, a longtime breeder of Clydesdale horses, and John Crozier, recognized in the Edmonton Sports Hall of Fame.

The celebration extended beyond the museum, with activities at the community hall—built on the site of the original Namao School—and music in the historic Namao United Church, which has served the community since 1903.

Johnny's Store, a 123-year-old business once home to a post office and featured in film productions, was also recognized for its place in local history.

The one-day event was hosted by Sturgeon County in partnership with the Namao Museum & Archive Society and the Namao Agricultural Society as part of Alberta Culture Days.

that the program is especially beneficial for babysitters, teenagers, seniors, and junior volunteers who may encounter emergencies and need the confidence to respond quickly and effectively. By focusing on real-world

scenarios rather than textbook instruction, the course ensures that participants leave with knowledge that can be applied immediately. The minimum age for registration is 14, and the program fee is \$40. To maintain a quality learning environment, registration is capped at 12

participants.
On the following day, Friday, November 14, the Home Alone Safety Course will be offered at the same location from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. This program is geared toward younger children who are beginning to spend short periods of time at home

without direct adult supervision. Using role playing, interactive lessons, and hands-on activities, the course teaches children how to recognize potential dangers, make safe decisions, and handle unexpected situations.
Participants will learn valuable skills such as

answering the door or phone safely, handling household accidents and knowing when and how to seek help in emergencies. Confidence-building is a central theme of the program, with organizers aiming to equip children not just with information, but with the assurance that they can apply it in real situations. Children attending the session are asked to bring a lunch, running shoes, and a water bottle. The minimum age requirement is 10 years old (by December 2026), and the program cost is \$40. A maximum of 16 participants will be accepted.

Both programs are part of the Town of Redwater's broader effort to support family and community well-being. Registration opens Monday, September 15, and will close on Wednesday, November 6. Families can register online through the Town of Redwater's Perfect Mind portal at townofredwater.perfectmind.com or by scanning the QR code found on the promotional poster.

For additional information about these and other programs, residents can also visit redwater.ca/p/events-programs.

Town officials say these programs are an important investment in the safety and independence of young residents. Courses like these not only help prepare children and teens for emergencies, but also give parents greater peace of mind knowing their children have the tools to handle difficult situations. Programs of this nature have grown increasingly popular in smaller communities, where access to formal first aid or safety training may be more limited. By hosting them locally at Pembina Place, the Town of Redwater is ensuring that residents of all ages have opportunities to learn skills that can benefit both their families and the wider community.

The Town of Redwater encourages families to register early, as space in both programs is limited and demand is expected to be high. For questions, residents can contact the Community Services Office at 780-942-4101.

ATCO Electric will file an application with the Alberta Utilities Commission, requesting acknowledgement of the new franchise fee of 8 per cent for the Town of Smoky Lake.

The current franchise fee of 7 per cent will change to 8 per cent, effective January 1, 2026. The franchise fee percentage is applied to the distribution tariff, typically consisting of both distribution and transmission charges. Based on the typical monthly consumption of 625 kilowatt hours, the average monthly franchise fee paid by an average residential customer is expected to increase to \$10.95.

The franchise fee is charged in accordance with the franchise agreement between the Town of Smoky Lake and ATCO Electric, approved by the Commission in Decision 2014-065.







Getting your teens invested in their future

(NC) Does your teen seem disinterested in learning life skills like finance? The truth is that many high school students wish they had a better understanding of personal finance.

According to a recent survey on financial education, 60 per

cent of teens polled said they wanted to learn from their parents and teachers.

With teens eager for financial education from trusted sources, parents are in a position to help address their most pressing concerns. For many young people, the cost

of post-secondary education is a major worry.

Not all families will be comfortable with their teens knowing the details of their financial lives (and for some, talking about money can be culturally taboo). But being open and honest with your kids in an

age-appropriate way can help them understand expectations as they prepare for adulthood:

Share your own past financial mistakes. Let your kids benefit from the lessons you've had to learn. For example, if you struggled with debt in early adulthood, share what you wish you had known then. Introduce the concept of credit and outline the financial consequences of getting into debt they can't manage.

Help your teen understand how interest works by charging them a small fee to borrow from you. Interest can be a major shock for many young borrowers. It can lead them to sign up for

credit cards with interest rates they can't handle because they don't fully understand what they're agreeing to.

Start deeper conversations about investing. Teens are much more interested in the topic of investing than you might think. Many have already started to recognize that they can't build their future on just their regular income.

Start by teaching your kids about different investment vehicles. From there, you can either look into setting up a custodial account (minors under the age of 18 aren't able to open or invest in an investment account without a parent or guardian listed as

well), or use an online investment simulator.

"This can be a great time to practice investing and make mistakes, because when you're a kid, you still have a cushion to fall back on," says Shannette Fraser, an associate VP at TD Wealth.

Help them pick stocks from companies they recognize to make the process more engaging and talk about what happens as the markets fluctuate.

By creating a safe environment to experiment and make mistakes, you can help set up your teens with the tools and mindset they need to make smart investment decisions later in life.

Stay safe at home with these fire prevention tips

(NC) As temperatures drop and we spend more time indoors, it's a good time to give your home a fire safety check. Fall and winter bring added risks like candles, cooking and twinkling holiday lights. But with a few simple precautions, you can help protect your home and the people in it.

Fire safety starts with prevention

- Keep a close eye when you're cooking. Most house fires start in the kitchen, so don't leave the stove unattended, and keep anything flammable, like tea towels or packaging, away from heat.
- Clean out the dryer lint trap every time you use it.
- If you use a fireplace or a wood stove, book a chimney cleaning and inspection every fall before heating season. Stick to safe-burning materials like seasoned wood and never toss in cardboard or household garbage.
- Tidy up the space around your home: keep firewood and dry leaves away from the house, and ensure your

barbeque is clean and grease-free, even the in the off season.

- Replace any damaged strings of holiday lights before decorating and be sure to turn them off before leaving the house or going to bed.
- Make sure your alarms and tools are ready
- Test your smoke alarms once a month to make sure they're working properly. You should have one in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- Once a year, be sure to replace batteries in smoke alarms not wired into the home and check the expiration date on the alarm. Expired units should be replaced.
- If you have gas appliances or a wood-burning fireplace, consider adding a carbon monoxide detector too. It's an extra layer of safety you'll be glad to have.
- Read your fire extinguisher's instructions carefully and keep it in a place that's easy to

reach and close to an exit.

Plan and practise your escape

- If the worst happens and you experience a fire in your home, make sure you have a plan in place for a safe escape. Your home escape plan should meet the needs of everyone in your household, including young kids, older adults and anyone with mobility or sensory needs.
- Know two ways out of every room if possible, and make sure doors and windows open easily. Consider a window ladder for second floor bedrooms—they're portable and can be easily stored in case of emergencies.
- Have an outside meeting place a safe distance from your home where everyone should meet.

Practise your home fire drill at least twice a year with everyone in the household. Make sure any guests are aware of your fire plan.

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
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
