Celebrating foster and kinship caregivers in Alberta

In a rural media roundtable event held on October 28, 2025, Minister of Children and Family Services, Searle Turton discussed the importance of foster and kinship caregivers. Every October, Alberta shines a spotlight on the vital contributions of foster and kinship caregivers across the province. These dedicated individuals play an essential role in the lives of countless children and youth, offering both loving homes and the stability needed for a brighter future.

Currently, Alberta is home to over 2,100 kinship caregivers and 1,400 foster caregivers who are committed to providing safe, nurturing environments. Their efforts not only foster a sense of belonging but also ensure that children and youth remain connected to their cultural roots and communities. Recognizing the significance of this work, the government is continuing to invest in support for these caregivers, allowing them to focus on what they do best, caring for children and youth.

In an ambitious move, more than \$11 million has been allocated over the next three years to enhance the supports available to caregivers. This funding includes provisions for counseling sessions, as well as initiatives like the refer-a-foster

Members of the Aspen View Public Schools Board of Trustees were sworn in at its organizational meeting held October 27, 2025 at Athabasca University.

The new seven-member board includes two first-time trustees, Maria Smosarska (Ward 2 – North Central) and Brittany Turko (Ward 5 – South Central). Four returning incumbents include Dennis MacNeil (Ward 2 – North Central), Candyce Nikipelo (Ward 3 – Northeast), April Bauer (Ward 4 – Southwest) and Donna Cherniwchan (Ward 6 – Southeast). Anne Karczmarczyk (Ward 1 – Northwest) returns to the board having previously represented Ward 2. Trustees Nikipelo and Cherniwchan were both acclaimed to the positions of Board Chair and Vice-Chair, respectively. Nikipelo has served as Board Chair since October 2021, while Cherniwchan has been Vice-Chair since March 2025. Trustees were also appointed to various internal and external committees.





Winter Wear Depot returns to help Redwater residents stay warm

The Town of Redwater’s Family and Community Support Services is once again operating its annual winter wear depot to help ensure everyone in the community has access to warm clothing during the colder months.

The depot provides free winter outerwear to anyone in need. Items available may include coats, boots, mitts, hats, and other cold-weather essentials for adults, teens, children, toddlers, and babies.

Residents are encouraged to donate freshly washed and fully functional winter outerwear.

Donations can be dropped off at two locations in Pembina Place: the bright purple donation box on the main floor near the office, or at the Community Services Office on the second floor.

Anyone in need of winter wear can visit the depot on the second floor of Pembina Place during business hours: Monday to Thursday

from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Alberta’s winters are among the harshest in Canada, with temperatures that can fall below -30°C . Each year, thousands of Albertans struggle to afford proper winter clothing or face unstable housing that leaves them exposed to dangerous cold. Programs like the Winter Wear Depot play an important role in reducing that risk by ensuring people in the community can stay safe and warm.

Cold weather exposure can lead to frostbite and hypothermia within minutes when windchills are extreme. According to Alberta Health Services, emergency departments see a rise in cold-related injuries every winter, with frostbite most commonly affecting fingers, toes, ears, and the nose. Proper

insulated clothing, water-proof boots, and layered outerwear remain the most effective protection against these risks.

The 2022 provincial point-in-time count of homelessness found more than 4,400 Albertans experiencing homelessness on a single night, including several hundred living unsheltered outdoors. Even those with housing can struggle to stay warm as energy and clothing costs rise. Local donation programs help bridge that gap by providing essential winter gear to anyone who needs it, free of charge.

The initiative reflects Redwater’s long-standing spirit of neighbourly care. Whether through donating a gently used coat or spreading the word to someone who might need one, residents are encouraged to take part in keeping everyone in the community warm this winter.

The winter wear depot is organized by the Town of Redwater’s Family and Community Support Services.

Grabbing a bite: Restaurant and bar sales in Alberta

Grabbing a bite: Restaurant and bar sales in Alberta

Released October 30, the latest Statistics Canada data show that restaurant and bar sales in Alberta were robust in August, up 7.6% from the same month last year.*

On a year-to-date basis, revenue was up by 5.9% over the first eight months of the year compared to the same period in 2024.

Removing the effects of inflation, year-over-year revenue was 5.6% higher and year-to-date 4.8% higher, indicating

that the growth was mostly due to higher spending rather than higher prices.

How do we account for this rise in spending on eating out/ordering in the face of rising unemployment in the province?


First, there is the inclination of Albertans to continue to enjoy the province's restaurants and bars.

Second, ongoing population growth and less travel to the U.S. has increased the pool of potential customers.

Third, given the high cost of food, there is likely some bargain hunting going on. I for one was able to get a

beef dip from Arby's for half the price it would have cost me to make it at home. As always, because we don't have corresponding data on the operating costs of restaurants and bars, we can't say with any certainty if the sector is doing better or worse in terms of net profit. Nonetheless, the rise in sales is a positive sign for the sector and an indication that the Alberta economy, despite tariff headwinds, is continuing to push forward.
