Thorhild County says goodbye to Radway Hotel

With a heavy and reflective heart, October 21, 2025, marked the Radway Hotel's demolition. For many years, residents witnessed the slow and sorrowful decline of this once-grand structure, its walls crumbling and its spirit fading away. The announcement from Thorhild County regarding the Notice of Demolition brought a bittersweet closure to a chapter steeped in both history and nostalgia. Now, as the dust

settles, everyone will remember the stories and memories that lingered within the old hotel's walls, forever etched in the hearts of those who cherished its presence.

Deteriorating buildings often need to be torn down for several reasons, including safety concerns, modernization needs, and urban development. Over time, structures can worsen, becoming unstable or hazardous. In many cases, these older buildings may not meet current safety

codes or may require extensive repairs that are cost prohibitive. Although it is a necessity, it is often hard to watch as a community staple is torn apart.

The tearing down of these buildings can evoke a deep sense of sadness among many people. Old buildings often hold significant historical, cultural, and emotional value. They can be reminders of a city's heritage or the stories of those who lived and worked

New liquor store opens in Bellis

The community of Bellis has something new to raise a glass to — a locally owned liquor store has officially opened its doors, offering convenience, variety, and community-focused service.

The store is owned by brothers Nishant and Sumant Mehta, former bankers who now run the attached gas station, convenience store, and liquor shop — a journey that's taken them from the finance world to local business ownership.

The idea to open the liquor store came from local demand, as there was previously no liquor store in Bellis.

"We opened it for the convenience of our local community. People had been asking for a long time, and we thought now was the right time," Nishant explained.

The brothers have owned the gas station for 11 months. "A liquor store seemed like a good business opportunity as well," he added.

According to Nishant, what sets their store apart from others in nearby towns is price and customer care.

"We're more affordable, and we're

committed to our customers. We even take exclusive orders to get them specific drinks they want," he said.

The store offers a wide range of products. "We carry beer, vodka, whisky, rum, gin, coolers, wine and some local products from the Calgary and Edmonton areas," said Nishant.

Even the store's look was carefully considered. "We wanted to give it an aesthetic feel, so we added wooden walls instead of just plain drywall. When you walk in, it smells like fresh wood."

Launching the business came with its own set of obstacles.

"The biggest challenges were the upfront renovation costs and stocking the initial inventory," Nishant shared. There were some delays with permits, but local government support made a difference. "AGLC took a little longer to issue the permit, but the County of Smoky Lake was very helpful," he said.

With the liquor store attached to the gas station, the owners are mindful about selling responsibly. "So far, we haven't had any issues, but we are strict about not selling alcohol to anyone who is already under the influence,"

Nishant stated.

The response from the Bellis community has been positive.

"The community is very excited, and so far, we've received good reviews," said Nishant.

He believes the liquor store adds to the local economy. "It brings more business into our little hub- with the gas station, the convenience store, take-out food, and now the liquor store all working together. It helps us employ local people and give back to the community."

Currently, the store has one local employee, and they plan to continue hiring as the business grows.

The brothers are also open to future collaborations. "We'd love to partner with local farmers and community members for events. We also want to work with local breweries."

As for long-term plans, Nishant said they have a bigger vision. "We want to expand into a larger space and maybe add a cannabis store and a truck stop."

And above all, the two brothers want to thank the people of Bellis for their support. "A big thank-you to everyone for supporting us and helping us grow."

Confirmed case of measles prompts public alert to potential exposures

Alberta Health Services (AHS) has been notified of a person with confirmed measles in the North Zone who has been in a public setting while infectious. Additional locations may be released if necessary.

Individuals who were in the following location during the specified dates and times may have been exposed to measles:

Location:

George McDougall – Smoky Lake Healthcare Centre Emergency Department
4212 55 Avenue, Smoky Lake

Exposure time periods:

October 20: Exposure time: Approx. 11:45 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (MDT)

October 21 – October 22: Exposure time: Approx. 10:40 p.m. – 11:45 a.m. (MDT)

Anyone who attended this location at these times, who was born in or after 1970 and has fewer than two documented doses of measles-containing vaccine or has never had measles disease, may be at risk for developing measles

and may be asked to take additional precautions if presenting to a healthcare facility. They should monitor for symptoms of measles and are strongly encouraged to review their immunization records.

Measles is an extremely contagious disease and the virus spreads easily through the air.

Symptoms of measles include:

- Fever of 38.3° C or higher; and
- Cough, runny nose and/or red eyes; and
- Rash that appears 3 to 7 days after fever starts, usually beginning behind the ears and on the face and spreading down to the body and then to the arms and legs. The rash appears red and blotchy on lighter skin colours. On darker skin colours, it can appear purple or darker than the skin around it, or it might be hard to see.

Complications of measles can include ear infections, pneumonia, inflammation

of the brain, premature delivery, and rarely death. Persons who are pregnant, less than 5 years of age, or have weakened immune systems are at greatest risk of serious complications.

If symptoms of measles do develop, individuals are advised to stay home and call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 before visiting any healthcare facility or provider, including a family physician clinic or pharmacy.

Measles vaccine is highly effective at preventing infection and complications. In Alberta, measles vaccine is offered, free of charge, through Alberta's publicly funded immunization program. The recommended schedule for measles immunization is two doses, the first at one year of age and the second at 18 months.

However, with measles currently circulating in North Zone, those who live, work or travel to the area are also currently eligible for additional immunizations:

- Infants who are 6 months up to

and including 11 months of age are recommended to receive an early dose of vaccine. However, they should still receive their routine two doses after they reach one year of age.

- If you were born before 1970 and have not been immunized, talk to your healthcare provider about possibly receiving a single dose of measles vaccine.

If you think you have been exposed, and you are not protected against measles you may be able to receive immunization to reduce the risk of infection. A dose of vaccine needs to be given within 72 hours of exposure to prevent measles. Babies under 1 year of age, people with severely weakened immune systems, and those who are pregnant may be able to receive immunoglobulin within 6 days of exposure to prevent disease. Call the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434 for more information if these situations apply to you or

your family.

Albertans uncertain of their immunization history, or their child's immunization history, can check eligibility and/or book an appointment by calling the measles hotline at 1-844-944-3434.

Individuals who are 14 years of age and older can check their My Health Record.

The measles hotline connects you to a professional who can assist with accessing your immunization records or offer general information; provide advice for those experiencing measles symptoms and are feeling unwell; and assist with booking measles immunization appointments or locating a public health clinic offering immunization in your area.

You can also text 'Measles' to 88111 to get measles health information texted to your mobile device.

If you have had a measles infection and have never had lab testing in Alberta to show that you had the infection, ask your family doctor about going for a simple blood test which can

show that you are protected against measles. Having this blood test means that if you are ever exposed to measles in the future, you will be considered protected and you will not be asked to stay home.

Alberta Ministers discuss “A new era of care”

The latest Alberta mandate letter, reflects “A New Era of Care” and underscores the government’s restructuring and commitment to transforming the province’s healthcare system with a strong emphasis on innovation, collaboration, and patient-centered approaches.

In a joint rural media roundtable, Minister Adriana Lagrange,

Minister Matt Jones, Minister Rick Wilson, and Minister Jason Nixon discussed health care in Alberta and their ongoing work to improve it. One of the central themes in Alberta healthcare is the integration of advanced technologies, which streamlines communication between patients and providers and ensures adequate access to services and care. This approach is designed to

make healthcare more efficient and responsive to the needs of Albertans. Additionally, the mandate highlights the importance of preventive care and mental health services.

Collaboration is another key aspect emphasized in the mandate. The letter calls for a concerted effort among healthcare providers, community organizations, and patients to ensure services are culturally

competent and meet the diverse needs of Alberta’s population. This collaborative model is intended to empower patients and enhance their involvement in their own care. The mandate encourages ongoing community engagement to ensure that healthcare services remain effective and responsive. By soliciting input from Albertans, the government aims to create a system that not only

adapts to current needs but also anticipates future challenges.

“A New Era of Care” reflects a progressive approach aimed at improving health outcomes and patient satisfaction while looking towards a more inclusive and efficient healthcare system for everyone in Alberta. The ministers acknowledge that hospitals are under pressure, and healthcare providers and

surgical capacity need to be expanded. They discussed ongoing initiatives like the Rural Health Action Plan and 211 Alberta. With the success of the mobile mammogram services and the man van (prostate cancer screening), they have now announced mobile lung screening services.





Get creative, get messy

Smoky Lake FCSS (Family and Community Support Services) began their Monday/Friday programming for 3-12-year-olds. While many may see finger painting as just a way to get messy, finger painting offers a multitude of benefits for young children, engaging their creativity while promoting important developmental skills. This expressive art form encourages creativity, allowing children to explore colours, shapes, and textures without the constraints of traditional painting methods, encouraging imagination and artistic expression. Also, the simple act of finger painting helps develop fine motor skills as children strengthen their hand muscles and improve coordination while manipulating paint with their fingers, which is

crucial with very young children for tasks like writing and using utensils later on.

Finger painting can also serve as a sensory exploration tool, engaging multiple senses. The texture, smell, and colours stimulate sensory experiences, helping cognitive development by helping children learn about their environment. This form of art also provides a powerful medium for emotional expression, allowing children to express feelings they may not yet have the words for, further expanding and developing their emotional intelligence.

When done together as a group, finger painting can promote social interaction, build teamwork and social skills as children learn to share materials, collaborate on projects, and share their ideas effectively. As they create and see their art come to

life, it boosts their confidence; the absence of right or wrong answers in art encourages experimentation and a sense of accomplishment, which can be extremely rewarding. The calming, repetitive motions involved in finger painting also promote relaxation and mindfulness, inviting children to focus on the present moment, which is beneficial for managing stress and anxiety.

Smoky Lake FCSS emphasizes that this is an excellent opportunity for children to engage in enriching learning activities. They encourage parents to take note of these available programs, which promotes growth and development. It is important to remember that these opportunities come at no cost, providing a wonderful resource for families within the community.







Money moves that matter: Free workshop in Redwater helps residents build stronger financial futures



COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS October 14, 2025

Below is a brief summary of decisions made at the October 14, 2025, Regular Council meeting:

Business Case and Community Benefit Assessment Long Lake Ski Hill September 2025
Council accepted the Business Case and Community Benefit Assessment Long Lake Ski Hill September 2025 and directed Administration to bring it forward to the 2026 Budget Deliberations.

Community Economic Development Advisory Board Recommendation to Council - Inbound Investment
Council directed Administration to bring the Community Economic Development Advisory Board recommendation for Thorhild County Council to apply for the Northern Regional Economic Development Program funding for the 2025-2026 intake for Inbound Investment to a 2026 Budget Meeting.

Gas Line Strike Invoice
Council directed Administration to proceed with the gas line repair at NE-7-60-22-W4 at Thorhild County's expense.

New Gas Service for Sold Property
Council directed Administration to respond to the request of the landowner at 909-2nd Street, in the Hamlet of Thorhild, that the cost of the infill will be at the owner's expense, as the house was sold as is.

Victoria Trail - Councillor Richard Filipchuk
Council directed Administration to purchase and replace the Victoria Trail signage in the amount of \$2,100, with the funds to come from the Legacy Fund Reserve.

Bridge Infrastructure - Councillor Joyce Pierce
Council directed Administration to research and provide tender results of temporary bridge options and bring the results back to Council for consideration at the November 25, 2025, Regular Council Meeting.

Correspondence for Action - GO EAST of Edmonton Regional Tourism
Council directed Administration to send a letter of support to GO EAST of Edmonton Regional Tourism signed by Reeve Janine Paly.

Correspondence for Action - Northern Lights Library System
Council accepted the Northern Lights Library System levy increase of 1.5%, for a total of \$18,059.70 for 2026.




